


Sometimes, opportunities only present themselves once. Some come just every so often, and that's the case for me to work in politics in rural southern Utah. Some of you may know that I ran for St. George City

Council way back in 1999. I didn't win, but I had an awesome experience, and I've stayed engaged ever since. I ran for office again in 2016, that time for Washington County Commissioner, and between those two runs

since, I've stayed involved in local politics primarily through volunteering to help on numerous campaigns. Tara Dunn, Brent Holloway, Bart Battista, and Pat Horning were all candidates who I assisted through various volunteer efforts, and in 2020, I was called upon to work on a state-level campaign for Jan Garbett, who was running for Governor that year. The Garbett campaign was the first one that I was actually paid to be a part of. I was brought in kind of midstream, as the campaign was running full steam by the time they hired me, first part-time, then eventually full-time as the Communications Director. All of this experience was invaluable when the latest opportunity presented itself.

I met Davina Smith in 2022 when she was running for the first time for Utah House District 69, a newly redrawn district that includes all of Grand County, in addition to Kane, Garfield, Wayne, San Juan, and most of Emery Counties, as well. I was highly impressed with her, her experience, her willingness to listen to all sides of an

issue, and her passion for people and the things that matter to them.

So, in December, when I got an email from a mutual friend mentioning that Davina was looking for a Campaign Manager for this cycle, I gave it some serious thought for about a week. I had to sit with my imposter syndrome, my feelings surrounding giving up a lot of my personal time that a job like that would take, as well as my fears and thoughts about how it would affect my whole life, for ten months plus! But after some serious soul searching and consulting with my amazing girlfriend Annabelle, I decided I'd send Davina an email offering up myself as her "part-time" Campaign Manager. She accepted, and on January 1st, I jumped in with both feet.

The first month or so was really challenging. I was just trying to get my hands wrapped around all the components of the 2022 campaign. By March, I was more or less catching my stride. I had already done events in Kanab, with plans for more in Moab and around the district.

Now, about halfway through this extremely long campaign year, I'm feeling better and better about my prospects but, more importantly, Davina's prospects of winning. This time, she comes into this cycle with experience. Her opponent opted not to run again for his seat and instead is running a long-shot campaign for Governor. So with the wind to her back, an open seat, a second-time candidate, and the higher turnout of a presidential year, we are feeling optimistic we can get her a win in November.

So while most of our distribution area is outside of HD 69, if you do happen to live in the district please check out DavinaForUT. com to see what Davina stands for, the unique experience she brings to the table, and her vision for the future of Southeast Utah. This could be a rare opportunity to support an amazing candidate with impecable credentials and a heart of gold. And as we all know, some opportunities only come around every so often. UTAH TECH UNIVERSITY'S SEARS ART MUSEUM PRESENTS 'ERIN HANSON: LANDSCAPES OF THE WEST'

June 14 – August 23, 2024.

Utah Tech University's Sears Art Museum is showcasing a selection of contemporary impressionist paintings by artist Erin Hanson for its summer exhibit.

The exhibit, "Erin Hanson: Landscapes of the West," will open with a reception and an exclusive Q&A session with the artist herself from 7 to 8:30 PM on June 14 in the Sears Art Museum, located in the Eccles Fine Arts Center on the Utah Tech campus. This is a rare chance to meet the artist and gain insights into her creative process. The show, which is open to the public and free to attend, will run June 14 through Aug. 23. Sears Art Museum is open Monday through Friday from 9 AM to 5 PM.

"Erin Hanson is one of the top artists today painting the American West," James Peck, director and curator of the Sears Art Museum, said. "Her vibrant canvases range from contemplative to absolutely epic. We're lucky to have this exclusive, one-of-a-kind exhibition in our gallery this summer."

The collection of 39 works will focus on landscapes ranging from Southern Utah to the Colorado Plateau, including Hanson's first five works in what has become her signature open impressionistic style.

Originally inspired by rock climbing at Red Rock Canyon, Hanson has been painting desert landscapes for 15 years. Her unique style, characterized by bold color, thickly applied paint, and expressive brushwork, aims to capture the drama and beauty of nature. Using a limited palette of only five colors, and without overlapping her brush strokes, she keeps her pieces fresh and alive with movement. Hanson's goal when painting is to re-capture the feeling of being outdoors, surrounded by the wild beauty of nature.

RED ROCK FILM FESTIVAL AWARDS NIGHT AT FRONTIER HOMESTEAD

On June 14, the Festival will have encore screenings of some of the winning films at its Awards Night event. Oscar® nominees, movie distributors, actors, dancers, and award-winning filmmakers formed the Grand Jury for the 17th Annual event, and for its Utah (Red) Film Market, both held last October. The jury consisted of 22 judges from around the world and 39

This awards ceremony will begin with a Dinner reception followed by the screenings, ending with Fiona Cochrane's Documentary Feature Grand Jury Prize Winner "Patou: In Black & White" about Jamaican singer Pat Powell (Patou), one of Australia's most accomplished vocal artists who sings with 15 bands, including the Melbourne Ska Orchestra.

The music biopic contrasts with the Audience Award Winner Randy Martin's "Karen Carpenter: Starving for Perfection." Michael Moshe Dahan's dramatic feature "Yes Repeat No" came out ahead, winning both the Audience Award and the Grand

Jury Prize for Best Fiction Feature, as well as Utah Film Market's Best Hook and Best Trailer. Though both features are not part of the encore screenings, there was a short that will as it took home five awards.

