



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
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#### KANAB BALLOONS AND TUNES ROUNDUP IN COWBOY COUNTRY

Take back to the skies February 17th, 18th, and 19th as Kanab's 9th annual Balloons and Tunes Roundup flies into Cowboy Country. Witness over 40 hot air balloons floating overhead, explore the countryside, venture through the vendor fair, listen to live music, and more.

The event taking place over President's Day weekend allows you to stay a little longer. Kanab is located in the heart of the



Grand Circle and centrally located to many natural scenic wonders. Take advantage of this long weekend to explore three national parks, two state parks, many national monuments, and much more.

"We're so excited to continue this great



tradition that has become a mainstay in Kanab, our theme for 2023 is Cowboy Country. The event helps to boost the economy in our typically slow season," said Janette Peatross of Kane County Office of Tourism. "We have seen growth each year, and pilots from all over the country want to come. We're expecting a great turnout again this year," she added.

The hot air balloons will launch each morning just after sunrise (weather permitting) at 7:30 AM. The colorful balloons will fly with a beautiful backdrop of the red rock Vermilion Cliffs, located near the scenic Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument, with the added beauty of early morning light. The balloons can be seen from all over Kanab.

After enjoying the balloons, don't forget to check out the street fair, located on Main Street, for a variety of vendors selling food, art, and one-of-a-kind crafts throughout the weekend. The street fair will be on Feb. 17 & 18 from 11 AM to 8 PM.

The "Tunes" in Balloons and Tunes will be provided by numerous local and regional acts, including Mesozoic, Journey Beyond, Wish You Were Here, Studio Blue from Snow College, Lennon Roach, Bombshell Flowers, Apollo's Army, and the Jacob Westfall Band. They will perform on the stage located at the street fair from 3 PM to 7 PM on Friday and 11 AM to 6:30 PM on Saturday.



For an amazing evening, Friday the 17th, there will be a lantern launch on Center Street at 7 PM. Bring a friend or the family, launch your lantern and watch the lanterns fill the night sky. Lanterns will be available for purchase at the street fair.

Saturday night, the fun will continue with the balloon glow at 7 PM. The pilots will line Center Street and light up their colorful balloons for all to enjoy. With so many great activities, you'll want to stay the whole weekend, so book a room today!

#### **NOWISWHENWEARE** (THE STARS) -A 3-DIMENSIONAL, INTERACTIVE EXPERIENCE

Southern Utah has never seen anything like this before! March 9-19, 2023

How often do we have the opportunity to experience, feel and deeply connect with something new and truly unique? The answer is very rarely. NOWISWHENWEARE (the stars) is one of these unique

Coming to Center for the Arts at Kayenta after a successful and emotional tour starting in New York City, N O W IS W H E N W E A R E (the stars) is an interactive light-and-sound installation and promises to be an experience that Southern Utah has never seen before.

 $N \ O \ W \ I \ S \ W \ H \ E$ N W E A R E (the stars) is an interactive theatrical installation that pushes the participant to become the main character of the production. An unseen narrator guides each participant through an individualized journey into a precisely programmed matrix of light - and the cosmos of themselves. The stars trace every decision you have ever made as a contributing factor to being 'here' and being 'now.' Part meditation, part exploration, the stars draw visitors into a hyper-focus on the present.

This ambitious project envelops each participant with nearly 5,000 individually reactive LED lights and a 496-channel sound system. The stars is an invitation to engage and become an active explorer discovering the traces of yourself in light. the universe, and those who have been before us.

Every point in space occurs once at each moment, and an event in time is the intersection of a location and a moment. The stars installation creates a space where each participant can define and recognize personal truths about themselves.

How do we remain present in space? How do we remain present in time?

How do we collectively grieve as a community?

in how creating meaningful time-based experiences can lead to more consequential human-to-human interaction. If at its core, theater is humans telling stories about ourselves to each other, then I hope what make is in the service of getting better at being human. That's why I do the work with recurring collaborators with aligned values to create experiences for others. We work to interrogate the power structures that exist in the rooms in which we make and question how to systematically change inequi-

table systems."



#### **HERITAGE CHOIR PRESENTS** "SONGS OF JOY"

A Spring Concert on March 3rd with Vocal Scholarship Recipients

Tickets are on sale now for the Spring Concert titled "Songs of Joy" by the Southern Utah Heritage Choir (SUHC) at Crimson Cliffs High School auditorium on Saturday, March 3rd, at 7:30 p.m. The concert will feature recipients of the Choir's 2nd Annual Vocal Scholarship Competition and its newly appointed Music Director, Dr. Ken Peterson, who has been a Conductor with the Choir since 2014.



"Songs of Joy" will showcase the talents of vocal scholars and sopranos Lauryn Thomas and Bethany Ure,

both high school seniors in Washington County, Utah. Lauryn attends Dixie High School as a student of voice teacher Tennile Coello. Bethany

attends Crimson Cliffs High School and studies under vocal coach Chrissy Rogers. The two vocalists competed against other seniors from the school district, and both won a \$1000 cash scholarship and the opportunity to perform at the Choir's spring concert. Lauryn plans to become a high school choir teacher, and Bethany intends to major in vocal performance at Utah Tech University and then teach voice.

"In addition to the excitement and honor of presenting our second year of vocal scholarships," said SUHC President Geri Rhodes, "we are proud to announce the appointment of Dr. Ken Peterson as the Choir's new Music Director. With this assignment, he will direct all musical aspects of performances and long-term planning.'

Dr. Peterson received his Bachelor of Music degree in voice performance from Utah State University, his Master of Music degree in voice performance from Illinois State University, and his Doctor of Arts in voice performance and pedagogy from the University of Northern Colorado. He was the Director of vocal activities at Dixie State University in St. George, Utah, where he taught voice-related courses and served as the music director of the musical stage. Dr. Peterson joined the Heritage Choir in 2014 as a Conductor and was appointed the Principal Conductor in 2018. As a tenor, Peterson has performed in recitals, concerts, musical theatre, and opera throughout the United States. He is also a published researcher in the field of vocal pedagogy.

Rhodes added, "Dr. Peterson is a consummate musician. His enthusiastic conducting technique evidences his love of music and singing. He is an excellent communicator, befriends each choir member, and adds a touch of humor to every rehearsal. As an experienced teacher, he requires the finest of each voice."



On February 10th and 11th, the 7th Annual St George Jazz Festival returns with wonderful concerts and informative clinics. Five-time Grammy and Latin Grammy nominee Francisco Torres headlines the festival. All events take place on the campus of Utah Tech University.

