


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

#### **EDITOR'S LETTER** By James McFadden



Stop Running Red Lights!

In an article I wrote back in May 2022, I shared some thoughts and photos of an accident I was first on the scene for, at the intersection of Mall Drive and Red

Cliffs Drive. It was a pretty scary scenario that continues to be played out over and over here in southern Utah and that needs to change!

First, let's examine the definition of an accident. An accident is an unfortunate

incident that happens unexpectedly and unintentionally, typically resulting in damage or injury. The National Safety Council's definition of a preventable accident is - An accident in which the driver failed to do everything reasonable to prevent it.

In 2022, more than 46,000 people lost their lives in a preventable traffic crash. That's more than 46,000 people who didn't make it home to their families and loved ones in 2022. According to a study



by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), an estimated 94% of motor vehicle accidents were caused by driver error. As it stands today, over two million people are hurt in traffic accidents every year.

If, in writing this, I can help a small handful of people think twice before trying to run a red light because they're in a hurry or frustrated with other drivers, it just might save a life. So, every now and then, I'm going to do just that. Remind everyone to slow the hell down and take a chill pill. Life is too short to lose it behind the wheel of your car; the bottom line is this... If we don't get this behavior under control, people are going to continue to senselessly lose their lives to ignorance, arrogance, and blatant disregard for human safety.

So the next time you find yourself falling into this trap as others are disregarding the safety of others ahead of you, I would implore you to slow down and do the right thing. If you do, the life you save might be mine or someone I love.

# HURRICANE THEATRICAL'S JOSEPH IS A 'WALKING WORK OF ART'

April 5 through May 11, 2024.

With the reviving colors of spring, Hurricane Theatrical presents the vibrant colors of "Red and yellow and green and brown and scarlet and black and . . ." you have probably guessed it by now: Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat! Director Kyle Myrick continues to bring family favorites to life in Southern Utah, and there are no complaints about that!

Shifting from the rough and tough New York *Newsies* streets of 1899, we find ourselves in Canaan, "Way, way back, many centuries ago. Not long after the Bible began". There, we meet "Jacob and Sons", but our primary focus is on 'Joseph, Jacob's favorite son.' Due to being their

father's obvious favorite (and possibly God's, too?), the jealousy of Joseph's 11 brothers reaches a boiling point as they attempt to kill him but then decide to sell him into slavery. Through a myriad of trials and rock bottoms, Joseph finds himself (and his family) immeasurably blessed in the end.

Like many Utahns, leading man James David claims, "Joseph was my very first musical theatre experience. I played trombone in a pit orchestra for a production of Joseph [five years previously] . . . It feels like a full circle moment for me as I look back on my pit orchestra experience." The story of Joseph and his brothers also has a full-circle effect in and of itself. Cast member Eric Humphries, who plays Joseph's brother Dan and sings "Benjamin"

Calypso", explains despite the lighthearted tune and silly lyrics, the song shows a reversal of the situation of the brothers. The catalyst for the whole story is the selfishness of the brothers in condemning Joseph, to demonstrating their selflessness to save Benjamin.

It's no secret that Joseph is a musi-

cal theater favorite, particularly in Utah, and a few cast members of Hurricane Theatrical's production have a few ideas as to why. Reese Jacobsen, who's no stranger to Hurricane Theatrical's stage, having played SpongeBob SquarePants in *The SpongeBob Musical* and Terk in Disney's *Tarzan* and currently portrays Joseph's brother Naphtali, exclaims that for this classic and much-beloved show, any role was an opportunity that could not be passed up. David exclaims that the story of Joseph "is very inspiring and is a reminder that good things will happen in our darkest moments." A truly immortal story and

# WINE MAKING REFINED IN SOUTHERN UTAH

Zion Vineyards in April is the time to release new wines! We have five new varietals to Taste: a Red Blend, a Field Blend, a Zinfandel, and two new Reserve wines.

Our Due Amici (Two Friends in Italian) this is an enticing blend of Zinfandel and Primitivo, with candied fruitiness and notes of blueberry, jam, and cherries with hints of black pepper and spice. This pairs with anything Red Sauce, Bolognaise, or Lasagna. The Primitivo and Zinfandel grapes are genetically identical, like twins growing up in separate states. Originating in Croatia, and called Crljenak Kaštelanski or Tribidrag (Early to ripen). It was then cultivated in Italy and called Primitivo (First to ripen in Latin).

Then, in the 1820s, a gardener in Boston requested seeds from the Vienna Seed Vault Company in Austria that yielded a dark red, full-bodied wine that ripened quickly since he had a short growing season. They sent him Zinfanlanduer, he changed the name to Zinfandel, and the rest is history. Immigrants took grafting and clippings to California, where Zinfandel is found all over the state.

The Miscela Di Campo (Italian for Blend of the Land, now our Field Blend) A blend of grapes that were picked after the end of Harvest. During Harvest some fruit may be left on the vine, because at the time of Harvest they weren't ripe. These are combined crushed and fermented together. Exploding with flavors of dark fruit, blackberry, cassis, plums with a velvety finish

with a hint of chocolate. This Pairs well with Beef Stews, Roasted Vegetables, and Pork Tenderloin.

The Tempranillo Reserve 2022 is dry and full-bodied, with notes of Red and Bing cherry, aged in a New Oak Barrel for toasty oak and smoke. It pairs with any Steak with a bit of spice, such as a Southwest Chili-rubbed Ribeye.

Our Petit Sirah Reserve 2022 is dark purple, deep garnet in color, with firm tannins. It has flavors of blackberry and plum, notes of cocoa, and earthy elements. It is a complex wine with well-developed layers of flavor. It pairs well with Osso Bucco or a New York Strip with a Blackberry Reduction.

Carmel area, to be exhibited at the Kanab City Library, and a combination of photography, paintings and fabric art at the hospital lobby.

At the Kanab City Library, we are featuring artworks from the Fredonia-Moccasin Unified School District #6's students, namely, Nathan Ashley (grade 6), Paris Bistline (grade 6), Carrson Cluff (grade 6), Ashor Kilgore (grade 6), Zoey Smith (grade 6), Tren Allen (grade 6), Taelynn Henderson (grade 9), Nicholas Black (grade 10), LeAnn Smith (grade 11), and Danailee Tait (grade 12).