Chris Capel's "Fishers of Men" won both the Grand Jury and Audience Award for Fiction Short, Special Jury Award for its lead Dawson Mullen for Best Acting in a Fiction Short, Best Editing, a Special Achievement Award for Screenplay plus nominations for Cinematography and for UFM's Best Hook category. Based on Capel's real-life experiences as a former LDS missionary, the short is a dark comedy that Jury member and Oscar® Nominee Christian Norlyk said "has a great premise of a trainee and his glass-half-full mentor.' This brutally honest film with themes of domestic abuse is currently being developed into a feature.

Other shorts being presented at Red Rock Film Fest's Awards Night include Festival alums Dean Hamer and Joe Wilson, who teamed up with Oscar® nominee Daniel Sousa for their new animated fantasy "Aikane," Humbi Entress's Swiss ScreenDance "Demons" and Young Filmmaker CJ Santo's animated sci-fi "Mirror Me." Documentary short winners are in the mix with Tran Hoang Calvin's "A Clean Slate" and Chapman University students Emilie Haskell, Connor Wesson, and Quincy Eggert's "The Long Shadow".

The icebreaker shorts that screen with the dinner reception include Cem Terbiyeli's micro-cinema Aglet Award Winner "Breath" plus local screenwriter and Spirit of the Festival Winner Natalie Lynch, who co-produced the comedy "Social AnnXiety" with co-star Tara Jayn.

Red Rock Film Festival's Awards Night shines Friday, June 14, at the Frontier Homestead Museum at 635 N. Main in Cedar City. Tickets for the dinner reception are \$30 in advance or \$50 on June 14. It starts at 6 PM and is followed by the winning film screenings at 7 PM. with \$10 tickets in advance or \$15 on June 14. ZION **FOREVER** PROJECT 2024 FIELD GUIDE

Highlighting Over 20 Public Lands Projects.

As the summer season approaches, the Zion Forever Project is proud to announce the release of the 2024 Field Guide, showcasing over 20 critical projects across Zion National Park, Cedar Breaks National Monument, Pipe Spring National Monument, and the Dixie National Forest. This comprehensive guide details the essential conservation and funding efforts that require public support to preserve and enhance these treasured landscapes.

This year's Field Guide underscores the importance of our new partnership with the U.S. Forest Service (USFS), expanding our stewardship to include the vast and diverse Dixie National Forest. This collaboration opens new avenues for conservation, visitor education, and resource protection across millions of acres of public land.

Among the larger highlighted projects is the ambitious "Floor of the Valley Trail" initiative, a multi-phased new trail effort designed to extend the famous Pa'Rus trail and provide new paths for hikers and bikers that allow them to avoid busy shuttle bus lanes while enhancing visitor safety, modernizing utility infrastructure, and preserving the natural beauty of Zion's iconic Virgin River. The Field Guide also addresses land conservation efforts on the east side of Zion National Park and the efforts to acquire hundreds of additional acres in perpetuity for the park.

"The release of our 2024 Field Guide marks a pivotal moment for the Zion Forever Project. Our new partnership with the USFS and our continued dedication to land conservation reflect our unwavering commitment to preserving Zion's natural and cultural treasures and beyond," said Natalie Britt, President & CEO of the Zion Forever Project. "These projects are not just about maintaining our public lands; they are about investing in the future, ensuring that these beautiful and irreplaceable landscapes remain vibrant for generations to come.'



UTAH FIRST IN TECH JOB GROWTH

Utah's accolades keep rolling in. The Wall Street Journal, working with Moody Analytics, reports that Utah's Salt Lake City tech hub was the country's hottest job market in 2023. California's

loss has been Utah's gain for the last tenplus years, with white-collar workers streaming into the state from the Bay Area and Southern California.

Many of these workers have taken jobs in what boosters call "Silicon Slopes," the Wasatch Front stretching from Ogden to Provo and anchored by Salt Lake City. Immigration increased after the pandemic when many California workers were priced out of its housing market. Utah attracted these young workers who have been able to afford homes here.

And many of them appreciate easy access to Utah's great outdoors starts with mountains perched literally at the city's edge. Metro-area directional signs reading "Alta 8" and "Park City 25" may be old hat to those living on the Wasatch Front but they elicit double takes by disbelieving newcomers.

Adam Kamins, an economist at Moody's Analytics, says, "There's a virtuous cycle where young, highly educated workers are moving into Salt Lake City and bringing in

more money to that area."

Those young workers, coupled with the state's highest-in-the-nation birthrate, make Utah the youngest state in the union. That is no small contributor to Utah's rank as the 10th healthiest state in the country for the third year in a row, according to the annual Sharecare Community Well-Being Index report that analyzed all 50 states.

High interest rates and tech layoffs in 2023 impacted the Wasatch Front along with the rest of the country last year. However, given Utah's robust economy, it was easy for affected workers to find other employment given the area's diverse economy that kept unemployment exceptionally low. As some IT startups had to cut back, financial or manufacturing companies snapped up their displaced workers.

Utah's business-friendly laws and tax incentives have made Salt Lake City a good place to build and expand businesses in industries beyond tech. High-growth businesses in Salt Lake City include life sciences, manufacturing, and supply-chain logistics. Manufacturing and logistics companies that typically require larger tracts of land have comparatively little trouble finding space to locate

In January, food company Mars Inc. announced a new 399,000 square-foot baking facility to make Nature's Bakery snacks. Subzero Engineering, maker of data-center equipment, announced a 155,000-square-foot manufacturing facility in December.