Torres is featured in a performance Saturday, Feb 11th, backed by the Rebel Jazz Band in the Cox Auditorium. Torres is an in-demand musician and educator. Recording credits include Michael Buble, Ray Charles, Jennifer Lopez, Ricky Martin, Dianne Reeves, and many more. He is the musical director for the legendary Poncho Sanchez and a member of Gordon Goodwin's Big Phat Band and John Beasley's Monkestra.

"You've heard Torres on Dancing with the Stars, America's Got Talent, and The Simpsons. Now come hear him live at our festival," St George Jazz Artistic Director Glenn Webb says.

St George Jazz partners with UT Live to present Kat Edmonson and her band on Friday, Feb 10th at 7:30 PM. She will perform originals and familiar favorites. Kat is an award-winning songwriter and singer "with an equal foot in jazz, cabaret and vintage cosmopolitan pop" (NY Times). She has been featured on Austin City Limits, Tiny Desk Concert, A Prairie Home Companion, and The Late Show.

Of Edmonson's style, Webb muses, "I imagine if Cole Porter and Paul Simon worked together, they would ask Kat to sing the songs."

Educational clinics are presented free for students and the public on both days of the festival. Edmonson and her band present a clinic at 2 PM in the Cox Auditorium on the Utah Tech campus. Now in its 7th year, the St. George Jazz Festival brings world-class performers to the beautiful red rocks of Southern Utah. These incredible jazz musicians inspire and educate an ever-growing pool of talented young jazz students. Joined by the Rebel

Jazz Band, these nationally-acclaimed guest artists show off their skills at what continues to be Southern Utah's most thrilling concert each year. With tremendous

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# INTERESTED IN GATHERING SHED ANTLERS?

Utah Offers A Free And Mandatory Ethics Course Before You Do.

If you want to gather shed antlers in the state of Utah, you must take a mandatory ethics course. Collecting is only legal from Feb. 1 through April 15, so it's important to understand the rules and laws you must follow.

SOUTHERN UTAH — Collecting shed

SOUTHERN UTAH — Collecting shed antlers from many big game species, including deer, elk, and moose, is a popular pastime in Utah. But before you head outdoors to collect shed antlers during the next few months, you must complete the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources' Antler Gathering Ethics

course

After dropping their antlers each winter, male deer, elk, and moose will grow a new set of antlers starting in spring. Looking for the shed antlers is a fun activity that many Utah families enjoy. However, late winter and early spring is a tough time of year for deer, elk, and moose, which is why the educational ethics course is required if you want to go "shed hunting".

"During winter, big game animals, especially deer, often have difficulty finding food," DWR Law Enforcement Capt. Chad Bettridge said. "As a result, they often survive on fat reserves they have built up prior to winter. If the animals are receiving constant pressure from people and repeatedly having to run or move, the animal has to use up those fat reserves and energy that it needs to make it through the winter." People who haven't taken the mandatory Antler Gathering Ethics course or who are harassing protected wildlife may be cited.

From late winter through early spring, the habitat that big game animals rely on is usually wet, which means it's more at risk for damage. The free antler gathering ethics course can help you learn how to minimize stress on wildlife and avoid damaging their habitats during this critical time of year.

You can find the free course on the DWR website. About 20,000 people take the mandatory course each year in order to go look for shed antlers in Utah. After you finish the course, you must print your certificate of completion and then carry it with you while you're "shed hunting." Completing the course is mandatory if you want to gather shed antlers from Feb. 1 through April 15, and the course must be completed each year. However, if you wait until after April 15 to gather antlers, you don't need to complete the course.

After you've completed the course, you can gather antlers in many locations across Utah. However, some notable exceptions include:

- Wildlife management areas: Many of the state's wildlife management areas are closed in the winter and spring to protect animals and their habitat. Make sure to double-check for any closures before entering a WMA to gather shed antlers. You can find a list of Utah's wildlife management areas and any seasonal closures on the DWR website.
  - Private property: You must have writ-

ten permission from the landowner before gathering antlers on private land.

• Native American lands, national parks and many national monuments are also closed to antler gathering.

If you find a skull with the antlers or horns still attached, it's possible the animal was poached. Do not pick up or move the skull or disturb footprints or other evidence at the scene. Instead, please do the following:

- the scene. Instead, please do the following:
   Take photos of the skull from a couple langles
- Pinpoint the location of the skull (preferably using GPS coordinates)
- Report your find to the nearest DWR office or by texting 847411

• Provide specific details in your report
The DWR will send a conservation officer to investigate. If it's clear the animal died
of

natural causes, you might be allowed to keep your find.

#### EAST REEF TRAIL IN RED CLIFFS DESERT RESERVE

Trail: East Reef

**Location:** Red Cliffs Desert Reserve near Leeds

Difficulty: Easy with some up and down sections

**Average Hiking Time:** Less than two hours at a leisurely pace for the 2.5 mile loop hike

Family Friendly: Yes

Getting There: Heading north on Interstate 15 take Exit 22 near Leeds onto Old Highway 91. Turn left and continue north approximately 2.2 miles through the town of Leeds. (In Leeds, the highway is renamed Main Street.) Next turn right (south) onto signed 900 North/Babylon Road just past the sign for the Red Cliffs National Conservation Area. Babylon Road (the primary access to seven trailheads and 13 designated trails) begins as asphalt and becomes a dirt road at .6 miles in. Stay on the

main road and at four miles from the turnoff you reach the unsigned East Reef Trail trailhead and small parking area, good for three vehicles on the right (west) side of the road. A few feet beyond the trailhead is a large red sign reading, "All motorized vehicles must stay on designated roads." The trailhead is also .3 miles past the well-marked Historic Babylon trailhead. I strongly recommend a high clearance vehicle.

Habitat Conservation Plan is administered by Washington County in coordination with the Bureau of Land Management, the US Fish and Wildlife Service, Utah Department of Natural Resources, and the Utah School and Institutional Trust Lands Administration. Remember, the reserve is a sensitive area, stay on the trails and minimize your impact—walk as if you are kissing the earth with your feet.

Marked by a short wooden fence and stepover, the trailhead elevation is 2,810 feet with a 120 feet elevation change from the trailhead to the highest point. There are some not-too-steep up and down sections.

The temperature was in the low 40s at about 9 am as we began our hike under an awesome blue Utah sky. Unfortunately for us, a cold gale force wind accompanied us for the entire hike—brrrrrr. It never got warmer

Be advised that the trail is marked by



four widely spaced, almost unreadable trail signs. And there are several user trails that while not the official trail, do eventually get back to the main trail.

We began heading southwest on the eastern side of the reef (ridge) along the left side (south) of a gully. Within ¼ mile the trail became steep for a while and then down a bit to the southwestern tip of the reef. This vantage point afforded great views of the Virgin River.