From Kanab Elementary school, we have artworks from Henry Burggraaf (grade 2), Isaac Burggraaf (grade 4) and Max Burggraaf (grade 6). From Kanab High School, we have a collection of works from Makayla Bartlett, an avid artist who works on miniatures, paintings and drawings. Also from Kanab, we have Ivy Burggraaf (Preschool with Miss Elyse), and a small collection of works by Lily Lacey (grade 2) from Valley Elementary.

Inside the Kane County Hospital lobby, our first artist is Erica Berg who has been captivated by photography ever since she was young. Her passion lies in capturing the joyful moments of animals, as well as the breathtaking details of nature as viewed through a macro lens. Her work aims to ignite a sense of wonder, encouraging viewers to see beauty in unexpected places.



Second, we have Loretta Clayson who studied with watercolor artist LaRee Bell. and wildlife artist Julie Jeppsen. She is a member of the Utah Watercolor Society and Women Out West Professional Artists of Utah. Loretta's artwork has been exhibited at Roland Lee Art Gallery, Sears Art Museum, Springville Museum of Art, St. George Art Museum, one-woman shows during Western Legends Festivals in Kanah and various locations with the Utah Watercolor Society. Her illustrations also include award-winning activity books commissioned by The StoryTeller Company. Loretta invites viewers to find a connection with the extraordinary natural beauty of southern Utah and the legacy left by ordinary, hardworking people that she enjoys capturing in watercolor.

Our third artist is sky photographer



Marty Feely. In the 1990s, Marty ran Whirlwind Tours, the world's first storm chaser tour company which was featured on various television documentaries. Marty's storm and tornado photography and cinematography were included in many of those programs and jump-started his passion for filming dramatic skies. In 2004, he worked as a park ranger for BLM at the Visitor Centers at Paria and the Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument. There, he realized that he was in the middle of the most spectacular landscapes he'd ever seen. This caused his photographic passion to switch from landscapes to the skies. These days, Marty says he does not chase tornadoes anymore, but he always keeps a "go bag" ready for the promise of a rainbow.

Fourth in this quarter's line-up is Holly Adams-Godwin, a Utah native who was born into a talented family. Throughout her life, Holly has been immersed in art from embroidery, quilting, basket weaving, wood working, stained glass and now in her retirement, painting. She also learned to spin her own wool from which she made her own wearable items. She taught this craft to others through demonstrations in county fairs and volunteer programs at her local museum. While she lived in Las Cruces, New Mexico, she designed a quilt out of neckties, entitled it "Necktie Starburst" and won Best of Show in the Annual Las Colcheras Quilt Guild's 7th Annual Quilt Show. She moved to Kanab in 2013 and has been concentrating on painting more since then. Her work can be seen at the Brown Box Bakeshop, and she also sells her works at Lily Pad. She loves to paint ravens, foxes, and more recently because of their 4-wheeling hobby, the beautiful landscapes of Kanab.

Fifth, we have Megan Heydorn, the fiber artist behind Meg's Twisted Stitches. Megan's maternal grandmother tried to teach her how to crochet when she was younger, but it didn't spark her interest. It wasn't until 2016, when her cousin became pregnant with her second baby, and also when Megan spotted a cute, stuffed, crocheted cow animal kit in a craft catalog that her interest was piqued. She decided she wanted to make that adorable, puppy-eyed cow for her future niece. The kits were sold out so she bought materials and found a beginner series on YouTube to learn. When her niece was born, she gifted her the first project she finished – a newborn hat which fit her niece perfectly! From that love of a tiny tot in her handmade tiny hat, she proceeded to learn amigurumi, the Japanese art of knitting or crocheting stuffed yarn creatures. A couple of years later, she started selling the plushies she made. # CONTROVERSY BUT NO SURPRISES: UTAH LEGISLATURE 2024

Surprises are limited by legislators' extensive preparatory groundwork accomplished ahead of Utah legislative sessions since those sessions are constitutionally limited to 45 days. Hence even controversial bills

get what appears to this outsider as being steamrolled through to approval during the session itself, having been vetted in advance by the Republican majority.

Utah's majority-Republican voters elected an even more Republican-majority legislature. On top of that, a Republican governor is seeking reelection this year and anxious to prove his conservative bona fides after some missteps earlier in his first term. The results were largely satisfying to both fiscal and social conservatives.

Right out of the chute, the legislature passed what was termed the "bathroom" bill. HB257 changed the legal definitions of "female" and "male" to categorize Utahns by their reproductive organs at birth. With that definition, the law requires people to use sex-designated locker rooms, showers and changing spaces in government buildings that align with their assigned gender.

To this observer, the law protects women and girls – over half our state's population – from sharing facilities with the very small minority of biological men with male genitalia who see themselves as females. Pres. Biden, desperate to motivate his progressive base, calls laws like this one transgender discrimination and "the civil rights issue of our time." To me, it's only common sense.

Targeting another divisive progressive political issue early in the session, law-makers passed HB261. The law dismantles diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) offices and programs at Utah's colleges and universities and in state and local governments. It also prohibits certain types of diversity training.

I hope it puts an end to mandatory DEI training at our public colleges like Utah State's "Decentering Whiteness" and the University of Utah's discriminatory hiring practices that require applicants for faculty positions to demonstrate commitment to DEI principles and practices. DEI as it's been implemented is nothing less than a progressive political agenda item.

Another hot button topic got the legislators' attention: "inappropriate" (pornographic) books in public school libraries.

HB29 allows for a single book to be removed from all Utah public schools if at least three school districts — or two school districts and five charter schools — determine that the book contains "objective

draconian.

Less controversial and more widely acceptable things got done. Income taxes were cut (a little), public school funding was increased, and vote-by-mail was retained over the objections of a few legislators.

A practice I oppose – public funding of professional sports stadiums – was approved if Major League Baseball and/ or the National Hockey League approve expansion or transfer franchises for Salt Lake City. Fortunately, the taxes needed to build these palaces would be levied only locally in the Salt Lake area. My long-standing opposition to this practice can be summed up in a single sentence. Why should your widowed grandmother living

in the area be required to fund professional sports?

The facilities would be funded with tax-exempt municipal bonds paid off by all citizens in the designated areas. They would primarily benefit very wealthy team owners and their highly-paid athletes, generate surprisingly few local jobs and charge outrageously high ticket prices that only the well -off can afford including businesses that buy tax-deductible private boxes to entertain clients. Your tax dollars at work.

In the eyes of their supporters, professional sports teams are an ego thing that shows the city and state have achieved major league status. I can do without the ego boost.