Those of us in Southern Utah have continued to enjoy a robust economy as well. While our growth is powered by tourism and construction, we can hope that St. George's Tech Ridge, located on the old airport site, will continue to attract tech companies to our "Silicon Slopes South." We would certainly benefit from the cleantech industry with its modest demands on our limited land and water resources.

I made the right choice choosing to locate in Utah 25 years ago. Great scenery, great climate, great people. To each his own, but for me, to coin a phrase, "This is the right place."

UNDERSTANDING RED CLIFFS HISTORY IS IMPORTANT

M a n y newcomers to this area, and others, may not know that in the 1990s 62,000 acres, named Red Cliffs Desert Reserve, most of which is north of St. George, were set aside as a protected area for the threatened (called

"endangered" by some!) Mojave desert tortoise and other species. In exchange, the county was allowed to develop 300,000 acres, generally free of constraints, enabling the area to grow.

Washington County's population now tops 200,000. That doesn't count tourists and second home owners. Many who are reading this article live on land that was once tortoise habitat and part of the 300,000 acres. Tortoises were moved to Red Cliffs, the 62,000-acre reserve, to make room for people.

The bargain that was made included the agreement that no new roads would be built in Red Cliffs.

The 1990s when this agreement with federal agencies was made was a high-growth period just as we witness now. Officials at that time made the agreement in good faith in spite of population projections, many of which predicted where our population currently is.

Now local officials with the help of members of Congress are trying to undo that agreement while knowing full well, I believe, what the real history is.

They assert a highway – the contentious Northern Corridor – through Red Cliffs is a necessity and that a road was promised when Red Cliffs was established. Not only is it not a necessity, but a road clearly was not promised as has been documented by Dr. William Mader, who served as the first administrator of Red Cliffs and was in the meetings leading to its establishment.

Dr. Mader was not allowed to speak at a public hearing – really an "elected-official" hearing – on April 22. Officials did not want to hear the truth. Highway proponents assert that the 2009 Omnibus Act required the Department of Interior to identify a route through Red Cliffs, now mostly a national conservation area (NCA). In fact, the Act only required that a route within Washington County be identified.

The battle over the road's route

resulted in a court case, and earlier this year the judge required the federal agencies to review the information and create a Draft Supplement Environmental Impact Statement (DSEIS).

In early May, the Bureau of Land Management and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service issued the Draft SEIS, and the 45-day public comment period on the DSEIS is underway. Public comments will be accepted until June 24, 2024 at https://conserveswu.org/comment-to-protect-red-cliffs/ or https://eplanning.blm.gov/eplanning-ui/project/2026562/570.

Unfortunately, the DSEIS references a traffic analysis by Dixie Metropolitan Planning Organization (DMOP) that is yet to be completed and may not even be appropriate. It will be included in the Final SEIS according to the agencies. *This is a serious concern!* How can the public comment effectively on this significant issue when all the information is not available? That analysis, at the least, deserves an independent review. Washington County is paying for the analysis which poses a conflict of interest. In fact, its appropriateness is in question since little has changed since the Final EIS.

Northern Corridor supporters assert, even without the new traffic analysis, that the preferred route through Red Cliffs would reduce traffic congestion by a mere fifteen percent. It that justification for driving a stake through the heart of Red Cliffs and ignoring earlier agreements?

If the UDOT Northern Corridor ROW through Red Cliffs is denied and one of the two reasonable alternatives for moving traffic – Red Hills Parkway Expressway or St. George Boulevard/100 South One-Way Couplet – is selected, there with be challenges since both of these options will impact areas where people live, have businesses and recreate.

Officials just prefer to put the burden on the backs of the threatened (endangered?) tortoise since that is the easier decision for them politically, apparently. For officials to choose one of the two viable options will require them to have backbones.

Ignoring and failing to honor Red Cliffs' history will not solve our problems. As Washington County strives to become another desert metropolitan area, we will continue to face traffic challenges and congestion. Citizens and officials who want this growth vision should just accept that inevitable fact and do the honorable thing: respect Red Cliffs' history.

ENEPITSI (GHOST) TRAIL IN THE SANTA CLARA RIVER RESERVE By Tom Garrison


Location: Santa Clara River Reserve in Santa Clara and Ivins, Utah.

Difficulty: Easy. It is mostly level with a few not very steep up and down sections. **Average Hiking Time:** A little more than two hours at a leisurely pace with many

Elevations: The trailhead is approximately 2,760 feet in elevation with about a 150 feet elevation gain from the highest to the lowest point.

Family Friendly: Yes.

Getting There: From St. George travel north on Bluff Street/Highway 18 to the sweeping left (west) turn onto Sunset Boulevard/Highway 8. Continue four miles from the Bluff Street/Highway 18 intersection on Sunset Boulevard/Highway 8 as it enters Santa Clara and becomes Santa Clara Drive. At four miles, turn left onto West 1700 North/Graveyard Wash Road. There is a large brown sign for Santa Clara City Public Works at the turnoff. Below the large sign is a smaller one with an arrow



The BLM recommends a convoluted way of reaching Enepitsi Trail to protect archeological sites and promoting a "good neighbor" policy since much of the adjacent land is private property.

The surrounding private property owners make this "good neighbor" policy a necessity. Just beyond the Tukupetsi Trailhead, Graveyard Wash Road forks. The left fork has a prominent sign reading, "Private Property No Trespassing." The right fork's sign reads, "No Public Access Beyond This Point, Private Road Do Not Enter." Either fork is a short easy stroll to the Enepitsi Trail, but not available to the public.