All hikes are good. Some have one or two attractions, others more. This hike, East Reef Trail in the Red Cliffs Desert Reserve, is one of the multi-attraction hikes. First, although only a few miles from civilization, it feels like, and is, wilderness. A place of solitude, we encountered no other people on our trek. Upon hiking to the top of East Reef/ridge are great views of the Virgin River. Past inhabitants of the area also left their mark—petroglyphs on the western side of East Reef. We, my wife Deb and I, began our adventure on a Thursday morning in late February.

The Red Cliffs Desert Reserve was established in 1996 to protect a large and diverse habitat capable of sustaining wildlife populations threatened by development and habitat loss. It comprises 62,000 acres and has more than 130 miles of shared use trails for hiking, horseback riding, and mountain biking. Three ecosystems—the Mojave Desert, the Great Basin Desert, and the Colorado Plateau—merge in southwestern Utah and the Reserve reflects the biological diversity of this unique region. The Red Cliffs Desert Reserve

At about  $\frac{34}{4}$  miles along we descended the western side into a valley formed by two ridges and followed a dry streambed for about  $\frac{14}{4}$  mile. The trail then jogs slightly to the right (east) and is closer to the bottom of East Reef. Less than  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles along the trial, we came across two very large free standing boulders, one of which has some nice petroglyphs.

This section of trail also features a large mound, or small hill, with wide grey and reddish bands. Fairly odd in this area of mostly brownish and reddish ridges.

Then it was up an incline where we took some photos back toward the valley we traversed and soon our trail merged with Historic Babylon Trail. It quickly turned south to confront East Reef. On Historic Babylon Trail we crossed the ridge by walking through a large gap filled with boulders and almost vertical walls.

Through the ridge we were now at the Historic Babylon trailhead and headed southwest down Babylon Road .3 mile to complete the loop hike back at the East Reef trailhead.

This is an easy hike with some not too steep up and down sections. The views are good as were the petroglyphs. As with most of our hikes, we did not encounter other people. The entire hike was about 2 ½ miles and took less than two hours.

# THE INDEPENDENT MOVIE REVIEW By Adam Mast

I was wasting time rummaging through Facebook recently, and while scrolling through, I came across a post that posed a simple question;

"Who is that one celebrity who has remained humble and down to Earth despite being very successful?"

As expected, the thread was flooded with all the usual (and appropriate) suspects; Keanu Reeves... Hanks...Brendan Tom Fraser...Adam Sandler, etc. One name I didn't see in the comments, however, was Michael J. Fox. After bearing witness to an intimate new documentary called "Still: A Michael J. Fox Movie" from director Davis Guggenheim ("An Inconvenient Truth," "It Might Get Loud"), I was

quick to add his name to the thread. True, Fox admits that there was a time early in his career when he found himself to be a bit on the insufferable side, but it can be tough to navigate that kind of monumental success when you're young.

This forthcoming film gets up close and personal with Fox. From his early days as a young actor to his breakthrough role as Alex P. Keaton on the hit television series "Family Ties," to his beloved turn in the blockbuster "Back to the Future" trilogy, to his come-full-circle role on the hit show "Spin City," Fox would become a household name in every sense of the term. And those aforementioned noteworthy titles would only scratch the surface where they would pertain to this entertainer's success story. Of course, life tends to throw us curveballs, and for Fox, that unpredictable pitch would come in the form of a Parkinson's diagnosis when the famed actor was only in his late 20s. He would conceal his illness until going public with it seven years later.

While "Still" covers a great deal of Fox's career, it doesn't take away from

delving into his challenges when battling an incurable disease. And as expected, Fox does so with humility, dignity, and grace. Beyond that, Fox is also very open about his struggles with alcoholism and his determination to keep his diagnosis secret before ultimately becoming an advocate in an inspirational fashion. Most importantly, though, through it all, "Still" is every bit a film about the power of family as it is a movie about Fox himself. Had this famous performer not had a supportive wife and children by his side, things could have gone decidedly differently for him.

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From a technical standpoint, "Still" is to be commended for its skillful, clever, and altogether creative editing. The way editor Michael Harte cuts from well-executed recreations to clips from Fox's films, and tv shows (all set to Fox's reflective voiceover) is simply masterful.

While "Still: A Michael J. Fox Movie" is courageous and honest in its brutal look at Parkinson's, this is far from a pity party. While still in the battle, Fox is the eternal optimist, and as a documentary subject, he provides eye-opening insight and reflects on his life with absolute clarity. This is one of the best films of this year's Sundance Film Festival, and while the year is relatively



early, I'll be surprised if "Still" doesn't emerge as one of 2023's strongest movies.

"Still: A Michael J. Fox Movie" will be available on Apple TV sometime in 2023.

#### **WHAT WILL OUR AIR FUTURE BE?** By Lisa Rutherford



Anyone witnessed what happens with growth knows that poor air quality can be a result. Just look at Utah's Wasatch Front. It's apparent that growth has had a dramatic and dismal effect on that

area's air quality. Some may argue that it's better than in the past when coal was burned and thick soot was everywhere, but the problem now is more insidious. PM2.5. a main source of pollution from vehicle emissions and wood burning, is generally not visible to the naked eye. But when the Wasatch Front experiences their winter inversions, it is visible—very visible. When inversions are not present people convince themselves there is no problem and go blithely along their merry way exposing themselves and their loved ones to health problems.

So, perhaps you say, "Well, that's the Salt Lake area. We don't have to worry about that here in Washington County or elsewhere in Utah." Perhaps not yet, but with this area projected to hit half a million residents by 2050 and add to that the thousands of visitors that we lure to our county yearly, it's clear we have a problem brewing. The largest area in Washington County, St. George, sits in a bowl, similar to Salt Lake City. Visitors come to our area to visit Zion National Park, and as air quality worsens in St. George, that will impact the air quality in the park, too.

Many of our Washington County residents are older folks and youth who are most at risk for being harmed by poor air quality. Human Health and Economic Costs of Air Pollution in Utah: An Expert Assessment published in 2020 was the result of 23 local researchers and specialists who quantitatively estimated that "air pollution in Utah causes 2480 to 8000 premature deaths annually (90% confidence interval) and decreases the median life expectancy by 1.1 to 3.6 years. Economic costs of air pollution in Utah totaled \$0.75 to \$3.3 billion annually, up to 1.7% of the state's gross domestic product."

Recent research has shown that worldwide environmental pollution causes much worse damage to human health and the economy than previously thought—"5 times more deaths than caused by tuberculosis, AIDS, and malaria combined; 10 times more deaths than from transportation accidents: 30 times more deaths than global malnutrition; and 90 times more deaths than caused by all wars and terrorism." Let that sink in a bit!

The referenced study provides many more grim details about pollution's effects, but let's get to what some are trying to do in Utah to rectify the situation and prevent environmental pollution from harming more of our family members, friends and neighbors.