I was disappointed that SB226 fell short this year. It proposed requiring a public college undergraduate core composed of classes in western civilization, American history and government, and rigorous math and science coursework. Jesse Jackson led a 1987 protest at Stanford that led to those courses being dumped nationwide in following years in favor of works on race, class, and gender written by ethnic minority and female authors. It's time discard faux history and progressive political indoctrination and get back to real scholarship and learning. The bill is likely to be revived next session.

One small bit of legislation has a direct and favorable impact on me: front license plates will no longer be required starting in 2025. Car washes have wreaked havoc on my front plates for years.

Summing up: I'll take what we got. Thanks to our lawmakers for the time and effort they put into making Utah a great place to live.


sensitive material." That includes anything considered pornographic or otherwise indecent that does not have "literary, artistic, political or scientific value for minors," as currently outlined by Utah law.

A dissenting legislator said she didn't oppose the bill because she wants porn in classrooms but because the bill goes too far in preventing students from accessing materials on uncomfortable but real-life events such as rape or incest. But that, of course, is the crux of the issue: who decides what's "uncomfortable but real-life" while less than pornographic?

I'm uncertain about the method the lawmakers chose to identify offending books but at least they didn't try to make those thorny decisions themselves. My hypothetical concern: three rural, very socially conservative school districts decide to eliminate a certain book. The rest of the state is obliged to go along. Seems a little

#### QUAIL CANYON (AKA FOSSIL CANYON) ON THE ARIZONA STRIP

#### **By Tom Garrison**

Location: Quail Canyon (aka Fossil Canyon) is located in the Arizona Strip about eight miles south of St. George, Utah. There is no entrance fee an no permit is necessary. It is managed by the Bureau of Land Management.

**Difficulty:** Some moderately strenuous rock scrambling in Quail Canyon on an otherwise easy hike.

**Average Hiking Time:** About two hours at a leisurely pace with many stops.

**Elevations:** Approximately 3,990 feet trailhead elevation with about a 200 feet elevation change from the lowest to highest point.

Family Friendly: Yes, although some of the rock scrambling in Quail Canyon might be difficult for young children.

Getting There: From St. George take River Road south which becomes a dirt road, Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Road 1069, as you cross into Arizona. Follow BLM Road 1069, it is a good dirt road that spools out ahead of you to the horizon. At 7.5 miles from the Arizona border, on your right, is an unsigned dirt road with a steel cable attached to two metal poles stretched across it. Turn right here down a slight slope and park near the blocking cable. This is the trailhead and parking area which has space for about five cars.

You can also reach the site by traveling south on Interstate 15 to the Southern Parkway exit (Exit 2). Take Exit 2, go east three miles, and exit (Exit 3) onto River Road going south. Then follow the above directions from there.



Need a new hiking adventure? Maybe something a bit different from the admittedly wonderful red sandstone of southwest Utah? How about an isolated dark-hued narrow canyon layered with fossils and located in northwestern Arizona. And it is less than eight miles from St. George. Your destination, as it was ours, is Quail Canyon, often referred to as Fossil Canyon. If you want an easy hike, with some fairly strenuous rock scrambling in the canyon, give this three mile round trip adventure a try.

We, my wife Deb and I, began our expedition on a mild Thursday morning in mid-March. We reached the trailhead about 10:30 am with the temperature in the mid-50's under a blue Arizona sky. The trailhead elevation is 3,990 feet with an approximately 200 feet elevation change from the lowest to highest point.

We parked near the steel cable and headed north on the dirt road that is blocked by the cable. The road quickly turned, and we went west. It is a wide dirt road crossing some small hills. After approximately ¾ of a mile of uneventful walking, we came to a corral and two large water tanks. After exploring a bit, we followed a trail marking sign and went left (south) around the water tank and through a green metal gate. Remember to close and latch the gate after you pass through.

We followed the trail, situated above the dry canyon wash, a couple of hundred yards. The route descends into the wash and we entered the mouth of Quail Canyon.

At the mouth of the canyon the walls are blackish and a kind of dirty white color.

This color scheme continued throughout our trek up the canyon. As with many canyons, the distance between walls varied as we walked deeper into the gorge—sometimes ten feet separating the walls, sometimes 50 feet. Also like many canyons Quail Canyon is serpentine. Go around one bend and there is another. One interesting feature were a couple of sections of "subway" canyon. The bottom of the canyon walls was eroded in a circular fashion, like a subway tunnel. If you have seen photos of or hiked The Subway Trail in Zion National Park, these sections looked similar.



We began looking for fossils as we entered the canyon. There were many embedded in the whiteish rocks. Almost all were small and indistinct. We just looked and did not take any.

I know visitors to this canyon will be tempted to take home a few fossils they find in the rocks or chip out of the walls. Here is what the BLM says about collecting fossils:

Only researchers operating under a BLM permit are allowed to collect vertebrate fossils such as dinosaurs, mammals, fish and reptiles as well as uncommon invertebrate or plant fossils.

You may collect reasonable quantities of common invertebrate fossils such as mollusks, and trilobites, but this must be for personal use, and the fossils may not be bartered or sold.

So, if you happen to find a tyrannosaurus or woolly mammoth fossil, leave it and alert the BLM office.

Overall, the hike up the canyon is easy, if you ignore the three or four rock obstacles. Scrambling over these is a bit of a challenge if you are in your '70s as are we. We helped each other and closely looked for the best way to climb an eight foot dry fall with small hand and foot holds. We made it, so can you.

About ½ mile in the canyon, we scampered over another obstacle and above it the canyon widened. After another ¼ mile or so, we came to what was for us, the end. There was an almost vertical 25 feet rock wall lacking good hand and foot holds. There was, however, a rope hanging down from the top. No way were we trusting a rope that might have been there for years. And no way we could climb the rock wall without using the rope. And, just our luck, we forgot to bring our sticky fingers Spiderman gloves with which we could have easily scampered up the dry fall.

We turned around and headed downstream. During the hike we saw a couple of birds of prey, but no other animals. We returned to the trailhead about two hours after we left—pretty slow for this hike

This was an odd hike. As we began the hike, three ATVs pulled into the trailhead parking area. We went back a bit and talked to the people—seven men and women in our age bracket ('60's and '70's). They all knew each other, were friends, and lived in the St. George area. It is very unusual to have nine people (counting me and Deb), especially older ones, do a remote hike in the Arizona Strip on a Thursday morning. Plus, the two groups, Deb and I and the other seven, arrived at the trailhead about the same time. We expected to not see another person on this isolated hike. Fortunately, the other folks quickly became our new best friends, and we did the hike as one large group.