We dutifully followed the BLM directions to Enepitsi Trail. We do want to be good neighbors, and the signs on the private property made it clear where we could not go

From the Tukuetsi Trailhead we took the Fishhook Trail heading north for .3 mile to the Upper Graveyard Trail. We then turned left (west) onto Upper Graveyard (about .1 mile on this trail, we took the left fork) and proceeded .3 mile to the Tempi'po'op Trail. Going south, we crossed Tempi'po'op Trail onto Een'oog Trail for about .1 mile. Finally, we turned left (east) onto the U'waiv Trail and went downhill about .2 mile to the Enepitsi Trail.

These four short trails, about .9 mile one way, are rather uninspiring. There were some good views of Red Mountain to the north and down into the canyon and

Santa Clara River on the U'waiv Trail.

The Uwaiv trail intersects Enepitsi Trail and we headed west (right) on a slope into the canyon. Enepitsi Trail, three miles round trip, follows an old pioneer dirt road, closed to motor vehicles.

There is a gate near the beginning of Enepitsi Trail; be sure to close it on your way through. Soon after the gate, we came to an overflowing dam, and the lush foliage along the Santa Clara River came into view.

As we entered the canyon we searched for and found some petroglyphs on the canyon walls. If you hunt around you will find several places with rock art, many of them above eye level high on the cliffs.

In the canyon, the cliffs on both sides of the river towered above us with trees and bushes spreading out from the river. About ¼ mile along we took a user trail through the bushes and quickly reached the river bank—very nice relaxing babble of a gently flowing river. We saw a few users trails, some toward the river and some toward the cliffs and petroglyphs.

Most of the trail follows along the base of cliffs varying from a few to about 50 feet from the river. We continued through the canyon to where the road/trail forks. At this point, 1.5 miles from the Enepitsi Trailhead, the canyon has widened considerably. We explored a bit and then began our return journey.

This is an easy, almost five-mile roundtrip hike with a few not-too-stretched upand-down sections, mostly in a lush riparian environment, fairly atypical for the southwest desert. Give it a try.



that reads "Trailheads." After .1 mile, the paved road becomes a good dirt road, and .3 mile from the turnoff is the signed Tukupetsi Trailhead, which is also the trailhead for Enepitsi Trail. The trailhead is across the road from the parking area. Although a regular sedan should traverse the dirt road without trouble, I recommend a high-clearance vehicle.

Several months ago my wife, Deb, and I hiked the Black Brush Trail in the Santa Clara River Reserve. The highlight of that hike were some great views of the Santa Clara River and its riparian environment from cliffs above the river. We saw a trail alongside the river and knew we had to explore that trail. And now we have the Enepitsi Trail. (Enepitsi, pronounced e'noo petes, means "ghost" in the Southern Paiute language.) This trail is an easy out-and-back hike, mostly along the Santa Clara River, featuring high cliffs, petroglyphs, and a riparian environment near the river.

The Santa Clara River Reserve was established through a partnership between the cities of Ivins and Santa Clara and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). The 6,500-acre Reserve is administered by the BLM and is located southwest of Ivins and Santa Clara. The Reserve was created to protect open space and archeological and natural resources and promote recreational opportunities. More than 20 trails in the Reserve offer a variety of experiences—prehistoric petroglyphs (rock art), hiking sandy washes, desert landscape vistas, and lush (for a desert) riparian corridor along the Santa Clara River.

Our journey began on a Thursday in mid-May. We most often hike alone and enjoy trails with few or no other people. There were a few people on Enepitsi Trail, but no crush of humanity.

We arrived at the Tukupetsi Trailhead at about 9:30 AM, with the temperature in the mid-70s. The trailhead elevation is about 2,760 feet, with an approximately 150 feet elevation from the highest to lowest point during the almost five-mile hike

FURIOSA: A MAD MAX SAGA (R)

Furiosa asks if director George Miller has what it takes to make it epic and the answer is... Yes!

There are few action movies of the last 20 years that have been quite as celebrated as "Fury Road" so it was always going to be an uphill battle for "Furiosa," the latest entry in the "Mad Max Saga." Of course, in that regard, this is nothing new for the series. Back in 1985, "Mad Max Beyond Thunderdome" had the daunting task of following up the much beloved "The Road Warrior" and we all saw how that turned out. While we're on that topic, I know I'm in the minority here, but I will continue to profess my undying adoration for that most underappreciated gem. Of course, we're not here to discuss the hotly debated merits of the only PG-13 rated entry in this stunning (and often brutal) saga, so we can save that thoughtful conversation for another day.

The epic that is "Furiosa" actually strays from the traditional "Mad Max" format in a couple of ways; Aside from the fact that the character of Max doesn't really play into the plot in any way here, it should also be noted that this film takes a look "back" rather than "forward." This is to say that the action that takes place in "Furiosa," predates the events of "Fury Road" by several years.

"Furiosa" weaves its sprawling tale around the origins of the title character, tracing her life from childhood (the younger version is played by and effective Alyla Browne) to adulthood (an outstanding Anya Taylor-Joy steps in to take on a role originated by a spectacular Charlize Theron.) At the center of this movie is a timeless theme of vengeance as Furiosa seeks retribution following her abduction as a young girl, and what she achieves by the end of this movie is as poetic as it is unexpected. As for Furiosa's abductor, he's a shifty sort of Wasteland-residing messiah known as Dementus (played gleefully by a bigger-thanlife Chris Hemsworth), a loose cannon of an individual with hefty aspirations.