Clean The Darn Air (CTDA) is a ballot measure campaign to help improve Utah's air quality. It is a grassroots citizens' initiative to place a clean-air-and-climate measure on Utah's 2024 ballot. All of Utah including Southwest Utah would benefit as we grow.

CTDA has a diverse group of individuals comprising their team. Heading the team are Dave Carrier, Organizational Outreach, and Yoram Bauman, Policy Analysis. Dave is a biology professor at the University of Utah and co-organized the 2016 faculty campaign to divest the university's endowment from fossil fuels. He was a plaintiff in a successful lawsuit that rejected a massive expansion of Harper's Quarry in Parleys Canyon. Yoram has a PhD in economics. He founded and co-chaired the first-ever carbon tax ballot measure campaign in the United States, the I-732 campaign in Washington State in 2016.

The team includes their Public Health Advocate, Jan Kennington, a retired Nurse Practitioner, and several campaign strategists. Casey Hansen has a dualdegree in Political Science and Economics from the University of Utah. London Kelley, another strategist, is studying Political Science and International Studies.

I serve as the team's Southwest Utah Coordinator. I am extremely concerned about our future if we do nothing. I've witnessed the growth in our area over twenty-three years and see the handwriting on the wall.

The initiative's basic proposal is to tax pollution instead of potatoes (i.e., eliminate the sales tax on grocery store food and replace it with a carbon tax) and

use the money that's left over to Clean the Darn Air! Besides eliminating the tax on grocery store food and taxing fossil fuelsthe main problemthe measure includes these provisions:

- \$100m a year for air quality programs, including \$15m a year directed at clean air support of low-income communities.
- \$50m a year for rural economies.
- Expand the state's Earned Income Tax Credit match.

Folks, we know

what this inflationary period has done to costs at the grocery store. Those of us who are economically secure have been able to manage our food purchases but those at lower income levels have suffered greatly. And, they are also the ones who generally suffer more from environmental pollution given that they usually live in areas where pollution is greatest. We do not know how inflation will play out, but this initiative will help deal with those unfortunate costs and perhaps even allow those with lower incomes to eat healthier foods.

The initiative is fashioned to be fiscally balanced so it doesn't put additional costs on the state and taxpavers.

To qualify for inclusion on the 2024 ballot CTDA needs to hit a statewide target (about 150,000 valid signatures) as well as targets of about 5,000 valid signatures in 26 of the 29 state senate districts. Three of these senate districts include southwest Utah. So, our signatures are important!

You can learn more about this important issue. A hearing on the initiative will be held on Sunday, February 12, 2023, at 12:30pm and is open to the public. #### **HOW SHOULD UTAH SPEND \$3 BILLION? By Howard Sierer**



Despite a \$192 income tax cut, the State of Utah expects its current 2023 fiscal year ending in June to result in a \$3.3 billion budget surplus. What should the state's priorities be, and how should our

legislature spend the money?

Four Southern Utah legislators, Sen. Don Ipson, and Reps. Walt Brooks, Colin Jack, and Joseph Elison offered their opinions and hopes at a recent Chamber of Commerce breakfast. I agree with some of their emphasis, but I'm less enthused with some other ideas.

Last year, the legislature adopted what it called a "cautious and conservative approach" to its \$25 billion 2023 fiscal year budget, wanting to ensure the state remained in a strong financial position if the economy entered into a recession. The economy remained strong, resulting in this year's surplus.

Our Southern Utah legislators floated a variety of possibilities for the \$3 billion to make a dramatic reduction in the 60% of culinary water currently being used for outdoor watering. The secondary water system would include reused or recycled

Zach Renstrom, general manager of the Washington County Conservancy Water District, told St. George News in a recent interview, "We've been planning it for years. We're spending a lot of our time focused on

One of the arguments for the Lake Powell Pipeline was that our current residents needed to shoulder the pipeline's extraordinary upfront costs to leave a legacy for future generations, just as previous generations built and paid for the water infrastructure we use today.

I support combining local funding with state funds to construct a regional secondary water system as a preferred alternative to a costly Lake Powell pipeline with its massive upfront expenditure. The pipeline's payoff is doubtful since it would depend on highlyuncertain future Colorado River flows into Lake Powell. A regional secondary water system could be constructed on a much more incremental, pay-as-you-go basis and would use our existing water sources.

Our Southern Utah legislators spent time attacking Colorado River lower basin states for overusing their water allotments, while Utah has never used its full allocation. They claim that Nevada, California, and Arizona have used far more water than was promised them in the 1922 Colorado River Compact. Now that they are being forced to cut back as Colorado River flows are dropping, they want Utah to cut back as well.

Lower basin states justify their cutback demands by claiming that Utah is a water waster. Our lawmakers respond, as does the WCWCD that those states don't calculate water use in the same way we do in Utah, and therefore comparisons that show excessive use in Utah are unfair.

I've always been skeptical of those WCWCD claims. I have a gut feeling that someone has something to hide about how water use is calculated. It seems to this engineer that differing water-use figures in different jurisdictions could be reformulated in a way that allowed "apples-to-apples" comparisons.

On another topic, our Southern Utah legislators echoed Utah Attorney General Sean Reyes' complaints about moves by the Biden administration to force businesses to adopt "Environmental, Social and Governance" policies. I've called ESG a "threat to democracy," and I support both our legislators and our attorney general in opposing its socialist-inspired imposition on our vibrant economy.

Here's hoping that the legislature's 2023 session lives up to expectations, keeping Utah as possibly the best-governed state in the union.





surplus, including set-asides for education, augmenting rainy day funds, and another income tax cut.

Gov. Spencer Cox has proposed a \$28.4 billion budget for the coming 2024 fiscal year that includes \$1 billion in tax cuts and \$560 million for water management and conservation to begin implementing Utah's Coordinated Action Plan for Water. Water is near the top of everyone's list.

Those of us in Southern Utah can hope that our legislators will get some of those water funds designated for a planned regional secondary water system. With the Lake Powell pipeline's chances disappearing, the Washington County Water Conservancy District hopes instead





#### **GUIDE TO UTAH'S LIQUOR LAWS**

If you order an alcoholic drink at the restaurant bar, don't be surprised when the bartender asks you to order some food with your drink. In Utah, restaurants may only serve alcoholic beverages with food. Customers don't have to order food each time they buy another drink. The beer sold in grocery stores and gas stations, and tap beer is a bit weaker in Utah, limited to 3.2% alcohol content by weight (4.0% by volume), about 0.5% less than a typical American domestic beer. You can buy full-strength beer, along with liquor and wine, in a state-operated liquor store. Please remember to tip your servers and drink responsibly! The Utah State Liquor Store in Springdale is located inside the Switchback.