If you want to explore an isolated darkish canyon with many small fossils embedded in the rock, try Quail Canyon. I doubt if you will experience the "mob" scene that we did. You will probably hike alone.

The 2024 Desertscape International Film Festival has come to a close, and after the dust has settled, the 6-year fest showcased over 40 films from around the world, shorts and features, to passionate film fans.

#### THELMA

Mark my words; You will find few 2024 films as charming, as entertaining, and as downright adorable as Josh Margolin's wonderful ode to grandmas, "Thelma." Featuring a delightful June Squibb in the title role, this golden years-inspired action movie finds an elderly woman taking matters into her own hands after falling prey to a dastardly telephone scammer. Ultimately, Thelma teams with an old friend (played by the late, great Richard Roundtree) and heads out on a dangerous Tom Cruise-level mission all in an effort to get back what is rightfully hers. This irresistible movie also features a warm and undeniably affable performance by Fred Hechinger as Thelma's adoring grandson. Back when "Thelma" made its debut at the 2024 Sundance Film Festival earlier this year, Margolin was quick to point out that watching your elderly grandmother make her way up a flight of stairs can be every bit as terrifying and intense as watching Tom Cruise dangle from a building several stories up, and he perfectly captures this sense of danger throughout this crowd-pleasing gem. At the very least, if the enthusiastic reaction from a sold out crowd at a recent Desertscape International screening was any indication, action has a brand new name...And it's June Squibb! #### BREAKUP SEASON

One of the most magical events at DIFF 2024 was the world premiere

Walking Dead" fame) and his twenty-something girlfriend Cassie (Samantha Isler of "Molly's Game") at a crossroads in their relationship while visiting his family in his rural Oregon hometown during a turbulent Christmas break. What could have easily descended into cheesy Hallmark Christmas movie of the week territory gradually transforms into an honest, authentic, and often heartbreaking movie about the messiness that can sometimes come with relationships. Isler brings real emotional weight to this film and she's beautifully complimented by a wonderful supporting cast that includes the likes of Riggs, James Urbaniak ("Oppenheimer"), Jacob Wysocki ("Terri"), and relative newcomers Carly Stewart and Brook Hogan. Kudos to Tracey



for resisting the urge to go the on-the-nose route with this most thoughtful relationship movie. It definitely goes in directions you won't be anticipating and it all culminates in an ending that is as poignant as it is unexpected. This film is more in the tradition of bittersweet relationship movies like "(500) Days of Summer." This is to say that "Breakup Season" is hardly your quintessential romantic comedy and it is all the stronger for it. Tracey and his cast and crew were on hand for the screening and that only added to the magic of the proceedings. "Breakup Season" hasn't locked in a distributor yet but I have no doubt that that's going to change once it starts making the rounds on the festival circuit.

#### HE NEVER LEFT

DIFF 2024 screened "He Never Left" as part of its increasingly popular After Dark category and in short, the late night crowd ate it up! This spin on slasher films comes to us courtesy of "Witching Season" founders James Morris and Michael Ballif. This thriller finds a town gripped by fear thanks to an urban legend revolving around an infamous masked killer known at "Pale Face." But rather than jumping on the slasher bandwagon, "He Never Left" goes in an entirely different direction. Instead of taking all of its time building up the Pale Man mythos, this film opts to zero



in on fugitive Gabriel (ferociously played by an undeniably charismatic Colin Cunningham of "Falling Skies" fame) and his complicated relationship with conflicted girlfriend Carly (wonderfully played by Jessica Staples.) A great deal of the movie stays on Gabriel as he barricades himself in a run-down motel waiting for the right time to flee. Of course, what he and Carly don't realize is that there might be something sinister going on in this particular hotel. With odes to works of John Carpenter with a dash of Alfred Hitchcock's "Psycho" thrown in for good measure, "He Never Left" gets a hell of a lot of mileage out of its lead players. Further still, this whole film smacks of Halloween spirit and that's because Morris and Ballif are incredibly fond of the witching season in every sense of the term. This is the second feature from Ballif and Morris, and while I prefer the story at the heart of their debut, "They Live Inside Us," "He Never Left" certainly has a pair of charismatic leads in Cunningham and Staples. It's also the perfect movie for the midnight crowd. This is more than obvious given the reaction it received at the DIFF 2024 screening. "He Never Left" has yet to acquire distribution but its multiple wins on the film festival circuit suggest that it's only a matter of time before this one gets released!

#### Safety Tips For Zion

#### **Emergencies**

For 24-hour emergency response, call 911 or (435) 772-3322. The Zion Canyon Medical Clinic is located in Springdale near the south entrance to the park. For hours, please call (435) 772-3226. Other medical clinics are located in Hurricane. The nearest hospitals are in St. George, Cedar City, and Kanab.

#### Hydrate and use refillable water bottles

It is easy to get dehydrated while hiking and walking in the desert, so pack along extra water, and be sure to take rest and water breaks on long hikes. There are a number of places to refill your water bottles in Zion National Park

including the visitors' center and Zion Lodge as well as a new hydration station at the Springdale bus stop in front of The Bumbleberry Inn and Zion Canyon Brew Pub.

#### Be cautious near steep cliffs

Falls from cliffs on trails can result in death. Loose sand or pebbles on stone are very slippery. Be careful of edges when using cameras or binoculars. Never throw or roll rocks because there may be hikers below you. Stay on the trail. Stay back from cliff edges. Observe posted warnings. Please watch children.

#### Watch for flash floods

All narrow canyons are potentially hazardous. Flash floods, often caused by storms miles away, are a real danger and can be life threatening. You are assuming a risk when entering a narrow canyon. Your safety is your responsibility.

#### Tips To Minimize Your Impact

#### Pack it in, pack it out & use recycling bins

Each month, Zion National Park pays many thousands of dollars to haul away waste collected from garbage cans and recycling bins. Your experience and that of everyone who visits Zion Canyon can be improved by never littering and making sure you pick up any trash you see along the way. Recycling bins are placed strategically throughout Zion Park, and it is highly encouraged for everyone to use them.



#### Please stay on the marked trails

Hiking off trails can lead to loss of vegetation, soil compaction, erosion, and unsightly scars on the landscape. Remember, if you bring it in, please pack it out.