It should be noted that even though "Furiosa" is technically a "Fury Road," it's a movie that still lives and breathes as a singular vision because that's simply how its creator, the legendary George Miller, rolls. Yes, there are a few callbacks here and yes, there are moments of the familiar, but by focusing on a theme of vengeance and digging deep to tell a story that spans nearly 15 years, "Furiosa" takes on a weighty if sometimes messy life of its own. Translation; This isn't a "Fury Road" rehash.

Anya Taylor-Joy is the personification of "badass" in this movie. While it would have been great to have Theron back in the saddle (at the very least, a brief final act appearance would have been nice), there is no doubt that Joy has risen to the challenge in more ways than one.





Safety Tips For Zion

Emergencies

For 24-hour emergency response, call 911 or (435) 772-3322. The Zion Canyon Medical Clinic is located in Springdale near the south entrance to the park. For hours, please call (435) 772-3226. Other medical clinics are located in Hurricane. The nearest hospitals are in St. George, Cedar City, and Kanab.

Hydrate and use refillable water bottles

It is easy to get dehydrated while hiking and walking in the desert, so pack along extra water, and be sure to take rest and water breaks on long hikes. There are a number of places to refill your water bottles in Zion National Park

including the visitors' center and Zion Lodge as well as a new hydration station at the Springdale bus stop in front of The Bumbleberry Inn and Zion Canyon Brew Pub.

Be cautious near steep cliffs

Falls from cliffs on trails can result in death. Loose sand or pebbles on stone are very slippery. Be careful of edges when using cameras or binoculars. Never throw or roll rocks because there may be hikers below you. Stay on the trail. Stay back from cliff edges. Observe posted warnings. Please watch children.

Watch for flash floods

All narrow canyons are potentially hazardous. Flash floods, often caused by storms miles away, are a real danger and can be life threatening. You are assuming a risk when entering a narrow canyon. Your safety is your responsibility.

Tips To Minimize Your Impact

Pack it in, pack it out & use recycling bins

Each month, Zion National Park pays many thousands of dollars to haul away waste collected from garbage cans and recycling bins. Your experience and that of everyone who visits Zion Canyon can be improved by never littering and making sure you pick up any trash you see along the way. Recycling bins are placed strategically throughout Zion Park, and it is highly encouraged for everyone to use them.



Please stay on the marked trails

Hiking off trails can lead to loss of vegetation, soil compaction, erosion, and unsightly scars on the landscape. Remember, if you bring it in, please pack it out.

Go before you go

It is always a good idea to use the restroom before you begin a hike since facilities are limited to select locations. If you do need to take care of your business, please pack it back out.

Be respectful to the wildlife

Feeding, harming, or capturing wild animals is illegal and can cause injury or death to the animal. Animals can become aggressive beggars when fed.

Please leave it how you found it

It is illegal to remove anything from Zion National Park, including flowers, rocks, or anything else that you might find. Do not write or carve on natural surfaces.

Consider getting up extra early or trekking out midday after the initial rush has flooded in.




Starting in the late fall, the number of visitors to Zion Canyon starts to dwindle, and by December it's significantly less than in the heat of the summer. It is simply a different experience to see Zion in the winter with the snow-capped monoliths. Most hikes are still accessible and are less crowded. You can also drive to the Temple of Sinawava parking lot. The shuttles stop running from November until March.

Check out Kolob Canyons & Kolob Terrace Road





ZION 2024 SPRING SHUTTLE SCHEDULE INFO

SPRINGDALE, Utah – The seasons are changing in Zion National Park! Every year, the National Park Service (NPS) adjusts shuttle schedules and campground availability throughout the year. Here is what you need to know to plan your visit:

Spring Personal Vehicle Access in Zion Canyon

From March through late November, access to the Zion Canyon Scenic Drive is by shuttle bus only. Private vehicles are allowed to access the Scenic Drive only when the Shuttle System is not in operation.

Peregrine Falcon Nesting Season

Climbing routes on cliffs used by nesting raptors are temporarily closed beginning March 1, 2024. These birds are especially sensitive to disturbance while they nest. If disturbed, a nesting pair may abandon their nest site and not return until the following year. The closure date is based on National Park Service monitoring of nesting sites since 2001. Climbers should check the park's Seasonal Climbing Closures webpage for details.

No matter when you visit, be prepared for crowds and remember:

- Parking fills early year-round. You may have to wait to enter Zion Canyon Scenic Drive if parking is full there.
- Watch out for pedestrians and bicyclists if you are driving.
- Stay on trails and avoid walking in the road.
- Put your pass in your pocket. Don't forget your park pass or receipt in a hotel room or at home.
- Ride your bike on the road or the Pa'Rus Trail. Bicycling is not allowed on any other trails in the park. If you are riding in the road, you must stop to let buses pass you.
- The NPS may temporarily close roads if traffic is congested or there is nowhere for drivers to park.
- In general, fewer people visit Zion on weekdays than weekends. Consider arriving early or after 3 PM to avoid the busiest times of day.





Follow Leave No Trace practices everywhere in the park and beyond; be sure to pack out all your trash.










Zion Canyon Shuttle Map





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Less-Traveled Zion Hikes

Current Trail Closures

Closed trail bridge at Zion Lodge (Shuttle Stop #5) - To access Emerald Pools, start your hike at the Court of the Patriarchs (Shuttle Stop #4) or the Grotto (Shuttle Stop #6). Weeping Rock Shuttle Bus Stop, Due to rockfall, the area near Weeping Rock is temporarily closed. Park scientists and maintenance staff are monitoring the area. Visit nps. gov/zion/planyourvisit/conditions.htm for current condition updates.