#### Safety Tips For Zion

#### **Emergencies**

For 24-hour emergency response, call 911 or (435) 772-3322. The Zion Canyon Medical Clinic is located in Springdale near the south entrance to the park. For hours, please call (435) 772-3226. Other medical clinics are located in Hurricane. The nearest hospitals are in St. George, Cedar City, and Kanab.

#### Hydrate and use refillable water bottles

It is easy to get dehydrated while hiking and walking in the desert, so pack along extra water, and be sure to take rest and water breaks on long hikes. There are a number of places to refill your water bottles in Zion National Park

including the visitors' center and Zion Lodge as well as a new hydration station at the Springdale bus stop in front of The Bumbleberry Inn and Zion Canyon Brew Pub.

#### Be cautious near steep cliffs

Falls from cliffs on trails can result in death. Loose sand or pebbles on stone are very slippery. Be careful of edges when using cameras or binoculars. Never throw or roll rocks because there may be hikers below you. Stay on the trail. Stay back from cliff edges. Observe posted warnings. Please watch children.

#### Watch for flash floods

All narrow canyons are potentially hazardous. Flash floods, often caused by storms miles away, are a real danger and can be life threatening. You are assuming a risk when entering a narrow canyon. Your safety is your responsibility.

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#### Tips To Minimize Your Impact

#### Pack it in, pack it out & use recycling bins

Each month, Zion National Park pays many thousands of dollars to haul away waste collected from garbage cans and recycling bins. Your experience and that of everyone who visits Zion Canyon can be improved by never littering and making sure you pick up any trash you see along the way. Recycling bins are placed strategically throughout Zion Park, and it is highly encouraged for everyone to use them.



#### Please stay on the marked trails

Hiking off trails can lead to loss of vegetation, soil compaction, erosion, and unsightly scars on the landscape. Remember, if you bring it in, please pack it out.

#### Go before you go

It is always a good idea to use the restroom before you begin a hike since facilities are limited to select locations. If you do need to take care of your business, please pack it back out.

#### Be respectful to the wildlife

Feeding, harming, or capturing wild animals is illegal and can cause injury or death to the animal. Animals can become aggressive beggars when fed.

#### Please leave it how you found it

It is illegal to remove anything from Zion National Park, including flowers, rocks, or anything else that you might find. Do not write or carve on natural surfaces.

#### Tips To Maximize Enjoyment

#### Go on a less crowded hike

The most visited Zion hikes have a lot of competition. If you'd rather not feel like you're in the line at a theme park, consider seeking out a less traveled path. Check out our feature, Less-Traveled Zion Hikes, in this issue.

#### To avoid the crowds, go early or late in the day

Consider getting up extra early or trekking out midday after the initial rush has flooded in.


#### Consider coming back again in the low season

Starting in the late fall, the number of visitors to Zion Canyon starts to dwindle, and by December it's significantly less than in the heat of the summer. It is simply a different experience to see Zion in the winter with the snow-capped monoliths. Most hikes are still accessible and are less crowded. You can also drive to the Temple of Sinawava parking lot. The shuttles stop running from November until March.

#### Check out Kolob Canyons and Kolob Terrace Road

With gorgeous open spaces and plenty of dirt roads to explore, Kolob Terrace Road is one of Zion's best kept secrets. You'll notice the air getting cooler as you gain elevation, and you'll find plenty of beautiful views worth stopping at for a quick photo op. The Kolob Terrace Road turnoff is in Virgin, so watch for signs. Portions of the Kolob Canyon District of Zion National Park are reached via Exit 40 on Interstate 15.



#### Visit the east side of Zion and spend a day in Kanab



#### 2023 UPDATES FOR ZION NATIONAL PARK SHUTTLE SYSTEM

#### **Zion Canyon Shuttle System**

No ticket, permit, or reservation needed to ride the park shuttle or enter Zion National

You do not need a permit or reservation to visit most areas in Zion Canyon.

You do not need a permit or reservation to ride a park shuttle.

You do not need a permit or reservation to enter the park.

You do need to pay the park fee.

You do not need a permit to hike the Narrows from the Temple of Sinawava going upstream in the Virgin River.

High water may prevent travel in the Narrows, so check the park's current conditions before you start your day.

Everyone who hikes from Scout Lookout to Angels Landing needs to have a permit. Learn more about the Angels Landing Pilot Permit Program.

#### **Important Shuttle Bus Information**

The Zion Canyon Line, or park shuttle, runs from the visitor center up the Zion Canyon Scenic Drive to destinations like the Zion Lodge and trailheads, including Emerald Pools, West Rim Trail, and Temple of Sinawava, where hikers depart for the Narrows. There are two shuttle routes, and both are free. See our Park Information Guide for a map of the park shuttle.

The Springdale Shuttle, or town shuttle, is located in the Town of Springdale. It stops at 9 locations in town and picks up and drops off visitors at the park's pedestrian/bike entrance.

#### **Background**

The shuttle system was established in 2000 to eliminate traffic and parking problems, protect vegetation, and restore tranquility to Zion Canyon. In 2017, park shuttles estimated more than 6.3 million riders. In 1997, visitation was 2.4 million and increasing.

#### When The Shuttle Is In Operation

Zion Canyon Scenic Drive (the road that starts north of Canyon Junction) is closed to private vehicles when park shuttles are operating. The park is a large place; even when shuttles are running, you can drive a personal vehicle on the Zion Mt. Carmel Highway (which connects State Route 9 through the park), the Zion Mt. Carmel Tunnel, the Kolob Terrace Road, and Kolob Canyons Scenic Drive.

During most years, shuttles run:

Daily from March through November.

On weekends in February and March.

For the holiday season, near the end of December

If you want to visit the Zion Canyon Scenic

Drive without riding a shuttle, you can use a bicycle or visit during the winter. The National Park Service posts updated schedule information on this webpage every season. We also update the shuttle schedule and a map of other roads in our park information guide.

#### **How To Use The Shuttle System**

The Zion Canyon Shuttle connects the Zion Canyon Visitor Center to stops on the Zion Canyon Scenic Drive. Shuttles leave every few minutes and go either north or south. You can exit the shuttle at any open stop.

Check the map to see what to expect in the park. You may get on and off at any available shuttle stop. Most

visitors start shuttle trips at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, but if you are staying at the Zion Lodge, you can board the shuttle there. You cannot board a shuttle to go up the canyon (north) at Canyon Junction.

Read our Park Information Guide to see updated information about the open or closed stops.



If you drive to Zion, remember that National Park Service parking lots often fill early in the day. Paid Parking is available in the town of Springdale. If you leave your car in Springdale, you can ride the free Springdale Line shuttle to enter the park.

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#### THE LOCALS' GUIDE TO HIKING PREPAREDNESS

National parks are seeing an uptick in helicopters carrying unfortunate hikers out of precarious situations.