#### Go before you go

It is always a good idea to use the restroom before you begin a hike since facilities are limited to select locations. If you do need to take care of your business, please pack it back out.

#### Be respectful to the wildlife

Feeding, harming, or capturing wild animals is illegal and can cause injury or death to the animal. Animals can become aggressive beggars when fed.

#### Please leave it how you found it

It is illegal to remove anything from Zion National Park, including flowers, rocks, or anything else that you might find. Do not write or carve on natural surfaces.

#### Spend a day in Springdale

Springdale is unique to our national park system in that it is almost completely surrounded by Zion National Park. So when you're in Springdale, you're right in the middle of Zion Canyon.

Not only does Zion Brew Pub have live music every Saturday, the property also hosts a handful of events throughout the year, as do the Bit and Spur restaurant, Tanner Amphitheater, Bumbleberry Inn, Wildcat Willies, and several other locations.

#### Try a guided tour

Many of these tours take you outside Zion National Park boundaries and give you a unique perspective on Zion's canyons and plateaus from surrounding areas of southern Utah. 


Starting in the late fall, the number of visitors to Zion Canyon starts to dwindle, and by December it's significantly less than in the heat of the summer. It is simply a different experience to see Zion in the winter with the snow-capped monoliths. Most hikes are still accessible and are less crowded. You can also drive to the Temple of Sinawava parking lot. The shuttles stop running from November until March.

#### Check out Kolob Canyons & Kolob Terrace Road

With gorgeous open spaces and plenty of dirt roads to explore, Kolob Terrace Road is one of Zion's best kept secrets. You'll notice the air getting cooler as you gain elevation, and you'll find plenty of beautiful views worth stopping at for a quick photo op. The Kolob Terrace Road turnoff is in Virgin, so watch for signs. Portions of the Kolob Canyon District of Zion National Park are reached via Exit 40 on Interstate 15.







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

SPRINGDALE, Utah – The seasons are changing in Zion National Park! Every year, the National Park Service (NPS) adjusts shuttle schedules and campground availability throughout the year. Here is what you need to know to plan your visit:

Spring Personal Vehicle Access in Zion Canyon

From March through late November, access to the Zion Canyon Scenic Drive is by shuttle bus only. Private vehicles are allowed to access the Scenic Drive only when the Shuttle System is not in operation.

Peregrine Falcon Nesting Season

Climbing routes on cliffs used by nesting raptors are temporarily closed beginning March 1, 2024. These birds are especially sensitive to disturbance while they nest. If disturbed, a nesting pair may abandon their nest site and not return until the following year. The closure date is based on National Park Service monitoring of nesting sites since 2001. Climbers should check the park's Seasonal Climbing Closures webpage for details.


No matter when you visit, be prepared for crowds and remember:

- Parking fills early year-round. You may have to wait to enter Zion Canyon Scenic Drive if parking is full there.
- Watch out for pedestrians and bicyclists if you are driving.
- Stay on trails and avoid walking in the road.
- Put your pass in your pocket. Don't forget your park pass or receipt in a hotel room or at home.
- Ride your bike on the road or the Pa'Rus Trail. Bicycling is not allowed on any other trails in the park. If you are riding in the road, you must stop to let buses pass you.
- The NPS may temporarily close roads if traffic is congested or there is nowhere for drivers to park.
- In general, fewer people visit Zion on weekdays than weekends. Consider arriving early or after 3 PM to avoid the busiest times of day.

#### Plan ahead and prepare


If you cannot park in Zion or if all of our campsites are full, research nearby communities and public lands to learn about other recreational activities and lodging. Always recreate responsibly and respect private owners' property and facilities.





# Zion National Park Hiking Info

#### THE LOCALS' GUIDE TO HIKING PREPAREDNESS

National parks are seeing an uptick in helicopters carrying unfortunate hikers out of precarious situations.

In 2017, the National Park Service reported 324 search-and-rescue operations, which means 324 extremely unpleasant vacation experiences — nearly one a day. In 2014, the reported number was almost half that. The majority of those rescues occurred in Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks, and most hikers who end up getting into trouble are either in their 20s or are older than 60.

Despite our highly skilled and dedicated rescue teams' valiant efforts, not everyone made it out of their predicaments safely. Twelve people lost their lives in Utah's national parks in 2017 alone.

It's hard to imagine one wanting a vacation amid the splendor of our national parks to involve search and rescue teams or a close encounter with death.

Zion National Park is often referred to as an outdoor Disneyland. But this is the wilderness, and it's far less forgiving than any theme park. Here are some tips for how to safely enjoy your time in Zion Canyon. **Bring water** 

You lose more water through perspiration than you realize, and if you are used to a more moist climate — and nearly any climate is less arid than southern Utah — you can become dehydrated quickly without realizing it.

The National Park Service recommends that hikers bring one gallon of water per hiker per day. There are fill stations throughout Springdale and the park that provided filtered water at no charge.

Natural water sources in the park such as creeks and streams are not reliable sources of clean drinking water. If you find yourself in a situation wherein you need water but have none, it is strongly advised that any locally-sourced water intended for consumption first be filtered, boiled for at least 10 minutes, or treated with iodine before consuming.

Wear appropriate clothing

While most paths and trails are well maintained, this is the great outdoors, and a little loose gravel or slickrock can lead to injury — or worse. Think of appropriate footwear as an insurance policy — and if you are a little nervous, a hiking stick

never hurts. Also, dress lightly if it's going to be hot, but be sure to use appropriate sun protection like sunscreen and large-brimmed hats, because suffering from sunstroke or severe sunburn during an already taxing hike can be brutal.

#### Leave wildlife alone

Animals instinctively avoid humans, but the area is home to everything from poisonous snakes to mountain lions. Never approach local wildlife — and never try to feed them. This can result in injury to visitors, and numerous visitors have required stitches after attempting to handfeed animals. But when humans feed wildlife, it's also not good for the animals, who are already best suited to feed themselves.

#### Hike sober

Sometimes relatively stationary outdoor activities like boating or camping

involve enjoying an adult beverage or two. But when you're hiking the varied terrain of our national parks, you don't want your coordination, balance, or judgment to be impaired to any extent. Zion Canyon, Springdale, and Kanab are home to several fine restaurants and bars — but visit them for a cocktail after your hike, not before.