Hiking is popular in Zion National Park, and popular hikes are seeing record visitation at peak days and times. For a less congested trek, consider these less-traveled hikes.

Northgate Peaks

The Northgate Peaks trail in the Kolob Terrace section of Zion National Park is an amazing trail with spectacular views. The trail itself is nearly flat, making it a perfect hike for families.

To reach the Northgate Peaks trailhead, take State Route 9 to the town of Virgin. Turn left onto Kolob Terrace Road. Drive for 15.7 miles through increasingly spectacular country until the short spur road (on the right) for the Wildcat Trailhead is reached. Drive a few hundred feet to the large parking area.

The trail heads east across grassy plains and stands of Ponderosa Pine with dynamite views of the towering Pine Valley Peak to the west. Soon the trail will be fully in the forest with limited views. After 0.9 miles, the junction with the Hop Valley trail is reached. Continue east, and 0.1 miles further, the



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junction with the Northgate Peaks Trail is reached. Head south on this trail for another 1.1 miles until the end of the official trail is reached at a rocky basalt bluff with epic views of the Northgate Peaks to the east and west and of North Guardian Angel to the south.

For families with young children, this makes an excellent turnaround spot.

Gifford Canyon

Gifford Canyon offers a nice stroll through a sandy wash and is very charming when water is running. This hike is nearly 3 miles long and will take about 2 hours to finish.

To start this hike, park in the lot located immediately east of the Zion/ Mt. Carmel Tunnel. The trail begins at the backside of the restrooms at the back of the parking lot. There will be a steep, sandy path to climb down before you enter Pine Creek slot. Follow the path upstream for almost 75 feet, and look for a 15-foot wall of slickrock. You can scramble up the rock or look for the beaten path on the backside of the rock.

On top of this wall is a narrow dirt path that is crowded by rock and vegetation. It winds around the mountain to a dead end with a beautiful view of the mountain where the Canyon Overlook Trail is located, opposite is Gifford Canvon.

The path will lead past stone bridge and to another minor slickrock climb. At the end of the canyon, there is a circle of cliffs preventing further exploration without climbing up the sandstone.

Chinle Trail

Chinle Trail is an off-the-beatenpath trail located in the lower elevation west desert wilderness area, offering

wide vistas, desert landscapes, and a reprieve from the more touristy trails in the park. Though it's a long trail, it's a mellow hike that can be cut off whenever you feel like turning around. It's a great hike with kids because it's not treacherous, slippery, or steep. Avoid it after snow or rain as it will be muddy.

The Chinle Trailhead starts outside of Zion, south of Springdale. If you are coming from St. George, the turn is about a block before you hit the apple orchard and stand as you leave Rockville off of State Route 9. There is a parking area off the right of Anasazi Way near the Anasazi Plateau housing development. If you hit houses, you missed it. And yes, the trail starts below the housing development and takes you right through it. Don't worry though, it doesn't last

Shortly after you get through the housing development, you will hit a sign letting you know you are entering the Zion Wilderness. At this point, you can breathe a sigh of relief, because you have gotten away from civilization to enjoy nature, and chances are that you won't see another soul until you return to your

Many Pools

The route is moderate with a gentle uphill climb to an alcove, but plan for a strenuous hike if you continue to the East Rim.

The route begins right off the highway. Drive to the pullout near the second drainage on the north side of the State Route 9, about 0.8 miles after the smaller tunnel. Walk carefully along the road about 150 yards and drop down into a sandy bowl on the north side of SR-9. There is a trail for a short distance, and

then the sand turns into large flat stones that you can pick and choose to walk on, depending on your sense of balance. A short distance off the road, filled pools carved into the rocks appear. Ponderosa Pines and Juniper trees twisted by the wind are a good backdrop to the reds and whites ribboned through the rocks.

Overlook Trail

The Overlook Trail is a short, beautiful hike located on the east side of Zion National Park, just outside the Mt. Carmel tunnel. The hike is about one mile roundtrip, and it usually takes people about an hour. It is definitely one of the easier hikes in Zion, but it's still considered a moderate-level hike due to a few exposed areas and sandstone pathways, which can be slippery.

The Overlook trailhead lies right outside of the Mt. Carmel tunnel by the ranger booth. Exit the tunnel too quickly and you'll miss it.

It begins with a staircase carved out of the sandstone leading up and away from the road. Soon, you'll be walking along the side of the mountain and looking down into a thin crevice known as Pine Creek Canyon. At about halfway, you'll walk across a bridge that wraps around a corner and leads to an area of recessed rock wet with the moisture that caused it to erode and be filled with ferns growing out of the sandstone.

The East Rim Trail


After positioning a vehicle or making shuttle arrangements at the Weeping Rock parking lot, watch for the small "trailhead" sign along the Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, immediately west of the east entrance booth.

This trail is said to be one of the most scenic in all of Zion National Park and is on many lists as one of the best hikes in Utah. This trek begins on the east side of the park and climbs over 1,400 feet to the rim. This hike begins with a backdoor view of Checkerboard Mesa as it skirts Clear Creek for a short time and steadily and gently climbs through a juniper and pine forest. On top of the mesa, scenery gets interesting as a spectacular view of Echo Canyon takes center stage.