In 2017, the National Park Service reported 324 search-and-rescue operations, which means 324 extremely unpleasant vacation experiences — nearly one a day. In 2014, the reported number was almost half that. The majority of those rescues occurred in Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks, and most hikers who end up getting into trouble are either in their 20s or are older than 60.

Despite our highly skilled and dedicated rescue teams' valiant efforts, not everyone made it out of their predicaments safely. Twelve people lost their lives in Utah's national parks in 2017 alone.

It's hard to imagine one wanting a vacation amid the splendor of our national parks to involve search and rescue teams or a close encounter with death.

Zion National Park is often referred to as an outdoor Disneyland. But this is the wilderness, and it's far less forgiving than any theme park. Here are some tips for how to safely enjoy your time in Zion Canyon.

#### Bring water

You lose more water through perspiration than you realize, and if you are used to a more moist climate — and nearly any climate is less arid than southern Utah — you can become dehydrated quickly without realizing it.

The National Park Service recommends that hikers bring one gallon of water per hiker per day. There are fill stations throughout Springdale and the park that provided filtered water at no charge.

Natural water sources in the park such as creeks and streams are not reliable sources of clean drinking water. If you find yourself in a situation wherein you need water but have none, it is strongly advised that any locally-sourced water intended for consumption first be filtered, boiled for at least 10 minutes, or treated with iodine before consuming.

#### Wear appropriate clothing

While most paths and trails are well maintained, this is the great outdoors, and a little loose gravel or slickrock can lead to injury — or worse. Think of appropriate footwear as an insurance policy — and if you are a little nervous, a hiking stick never hurts. Also, dress lightly if it's going to be hot, but be sure to use appropriate sun protection like sunscreen and large-brimmed hats, because suffering from sunstroke or severe sunburn during an already taxing hike can be brutal.

#### Hike at your skill level, and don't take risks

Trails in Zion range from short and easy to long and challenging. Don't overestimate your ability and endurance level. And don't engage in horseplay or other activity that might endanger yourself or others. Some of Zion's hikes are steep, and you wouldn't be the first person to tumble down a hill — or worse, fall off a cliff. Zion is beautiful, but it's also dangerous, so respect yourself and


others by respecting the terrain.

#### Leave wildlife alone

Animals instinctively avoid humans, but the area is home to everything from poisonous snakes to mountain lions. Never approach local wildlife — and never try to feed them. This can result in injury to visitors, and numerous visitors have required stitches after attempting to hand-feed animals. But when humans feed wildlife, it's also not good for the animals, who are already best suited to feed themselves.

#### Hike sober

Sometimes relatively stationary outdoor activities like boating or camping involve enjoying an adult beverage or two. But when you're hiking the varied terrain of our national parks, you don't want your coordination, balance, or judgment to be impaired to any extent. Zion Canyon, Springdale, and Kanab are home to several fine restaurants and bars — but visit them for a cocktail after your hike, not before.



# Southern Utah State & National Parks

ANASAZI STATE PARK MUSEUM - This ancient Indian village in the heart of Utah's canyon country was one of the largest Anasazi communities west of the Colorado River. The site is believed to have been occupied from A.D. 1050 to 1200. The village remains largely unexcavated, but many artifacts have been uncovered and are on display in the newly remodeled museum. Anasazi State Park is in the picturesque town of Boulder on State Route 12. Group and individual picnic areas are available. There is no camping. (435) 335-7308.

**BAKER** - Baker Reservoir is a small lake on the Santa Clara River four miles north of Veyo on Utah State Route 18. It is a 63-acre lake with an average depth of about 20 feet. Many people come to the reservoir to camp at one of its 10 campsites and to fish. The reservoir is stocked with rainbow trout and contains brown trout, green sunfish, crayfish, redside shiner, and mountain sucker. It has picnic areas and vault toilets. There is a fee for visiting the reservoir and no boat ramp.

BRYCE CANYON - Bryce Canyon National Park is a scientist's laboratory and a child's playground. Because Bryce transcends 2,000 feet of elevation, the park exists in three distinct climatic zones: spruce/fir forest, ponderosa pine forest and pinion pine/juniper forest. This diversity of habitat provides for high biodiversity. Here at Bryce, you can enjoy over 100 species of birds, dozens of mammals, and more than a thousand plant species. (435) 834-5322.

CEDAR BREAKS - Sitting at over 10,000 feet and looking down into a half-mile deep geologic amphitheater. Come wander among timeless bristlecone pines, stand in lush meadows of wildflowers, ponder crystal-clear night skies and experience the richness of our subalpine forest. Just four miles off Utah Highway 148, you'll find the Cedar Breaks National Monument parking lot.



CORAL PINK SAND DUNES - At an elevation of 6,000 feet and 12 paved miles off U.S. Highway 89 near Kanab, this park provides a fantastic setting for camping, hiking, OHV riding or just playing in the sand. A 265-acre conservation area prohibits motorized vehicles in order to protect the Coral Pink beetle (found nowhere else in the world) and its habitat. The mule deer, jackrabbit, kit fox, coyote, and many small rodents also make the park their home. (435) 648-2800.

**DEAD HORSE POINT - Dead Horse Point State Park is** perhaps Utah's most spectacular state park. Dead Horse Point is a promontory of stone surrounded by steep cliffs near Moab. The overlook at Dead Horse Point is 6,000 feet above sea level. Two-thousand feet below, the Colorado River winds its way from the continental divide in Colorado to the Gulf of California, a distance of 1,400 miles. (435) 259-2614.

**DINOSAUR TRACKS -** The St. George Dinosaur Discovery Site at Johnson Farm is home to exceptionally well-preserved dinosaur tracks, some displaying skin impressions. These tracks, along with hundreds of fossil fish, plants, rare dinosaur remains, invertebrates' traces, and important sedimentary structures, show evidence that this site was produced along the western edge of a large, Early Jurassic (age between 195-198 million years ago) freshwater lake. (435) 574-3466.

**ENTERPRISE** - There are two reservoirs in the Bull Valley Mountains 10 miles southwest of the town of Enterprise. The main one is Upper Enterprise Reservoir, about 250 acres with an average depth of about 50 feet, while Lower Enterprise Reservoir is 79 acres. Many come to the reservoir to camp, fish hike, and boat. The Honeycomb Campground



is situated between both lakes and has 21 campsites and flush toilets. There is a boat ramp on Upper Enterprise Reservoir and several fishing areas around both reservoirs. Fishermen will find rainbow trout and smallmouth bass here. Fees are charged.

FOUR CORNERS - The Four Corners is the only place in the U.S. where four states come together at one place: Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Colorado. Here, a person can put each of their hands and feet in four states at the same time. The unique landmark is on Navajo Nation land and is open for visits from the public. West of U.S. Highway 160, 40 miles southwest of Cortez, Colo. (928) 871-6436.