Hike at your skill level, and don't take risks

Trails in Zion range from short and easy to long and challenging. Don't overestimate your ability and endurance level. And don't engage in horseplay or other activity that might endanger yourself or others. Some of Zion's hikes are steep, and you wouldn't be the first person to tumble down a hill — or worse, fall off a cliff. Zion is beautiful, but it's also dangerous, so respect yourself and others by respecting the terrain.

# PERMIT PROCESS FOR HIKING ANGELS LANDING IN ZION

Apply to hike Angels Landing

SPRINGDALE, Utah – Planning a visit to Zion National Park this summer? Are you hoping to hike Angels Landing? Everyone who hikes Angels Landing must have a permit. Starting this year, you must apply for a permit to hike at Angels Landing, and you can now visit www.recreation.gov and click on Permits.

"We expect many visitors will want to apply for a permit, so we made our process accessible, flexible, and fair." Superintendent Jeff Bradybaugh said. "Lotteries were the right fit for Angels Landing because they give certainty about application periods and flexibility so that people can fill out the application when it's convenient for them."

#### Need to know

- All advanced 'Spring Seasonal Permits' have been awarded except for Day-Before permits.
- You can apply for a permit the day before your planned hike. This lottery opens every day at 12:01 a.m. and closes at 3 p.m. Mountain Time (MT).
- For Day-before Lottery applications, visit www.recreation.gov and click on Permits.

You can also apply by calling recreation.gov at (877) 444-6777 from 10 AM  $-\,11.59$  PM EST every day except for Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, and New Year's Day.

The lottery schedule is posted at www.recreation.gov then click on permits, and we will share news releases and social media updates when we open those permit lotteries.




to Angels Landing needs to have a permit. This means you need a permit to hike on the half-mile section of the trail with chains. Hikers do not need a permit to go to Scout Lookout.

This is a pilot program, and the National Park Service (NPS) will monitor and adjust it as needed.

Angels Landing is one of many places people enjoy hiking in Zion National Park. The park recorded about 2.8 million total visits in 2011 and nearly 4.5 million in 2019. As the number of people who visit Zion continues to rise, the NPS is preparing a plan designed to provide high-quality visitor experiences and sustainably manage park resources. The Angels Landing Pilot Permit Program will inform that planning process.

## Less-Traveled Zion Hikes

#### **Current Trail Closures**

Hiking is popular in Zion National Park, and popular hikes are seeing record visitation at peak days and times. For a less congested trek, consider these less-traveled hikes.

#### Northgate Peaks

The Northgate Peaks trail in the Kolob Terrace section of Zion National Park is an amazing trail with spectacular views. The trail itself is nearly flat, making it a perfect hike for families.

To reach the Northgate Peaks trailhead, take State Route 9 to the town of Virgin. Turn left onto Kolob Terrace Road. Drive for 15.7 miles through increasingly spectacular country until the short spur road (on the right) for the Wildcat Trailhead is reached. Drive a few hundred feet to the large parking area.

The trail heads east across grassy plains and stands of Ponderosa Pine with dynamite views of the towering Pine Valley Peak to the west. Soon the trail will be fully in the forest with limited views. After 0.9 miles, the junction with the Hop Valley trail is reached. Continue east, and 0.1 miles further, the junction with the Northgate Peaks Trail is reached. Head south on this trail for another 1.1 miles until the end of the official trail is reached at a rocky basalt bluff with epic views of the Northgate Peaks to the east and west and of North Guardian Angel to the south.

For families with young children, this makes an excellent turnaround spot.

#### Gifford Canyon

Gifford Canyon offers a nice stroll through a sandy wash and is very charming when water is running. This hike is nearly 3 miles long and will take about 2 hours to finish.

To start this hike, park in the lot located immediately east of the Zion/Mt. Carmel Tunnel. The trail begins

at the backside of the restrooms at the back of the parking lot. There will be a steep, sandy path to climb down before you enter Pine Creek slot. Follow the path upstream for almost 75 feet, and look for a 15-foot wall of slickrock. You can scramble up the rock or look for the beaten path on the backside of the rock.

On top of this wall is a narrow dirt path that is crowded by rock and vegetation. It winds around the mountain to a dead end with a beautiful view of the mountain where the Canyon Overlook Trail is located, opposite is Gifford Canyon.

The path will lead past stone bridge and to another minor slickrock climb. At the end of the canyon, there is a circle of cliffs preventing further exploration without climbing up the sandstone.

#### Chinle Trail

Chinle Trail is an off-the-beatenpath trail located in the lower elevation west desert wilderness area, offering wide vistas, desert landscapes, and a reprieve from the more touristy trails in the park. Though it's a long trail, it's a mellow hike that can be cut off whenever you feel like turning around. It's a great hike with kids because it's not treacherous, slippery, or steep. Avoid it after snow or rain as it will be muddy.

The Chinle Trailhead starts outside of Zion, south of Springdale. If you are coming from St. George, the turn is about a block before you hit the apple orchard and stand as you leave Rockville off of

State Route 9. There is a parking area off the right of Anasazi Way near the Anasazi Plateau housing development. If you hit houses, you missed it. And yes, the trail starts below the housing development and takes you right through it. Don't worry though, it doesn't last long

Shortly after you get through the housing development, you will hit a sign letting you know you are entering the Zion Wilderness. At this point, you can breathe a sigh of relief, because you have gotten away from civilization to enjoy nature, and chances are that you won't see another soul until you return to your car.

#### **Many Pools**

The route is moderate with a gentle uphill climb to an alcove, but plan for a strenuous hike if you continue to the East Rim.

The route begins right off the highway. Drive to the pullout near the second drainage on the north side of the State Route 9, about 0.8 miles after the smaller tunnel. Walk carefully along the road about 150 yards and drop down into a sandy bowl on the north side of SR-9. There is a trail for a short distance, and then the sand turns into large flat stones that you can pick and choose to walk on, depending on your sense of balance. A short distance off the road, filled pools carved into the rocks appear. Ponderosa Pines and Juniper trees twisted by the wind are a good backdrop to the reds and whites ribboned through the rocks.

#### Overlook Trail

The Overlook Trail is a short, beautiful hike located on the east side of Zion National Park, just outside the Mt. Carmel tunnel. The hike is about one mile roundtrip, and it usually takes people about an hour. It is definitely one of the easier hikes in Zion, but it's still considered a moderate-level hike due to a few exposed areas and sandstone pathways, which can be slippery.