The downhill finish is spectacular, keeping an almost constant view of some of Zion's greatest landmarks, including Angels Landing, Organ, Great White Throne, and in the distance is Cathedral Mountain.

Possibly the most popular hike in Zion, Angels Landing takes around four hours to complete, covers just under 5 1/2 miles, and requires a permit to hike. As you work your way up the 1,488-foot change in elevation, you'll want to look out for long drop-offs. This hike is not for young children or people with a fear of heights. Be sure to enjoy, but be careful along the last section of the hike, which is a steep, narrow ridge to the summit. The hike starts at The Grotto.

The Narrows via Riverside Walk

A full-day hike at 8 hours, the Narrows can pose extra dangers depending on the weather. High water levels can prevent access to the Narrows, so be sure to check with the visitor center before beginning this 9 1/2-mile hike. You'll start this hike at Temple of Sinawaya.

Kolob Arch via La Verkin Creek Trail

Getting to Kolob Arch via the La Verkin Creek Trail follows Timber and La Verkin creeks and connects to the trail to Kolob Arch, one of the world's

largest freestanding arches. A full-day hike, it will take around 8 hours to finish the 14-fourteen mile trip. This hike starts at Kolob Canyons Road.

If you are looking for something more moderate, try some of these midrange hikes.

Kayenta Trail

This two-hour hike starts at the Grotto and goes for two miles. You'll gain 150 feet in elevation, and the trail does have long drop-offs. This unpaved climb connects the Grotto to the Emerald Pools trails.

Canyon Overlook Trail

Starting at Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, this one-hour hike provides a 163-foot gain in elevation over the course of a mile. This rocky and uneven trail ends at a viewpoint for Pine Creek

Canyon and lower Zion Canyon. While this trail is mostly fenced, there are long drop-offs.

Taylor Creek Trail

You'll begin this five-mile hike at Kolob Canyons Road. It should take around 4 hours to complete and provides a 450-foot gain in elevation. Larger groups may need to split up, as this hike limits 12 people to a group. It follows the Middle Fork of Taylor Creek past two homestead cabins to Double Arch Alcove.

Timber Creek Overlook Trail

A quick hike, the Timber Creek Overlook Trail covers just one mile and 100 feet in elevation gain. It can be done in about 30 minutes. The trail follows a ridge to a small peak with views of Timber Creek, Kolob Terrace, and Pine Valley Mountains. Those looking for something less strenuous should check out these easy hikes.

Pa'rus Trail

Starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this two-hour hike covers 3 1/2 miles and rises 50 feet in elevation. A paved trail that follows the Virgin River from the South Campground to Canyon Junction, Pa'rus Trail is wheelchair accessible and is open to both bicycles and dogs.

Archeology Trail

Also starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this short half-hour hike covers just under half a mile and rises 80 feet in elevation, making it a short but steep trail. This trail offers trailside exhibits and views of several prehistoric buildings.

Grotto Trail

Starting at Zion Lodge or the Grotto, this trail connects the two locations and can be combined with the Middle Emerald Pools and Kayenta trails to create a 2 1/2-mile loop. The non-loop version should take about 30 minutes and rises 35 feet over one mile.


Riverside Walk

Starting at Temple of Sinawava, this 1 1/2-hour hike cover just over two miles and rises 57 feet in elevation. While it is wheelchair accessable, there are minor drop-offs. The trail, which is paved, offers trailside exhibits as it follows the Virgin Rivet along the bottom of a narrow canyon.

Lower Emerald Pool Trail - Temporarily Closed Due To Falling Ice

This paved trail leads to the Lower Emerald Pool and waterfalls. It also connects to the Middle Emerald Pools Trail. It should take about an hour and covers just over one mile with 69 feet in elevation gain.





Southern Utah State & National Parks

ANASAZI STATE PARK MUSEUM - This ancient Indian village in the heart of Utah's canyon country was one of the largest Anasazi communities west of the Colorado River. The site is believed to have been occupied from A.D. 1050 to 1200. The village remains largely unexcavated, but many artifacts have been uncovered and are on display in the newly remodeled museum. Anasazi State Park is in the picturesque town of Boulder on State Route 12. Group and individual picnic areas are available. There is no camping. (435) 335-7308.

BAKER - Baker Reservoir is a small lake on the Santa Clara River four miles north of Veyo on Utah State Route 18. It is a 63-acre lake with an average depth of about 20 feet. Many people come to the reservoir to camp at one of its 10 campsites and to fish. The reservoir is stocked with rainbow trout and contains brown trout, green sunfish, crayfish, redside shiner, and mountain sucker. It has picnic areas and vault toilets. There is a fee for visiting the reservoir and no boat ramp.

BRYCE CANYON - Bryce Canyon National Park is a scientist's laboratory and a child's playground. Because Bryce transcends 2,000 feet of elevation, the park exists in three distinct climatic zones: spruce/fir forest, ponderosa pine forest and pinion pine/juniper forest. This diversity of habitat provides for high biodiversity. Here at Bryce, you can enjoy over 100 species of birds, dozens of mammals, and more than a thousand plant species. (435) 834-5322.

CEDAR BREAKS - Sitting at over 10,000 feet and looking down into a half-mile deep geologic amphitheater. Come wander among timeless bristlecone pines, stand in lush meadows of wildflowers, ponder crystal-clear night skies and experience the richness of our subalpine forest. Just four miles off Utah Highway 148, you'll find the Cedar Breaks National Monument parking lot.