**GRAND CANYON -** A World Heritage Site encompassing 1,218,375 acres on the Colorado Plateau in northwestern Arizona. The land is semi-arid and consists of raised plateaus and structural basins typical of the southwestern United States. (928) 638-7888.

STAIRCASE-ESCALANTE NATIONAL MONUMENT - Nearly 1.9 million acres of America's public lands and located between Bryce Canyon and Glen Canyon Recreational Areas. From its namesake Grand Staircase of cliffs and terraces across the rugged Kaiparowits Plateau to the beauty of the Escalante River Canyons, the Monument's size, resources, and isolated location provide amazing opportunities.

GUNLOCK - In scenic red rock country, 15 miles northwest of St. George, lies the 240-acre Gunlock State Park and Reservoir where year-round boating, water sports, and quality fishing for bass and catfish attract visitors. Facilities include boat launching ramp and pit privies. (435) 628-2255.

LAKE MEAD - Lake Mead National Recreation Area offers a wealth of things to do and places to go year-round. Its huge lakes cater to boaters, swimmers, sunbathers and fishermen, while its desert rewards hikers, wildlife photographers, and roadside sightseers. It is also home to thousands of desert plants and animals adapted to survive in an extreme place where rain is scarce and temperatures soar. (702) 293-8990.

LAKE POWELL - In Glen Canyon National Recreation Area is one of the world's great places for houseboating! The 186-mile-long lake offers sandy beaches, cool blue water, and exceptional red-rock scenery. It is excellent for boating, skiing, kayaking, and fishing. Boat or hike to Rainbow Bridge, or explore any of its many canyons or sand dunes. (928) 608-6200.

PINE VALLEY - Pine Valley Reservoir is a beautiful place for fishermen to fish brook trout and rainbow trout. The reservoir is near the Pine Valley Recreation Complex, which has over 150 campsites with picnic and restroom facilities. This area is greener than most other parts of southwestern Utah with pine and pinion trees, and many come to enjoy camping and hiking. It is west of the town of Central. (435) 652-3100.

QUAIL LAKE - Quail Creek State Park provides excellent year-round camping, picnicking, boating, and trout and bass fishing in sunny southwest Utah. The park is three miles east of the Interstate 15 Hurricane exit on Utah State Route 9. Facilities include 23 campsites, modern restrooms, a fish cleaning station, and two covered group-use pavilions. (435) 879-2378.

SAND HOLLOW - Looking to fish? Swim? Ride your ATV in the sand? Do all that and more at Sand Hollow State Park, located between St. George and Hurricane. Bring your boat, a picnic, and some fishing gear for a fun day on the reservoir, or watch the kids swim while you relax on the beach. Load up your RV or tent and settle in for a nice campout, or ride your ATV in the dunes of Sand Mountain. (435) 680-0715.



**SNOW CANYON -** Named after early Utah leaders Lorenzo and Erastus Snow, Snow Canyon State Park begins just outside of Ivins and stretches northward. Spectacular scenery includes towering red and white sandstone cliffs, black lava formations, and even a waterfall that appears during heavy rain. Snow Canyon offers 16 miles of hiking trails, beautiful sand dunes, technical rock climbing sites, horseback riding, year-round camping, nature studies, and wildlife viewing. This park is a favorite for locals and visitors alike. (435) 628-2255.


**ZION** - With breathtaking views, numerous hiking attractions of all difficulty levels and some of the most spectacular scenery on earth, Zion National Park and its surrounding areas attract thousands of visitors every year. 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# Less-Traveled Zion Hikes

Hiking is popular in Zion National Park, and popular hikes are seeing record visitation at peak days and times. For a less congested trek, consider these lesstraveled hikes.

#### **Northgate Peaks**

The Northgate Peaks trail in the Kolob Terrace section of Zion National Park is an amazing trail with spectacular views. The trail itself is nearly flat, making it a perfect hike for families.

To reach the Northgate Peaks trailhead, take State Route 9 to the town of Virgin. Turn left onto Kolob Terrace Road. Drive for 15.7 miles through increasingly spectacular country until the short spur road (on the right) for the Wildcat Trailhead is reached. Drive a few hundred feet to the large parking area.

The trail heads east across grassy plains and stands of Ponderosa Pine with dynamite views of the towering Pine Valley Peak to the west. Soon the trail will be fully in the forest with limited views. After 0.9 miles, the junction with the Hop Valley trail is reached. Continue east, and 0.1 miles further, the junction with the Northgate Peaks Trail is reached. Head south on this trail for another 1.1 miles until the end of the official trail is reached at a rocky basalt bluff with epic views of the Northgate Peaks to the east and west and of North Guardian Angel

For families with young children, this makes an excellent turnaround spot.

#### Gifford Canyon

Gifford Canyon offers a nice stroll through a sandy wash and is very charming when water is running. This hike is nearly 3 miles long and will take about 2 hours to finish.

To start this hike, park in the lot located immediately east of the Zion/ Mt. Carmel Tunnel. The trail begins at the backside of the restrooms at the back of the parking lot. There will be a steep, sandy path to climb down before you enter Pine Creek slot. Follow the path upstream for almost 75 feet, and look for a 15-foot wall of slickrock. You can scramble up the rock or look for the beaten path on the backside of the rock.

On top of this wall is a narrow dirt path that is crowded by rock and vegetation. It winds around the mountain to a dead end with a beautiful view of the mountain where the Canyon Overlook Trail is located, opposite is Gifford Canyon.

The path will lead past stone bridge and to another minor slickrock climb. At the end of the canyon, there is a circle of cliffs preventing further exploration without climbing up the sandstone.

#### **Chinle Trail**

Chinle Trail is an off-the-beatenpath trail located in the lower elevation west desert wilderness area, offering wide vistas, desert landscapes, and a reprieve from the more touristy trails in the park. Though it's a long trail, it's a mellow hike that can be cut off whenever you feel like turning around. It's a great hike with kids because it's not treacherous, slippery, or steep. Avoid it after snow or rain as it will be muddy.

The Chinle Trailhead starts outside of Zion, south of Springdale. If you are coming from St. George, the turn is about a block before you hit the apple orchard and stand as you leave Rockville off of State Route 9. There is a parking area off the right of Anasazi Way near the Anasazi Plateau housing development. If you hit houses, you missed it. And yes, the trail starts below the housing development and takes you right through it. Don't worry though, it doesn't last

Shortly after you get through the housing development, you will hit a sign letting you know you are entering the Zion Wilderness. At this point, you can breathe a sigh of relief, because you have gotten away from civilization to enjoy nature, and chances are that you won't see another soul until you return to your

#### **Many Pools - Temporarily Closed**

The route is moderate with a gentle uphill climb to an alcove, but plan for a strenuous hike if you continue to the East Rim.