The Overlook trailhead lies right outside of the Mt. Carmel tunnel by the ranger booth. Exit the tunnel too quickly and you'll miss it.

It begins with a staircase carved out of the sandstone leading up and away from the road. Soon, you'll be walking along the side of the mountain and looking down into a thin crevice known as Pine Creek Canyon. At about halfway, you'll walk across a bridge that wraps around a corner and leads to an area of recessed rock wet with the moisture that caused it to erode and be filled with ferns growing out of the sandstone.

#### The East Rim Trail

After positioning a vehicle or making shuttle arrangements at the Weeping Rock parking lot, watch for the small "trailhead" sign along the Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, immediately west of the east entrance booth.

This trail is said to be one of the most scenic in all of Zion National Park and is on many lists as one of the best hikes in Utah. This trek begins on the east side of the park and climbs over 1,400 feet to the rim. This hike begins with a backdoor view of Checkerboard Mesa as it skirts Clear Creek for a short time and steadily and gently climbs through a juniper and pine forest. On top of the mesa, scenery gets interesting as a spectacular view of Echo Canyon takes center stage.

The downhill finish is spectacular, keeping an almost constant view of some of Zion's greatest landmarks, including Angels Landing, Organ, Great White Throne, and in the distance is Cathedral Mountain.

Please check with nps.gov for current conditions, restrictions, and access. Be careful and have fun!



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# Popular Zion Hikes

#### **Current Trail Closures**

Warning: These hikes are very popular and often overcrowded. If you are feeling up to some of the more difficult hikes, try some of these popular hikes.

#### Angels Landing via West Rim

Possibly the most popular hike in Zion, Angels Landing takes around four hours to complete, covers just under 51/2 miles, and requires a permit to hike. As you work your way up the 1,488-foot change in elevation, you'll want to look out for long drop-offs. This hike is not for young children or people with a fear of heights. Be sure to enjoy, but be careful along the last section of the hike, which is a steep, narrow ridge to the summit. The hike starts at The Grotto.

#### The Narrows via Riverside Walk

A full-day hike at 8 hours, the Narrows can pose extra dangers depending on the weather. High water levels can prevent access to the Narrows, so be sure to check with the visitor center before beginning this 9 1/2-mile hike. You'll start this hike at Temple of Sinawava.

#### Kolob Arch via La Verkin Creek

Getting to Kolob Arch via the La Verkin Creek Trail follows Timber and

La Verkin creeks and connects to the trail to Kolob Arch, one of the world's largest freestanding arches. A full-day hike, it will take around 8 hours to finish the 14-fourteen mile trip. This hike starts at Kolob Canyons Road.

If you are looking for something more moderate, try some of these midrange hikes.

#### Kayenta Trail

This two-hour hike starts at the Grotto and goes for two miles. You'll gain 150 feet in elevation, and the trail does have long drop-offs. This unpaved climb connects the Grotto to the Emerald Pools

#### Canyon Overlook Trail

Starting at Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, this one-hour hike provides a 163-foot gain in elevation over the

course of a mile. This rocky and uneven trail ends at a viewpoint for Pine Creek Canyon and lower Zion Canyon. While this trail is mostly fenced, there are long drop-offs.

#### Taylor Creek Trail

You'll begin this five-mile hike at Kolob Canyons Road. It should take around 4 hours to complete and provides a 450-foot gain in elevation. Larger groups may need to split up, as this hike limits 12 people to a group. It follows the Middle Fork of Taylor Creek past two homestead cabins to Double Arch Alcove.

#### Timber Creek Overlook Trail

A quick hike, the Timber Creek Overlook Trail covers just one mile and 100 feet in elevation gain. It can be done in about 30 minutes. The trail follows a ridge to a small peak with views of Timber Creek, Kolob Terrace, and Pine Valley Mountains.

Those looking for something less strenuous should check out these easy

#### Pa'rus Trail

Starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this two-hour hike covers 3 1/2 miles and rises 50 feet in elevation. A paved trail that follows the Virgin River from the South Campground to Canyon Junction, Pa'rus Trail is wheelchair accessible and is open to both bicycles

#### Archeology Trail

Also starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this short half-hour hike covers just under half a mile and rises 80 feet in elevation, making it a short but steep trail. This trail offers trailside exhibits and views of several prehistoric buildings.

#### Grotto Trail


Starting at Zion Lodge or the Grotto, this trail connects the two locations and can be combined with the Middle Emerald Pools and Kayenta trails to create a 2 1/2-mile loop. The non-loop version should take about 30 minutes and rises 35 feet over one mile.

#### Riverside Walk

Starting at Temple of Sinawava, this 1 1/2-hour hike cover just over two miles and rises 57 feet in elevation. While it is wheelchair accessable, there are minor drop-offs. The trail, which is paved, offers trailside exhibits as it follows the Virgin Rivet along the bottom of a narrow canyon.

#### Lower Emerald Pool Trail -Temporarily Closed Due To Falling Ice

This paved trail leads to the Lower Emerald Pool and waterfalls. It also connects to the Middle Emerald Pools Trail. It should take about an hour and covers just over one mile with 69 feet in elevation gain.

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# Southern Utah State & National Parks

ANASAZI STATE PARK MUSEUM - This ancient Indian village in the heart of Utah's canyon country was one of the largest Anasazi communities west of the Colorado River. The site is believed to have been occupied from A.D. 1050 to 1200. The village remains largely unexcavated, but many artifacts have been uncovered and are on display in the newly remodeled museum. Anasazi State Park is in the picturesque town of Boulder on State Route 12. Group and individual picnic areas are available. There is no camping. (435) 335-7308.

**BAKER** - Baker Reservoir is a small lake on the Santa Clara River four miles north of Veyo on Utah State Route 18. It is a 63-acre lake with an average depth of about 20 feet. Many people come to the reservoir to camp at one of its 10 campsites and to fish. The reservoir is stocked with rainbow trout and contains brown trout, green sunfish, crayfish, redside shiner, and mountain sucker. It has picnic areas and vault toilets. There is a fee for visiting the reservoir and no boat ramp.

**BRYCE CANYON** - Bryce Canyon National Park is a scientist's laboratory and a child's playground. Because Bryce transcends 2,000 feet of elevation, the park exists in three distinct climatic zones: spruce/fir forest, ponderosa pine forest and pinion pine/juniper forest. This diversity of habitat provides for high biodiversity. Here at Bryce, you can enjoy over 100 species of birds, dozens of mammals, and more than a thousand plant species. (435) 834-5322.