CORAL PINK SAND DUNES - At an elevation of 6,000 feet and 12 paved miles off U.S. Highway 89 near Kanab, this park provides a fantastic setting for camping, hiking, OHV riding or just playing in the sand. A 265-acre conservation area prohibits motorized vehicles in order to protect the Coral Pink beetle (found nowhere else in the world) and its habitat. The mule deer, jackrabbit, kit fox, coyote, and many small rodents also make the park their home. (435) 648-2800.

DEAD HORSE POINT - Dead Horse Point State Park is perhaps Utah's most spectacular state park. Dead Horse Point is a promontory of stone surrounded by steep cliffs near Moab. The overlook at Dead Horse Point is 6,000 feet above sea level. Two-thousand feet below, the Colorado River winds its way from the continental divide in Colorado

to the Gulf of California, a distance of 1,400 miles. (435) 259-2614.

DINOSAUR TRACKS - The St. George Dinosaur Discovery Site at Johnson Farm is home to exceptionally well-preserved dinosaur tracks, some displaying skin impressions. These tracks, along with hundreds of fossil fish, plants, rare dinosaur remains, invertebrates' traces, and important sedimentary structures, show evidence that this site was produced along the western edge of a large, Early Jurassic (age between 195-198 million years ago) freshwater lake. (435) 574-3466.

ENTERPRISE - There are two reservoirs in the Bull Valley Mountains 10 miles southwest of the town of Enterprise. The main one is Upper Enterprise Reservoir, about 250 acres with an average depth of about 50 feet, while Lower Enterprise Reservoir is 79 acres. Many come to the reservoir to camp, fish hike, and boat. The Honeycomb Campground



is situated between both lakes and has 21 campsites and flush toilets. There is a boat ramp on Upper Enterprise Reservoir and several fishing areas around both reservoirs. Fishermen will find rainbow trout and smallmouth bass here. Fees are charged.

FOUR CORNERS - The Four Corners is the only place in the U.S. where four states come together at one place: Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Colorado. Here, a person can put each of their hands and feet in four states at the same time. The unique landmark is on Navajo Nation land and is open for visits from the public. West of U.S. Highway 160, 40 miles southwest of Cortez, Colo. (928) 871-6436.

GRAND CANYON - A World Heritage Site encompassing 1,218,375 acres on the Colorado Plateau in northwestern Arizona. The land is semi-arid and consists of raised plateaus and structural basins typical of the southwestern United States. (928) 638-7888.

GRAND STAIRCASE-ESCALANTE NATIONAL MONUMENT - Nearly 1.9 million acres of America's public lands and located between Bryce Canyon and Glen Canyon Recreational Areas. From its namesake Grand Staircase of cliffs and terraces across the rugged Kaiparowits Plateau to the beauty of the Escalante River Canyons, the Monument's size, resources, and isolated location provide amazing opportunities.

GUNLOCK - In scenic red rock country, 15 miles northwest of St. George, lies the 240-acre Gunlock State Park and Reservoir where year-round boating, water sports, and quality fishing for bass and catfish attract visitors. Facilities include boat launching ramp and pit privies. (435) 628-2255.

LAKE MEAD - Lake Mead National Recreation Area offers a wealth of things to do and places to go year-round. Its huge lakes cater to boaters, swimmers, sunbathers and fishermen, while its desert rewards hikers, wildlife photographers, and roadside sightseers. It is also home to thousands of desert plants and animals adapted to survive in an extreme place where rain is scarce and temperatures soar. (702) 293-8990.

LAKE POWELL - In Glen Canyon National Recreation Area is one of the world's great places for houseboating! The 186-mile-long lake offers sandy beaches, cool blue water, and exceptional red-rock scenery. It is excellent for boating, skiing, kayaking, and fishing. Boat or hike to Rainbow Bridge, or explore any of its many canyons or sand dunes. (928) 608-6200.

PINE VALLEY - Pine Valley Reservoir is a beautiful place for fishermen to fish brook trout and rainbow trout. The reservoir is near the Pine Valley Recreation Complex, which has over 150 campsites with picnic and restroom facilities. This area is greener than most other parts of southwestern Utah with pine and pinion trees, and many come to enjoy camping and hiking. It is west of the town of Central. (435) 652-3100.

QUAIL LAKE - Quail Creek State Park provides excellent year-round camping, picnicking, boating, and trout and bass fishing in sunny southwest Utah. The park is three miles east of the Interstate 15 Hurricane exit on Utah State Route 9. Facilities include 23 campsites, modern restrooms, a fish cleaning station, and two covered group-use pavilions. (435) 879-2378.

SAND HOLLOW - Looking to fish? Swim? Ride your ATV in the sand? Do all that and more at Sand Hollow State Park, located between St. George and Hurricane. Bring your boat, a picnic, and some fishing gear for a fun day on the reservoir, or watch the kids swim while you relax on the beach. Load up your RV or tent and settle in for a nice campout, or ride your ATV in the dunes of Sand Mountain. (435) 680-0715.



SNOW CANYON - Named after early Utah leaders Lorenzo and Erastus Snow, Snow Canyon State Park begins just outside of Ivins and stretches northward. Spectacular scenery includes towering red and white sandstone cliffs, black lava formations, and even a waterfall that appears during heavy rain. Snow Canyon offers 16 miles of hiking trails, beautiful sand dunes, technical rock climbing sites, horseback riding, year-round camping, nature studies, and wildlife viewing. This park is a favorite for locals and visitors alike. (435) 628-2255.






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Kanab Utah City Map