The route begins right off the highway. Drive to the pullout near the second drainage on the north side of the State Route 9, about 0.8 miles after the smaller tunnel. Walk carefully along the road about 150 yards and drop down into a sandy bowl on the north side of SR-9. There is a trail for a short distance, and then the sand turns into large flat stones that you can pick and choose to walk on, depending on your sense of balance. A short distance off the road, filled pools carved into the rocks appear. Ponderosa Pines and Juniper trees twisted by the wind are a good backdrop to the reds and whites ribboned through the rocks.

#### **Overlook Trail**

The Overlook Trail is a short, beautiful hike located on the east side of Zion National Park, just outside the Mt. Carmel tunnel. The hike is about one mile roundtrip, and it usually takes people about an hour. It is definitely one of the easier hikes in Zion, but it's still considered a moderate-level hike due to a few exposed areas and sandstone pathways, which can be slippery.

The Overlook trailhead lies right outside of the Mt. Carmel tunnel by the ranger booth. Exit the tunnel too quickly and you'll miss it.

It begins with a staircase carved out of the sandstone leading up and away from the road. Soon, you'll be walking along the side of the mountain and looking down into a thin crevice known as Pine Creek Canyon. At about halfway, you'll walk across a bridge that wraps around a corner and leads to an area of recessed rock wet with the moisture that caused it to erode and be filled with ferns growing out of the sandstone.

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
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# Popular Zion Hikes

Trail Closures (as of Nov. 2022)

Hidden Canyon Trail, Watchman

Trail, and Emerald Pools (all routes).

Some of these closures are temporary.

Warning: These hikes are very popular and often overcrowded. While they are well worth doing, expect them to be a little congested.

If you are feeling up to some of the more difficult hikes, try some of these popular hikes.

#### Angels Landing via West Rim Trail

Possibly the most popular hike in Zion, Angels Landing takes around four hours to complete, covers just under 5 1/2 miles, and requires a permit to hike. As you work your way up the 1,488-foot change in elevation, you'll want to look out for long drop-offs. This hike is not for young children or people with a fear of heights. Be sure to enjoy, but be careful along the last section of the hike, which is a steep, narrow ridge to the summit. The hike starts at The Grotto.

#### Observation Point via East Rim Trail

This hike climbs through Echo Canyon to a viewpoint of Zion Canyon and offers access to Cable Mountain, Deertrap, and East Mesa trails. Plan for at least half of a day as this hike takes around five hours to complete and stretches over 8 miles. The 2,148-foot change in elevation from start to finish has long drop-offs, so be careful. Like Hidden Canyon Trail, this hike starts at Weeping Rock.

#### The Narrows via Riverside Walk

A full-day hike at 8 hours, the Narrows can pose extra dangers depending on the weather. High water levels can prevent access to the Narrows, so be sure to check with the visitor center before beginning this 9 1/2-mile hike. You'll start this hike at Temple of Sinawaya.

#### Kolob Arch via La Verkin Creek Trail

Getting to Kolob Arch via the La Verkin Creek Trail follows Timber and La Verkin creeks and connects to the trail to Kolob Arch, one of the world's largest freestanding arches. A full-day hike, it will take around 8 hours to finish the 14-fourteen mile trip. This hike starts at Kolob Canyons Road.

If you are looking for something more moderate, try some of these midrange hikes.

#### Watchman Trial - Temporarily Closed

Starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this hike takes about two hours and covers just under 3 miles. The 368-foot elevation has some minor drop-offs and ends at a view point for Tower of the Virgin, lower Zion Canyon, and Springdale.

#### Middle Emerald Pools Trail -Temporarily Closed Due To Falling Ice

A two-hour hike, Middle Emerald Pools has long drop-offs. The unpaved trail to the Middle Emerald Pools has loose sand and slippery rocks. You'll cover two miles in 2 hours over the course of a 150-foot elevation gain. The hike starts at Zion Lodge.

#### Upper Emerald Pool Trail -Temporarily Closed Due To Falling Ice

Starting at Zion Lodge, this is a shorter trail covering one mile in about an hour. You will rise 200-feet in elevation, and there are minor drop-offs.

#### Kayenta Trail

This two-hour hike starts at the Grotto and goes for two miles. You'll gain 150 feet in elevation, and the trail does have long drop-offs. This unpaved climb connects the Grotto to the Emerald Pools trails.

#### Canyon Overlook Trail

Starting at Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, this one-hour hike provides a 163-foot gain in elevation over the course of a mile. This rocky and uneven trail ends at a viewpoint for Pine Creek Canyon and lower Zion Canyon. While this trail is mostly fenced, there are long drop-offs.

#### **Taylor Creek Trail**

You'll begin this five-mile hike at Kolob Canyons Road. It should take around 4 hours to complete and provides a 450-foot gain in elevation. Larger groups may need to split up, as this hike limits 12 people to a group. It follows the Middle Fork of Taylor Creek past two homestead cabins to Double Arch Alcove.

#### **Timber Creek Overlook Trail**

A quick hike, the Timber Creek Overlook Trail covers just one mile and 100 feet in elevation gain. It can be done in about 30 minutes. The trail follows a ridge to a small peak with views of Timber Creek, Kolob Terrace, and Pine Valley Mountains.

Those looking for something less strenuous should check out these easy bikes

#### Pa'rus Trail

Starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this two-hour hike covers 3 1/2 miles and rises 50 feet in elevation. A paved trail that follows the Virgin River from the South Campground to Canyon Junction, Pa'rus Trail is wheelchair accessible and is open to both bicycles and dogs.

#### **Archeology Trail**

Also starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this short half-hour hike covers just under half a mile and rises 80 feet in elevation, making it a short but steep trail. This trail offers trailside exhibits and views of several prehistoric buildings.

#### **Grotto Trail**


Starting at Zion Lodge or the Grotto, this trail connects the two locations and can be combined with the Middle Emerald Pools and Kayenta trails to create a 2 1/2-mile loop. The non-loop version should take about 30 minutes and rises 35 feet over one mile.

#### Riverside Walk

Starting at Temple of Sinawava, this 1 1/2-hour hike cover just over two miles and rises 57 feet in elevation. While it is wheelchair accessable, there are minor drop-offs. The trail, which is paved, offers trailside exhibits as it follows the Virgin Rivet along the bottom of a narrow canyon.

#### Lower Emerald Pool Trail - Temporarily Closed Due To Falling Ice


This paved trail leads to the Lower Emerald Pool and waterfalls. It also connects to the Middle Emerald Pools Trail. It should take about an hour and covers just over one mile with 69 feet in elevation gain.



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
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