**CEDAR BREAKS -** Sitting at over 10,000 feet and looking down into a half-mile deep geologic amphitheater. Come wander among timeless bristlecone pines, stand in lush meadows of wildflowers, ponder crystal-clear night skies and experience the richness of our subalpine forest. Just four miles off Utah Highway 148, you'll find the Cedar Breaks National Monument parking lot.



**CORAL PINK SAND DUNES** - At an elevation of 6,000 feet and 12 paved miles off U.S. Highway 89 near Kanab, this park provides a fantastic setting for camping, hiking, OHV riding or just playing in the sand. A 265-acre conservation area prohibits motorized vehicles in order to protect the Coral Pink beetle (found nowhere else in the world) and its habitat. The mule deer, jackrabbit, kit fox, coyote, and many small rodents also make the park their home. (435) 648-2800.

**DEAD HORSE POINT** - Dead Horse Point State Park is perhaps Utah's most spectacular state park. Dead Horse Point is a promontory of stone surrounded by steep cliffs near Moab. The overlook at Dead Horse Point is 6,000 feet above sea level. Two-thousand feet below, the Colorado River winds its way from the continental divide in Colorado

to the Gulf of California, a distance of 1,400 miles. (435) 259-2614.

DINOSAUR TRACKS - The St. George Dinosaur Discovery Site at Johnson Farm is home to exceptionally well-preserved dinosaur tracks, some displaying skin impressions. These tracks, along with hundreds of fossil fish, plants, rare dinosaur remains, invertebrates' traces, and important sedimentary structures, show evidence that this site was produced along the western edge of a large, Early Jurassic (age between 195-198 million years ago) freshwater lake. (435) 574-3466.

**ENTERPRISE** - There are two reservoirs in the Bull Valley Mountains 10 miles southwest of the town of Enterprise. The main one is Upper Enterprise Reservoir, about 250 acres with an average depth of about 50 feet, while Lower Enterprise Reservoir is 79 acres. Many come to the reservoir to camp, fish hike, and boat. The Honeycomb Campground



is situated between both lakes and has 21 campsites and flush toilets. There is a boat ramp on Upper Enterprise Reservoir and several fishing areas around both reservoirs. Fishermen will find rainbow trout and smallmouth bass here. Fees are charged.

**FOUR CORNERS** - The Four Corners is the only place in the U.S. where four states come together at one place: Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Colorado. Here, a person can put each of their hands and feet in four states at the same time. The unique landmark is on Navajo Nation land and is open for visits from the public. West of U.S. Highway 160, 40 miles southwest of Cortez, Colo. (928) 871-6436.

**GRAND CANYON -** A World Heritage Site encompassing 1,218,375 acres on the Colorado Plateau in northwestern Arizona. The land is semi-arid and consists of raised plateaus and structural basins typical of the southwestern United States. (928) 638-7888.

GRAND STAIRCASE-ESCALANTE NATIONAL MONUMENT - Nearly 1.9 million acres of America's public lands and located between Bryce Canyon and Glen Canyon Recreational Areas. From its namesake Grand Staircase of cliffs and terraces across the rugged Kaiparowits Plateau to the beauty of the Escalante River Canyons, the Monument's size, resources, and isolated location provide amazing opportunities.

**GUNLOCK** - In scenic red rock country, 15 miles northwest of St. George, lies the 240-acre Gunlock State Park and Reservoir where year-round boating, water sports, and quality fishing for bass and catfish attract visitors. Facilities include boat launching ramp and pit privies. (435) 628-2255.

**LAKE MEAD** - Lake Mead National Recreation Area offers a wealth of things to do and places to go year-round. Its huge lakes cater to boaters, swimmers, sunbathers and fishermen, while its desert rewards hikers, wildlife photographers, and roadside sightseers. It is also home to thousands of desert plants and animals adapted to survive in an extreme place where rain is scarce and temperatures soar. (702) 293-8990.

**LAKE POWELL** - In Glen Canyon National Recreation Area is one of the world's great places for houseboating! The 186-mile-long lake offers sandy beaches, cool blue water, and exceptional red-rock scenery. It is excellent for boating, skiing, kayaking, and fishing. Boat or hike to Rainbow Bridge, or explore any of its many canyons or sand dunes. (928) 608-6200.

**PINE VALLEY** - Pine Valley Reservoir is a beautiful place for fishermen to fish brook trout and rainbow trout. The reservoir is near the Pine Valley Recreation Complex, which has over 150 campsites with picnic and restroom facilities. This area is greener than most other parts of southwestern Utah with pine and pinion trees, and many come to enjoy camping and hiking. It is west of the town of Central. (435) 652-3100.

**QUAIL LAKE -** Quail Creek State Park provides excellent year-round camping, picnicking, boating, and trout and bass fishing in sunny southwest Utah. The park is three miles east of the Interstate 15 Hurricane exit on Utah State Route 9. Facilities include 23 campsites, modern restrooms, a fish cleaning station, and two covered group-use pavilions. (435) 879-2378.


**SAND HOLLOW** - Looking to fish? Swim? Ride your ATV in the sand? Do all that and more at Sand Hollow State Park, located between St. George and Hurricane. Bring your boat, a picnic, and some fishing gear for a fun day on the reservoir, or watch the kids swim while you relax on the beach. Load up your RV or tent and settle in for a nice campout, or ride your ATV in the dunes of Sand Mountain. (435) 680-0715.




**SNOW CANYON** - Named after early Utah leaders Lorenzo and Erastus Snow, Snow Canyon State Park begins just outside of Ivins and stretches northward. Spectacular scenery includes towering red and white sandstone cliffs, black lava formations, and even a waterfall that appears during heavy rain. Snow Canyon offers 16 miles of hiking trails, beautiful sand dunes, technical rock climbing sites, horseback riding, year-round camping, nature studies, and wildlife viewing. This park is a favorite for locals and visitors alike. (435) 628-2255.

**ZION** - With breathtaking views, numerous hiking attractions of all difficulty levels and some of the most spectacular scenery on earth, Zion National Park and its surrounding areas attract thousands of visitors every year. This natural wonder is not only a mecca of recreational activity, but Zion and nearby Springdale host numerous cultural activities, as well. There's something for everyone in Zion – whether you're looking for a challenging hike or a fun excursion for the family. (435) 772-3256.
