


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LOOKING BACK AND LOOKING FORWARD – CELEBRATING 20 YEARS OF ART

In 1934, a nomadic 20-year-old artist named Everett Reuss discovered the rare beauty of the raw umber and burnt sienna sandstone layers surrounding the rural community of Escalante, Utah. Later, he disappeared into the desert, becoming an iconic figure for a festival begun in his honor in 2004. Since its beginning, the festival has grown and changed, like the rich environment it celebrates.



Now called the Escalante Canyons Art Festival, the theme continues to be 'Art Inspired by Place.' The event draws artists worldwide to compete in plein air and stu-



dio competitions, contribute to art exhibits and sales, and teach workshops and demonstrations. Vendors sell their crafts and unique wares while attendees enjoy live music and guided tours. There is something for everyone.

Over the years, each new colorful layer has included the addition of local youth artists, increased plein air competitions, broadened displays, more venues for workshops and lectures in neighboring communities, and highlighted local artists as well as an artist in residence.

Dr. Lonny Granston is this year's Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument 2024 Artist in Residence. Lonny's work in previous years shows his passion for vivid images depicted with vibrant color. This year, he will experiment using both hemispheres of the brain by painting a pastel (right brain) while delivering a lecture on a medical topic (left brain). The process promises to be fascinating. See the website for all scheduled events.

Louise Fischman is the 2024 Festival featured artist. She describes her artistic inspiration as follows: "I create paintings inspired by the earth's processes and ener-

gies. The seemingly solid geological forms in a landscape give way to cracks, seams, and flow lines that mingle, cross, and compress as they melt into fantastic patterns. I continue to be inspired by this mysterious and beautiful occurrence." Her paintings will surely inspire all who see them.

The live music for this year's festival is as diverse as the landscape backdrop. From David Hauze and Shannon Ullman's folksy melodies on harp and guitar to local artist Kenny Hall's western singing to Pasos Gigante's harmonic artisans to Sihasin, the Benally Navajo siblings whose music has a message and has repeatedly been recognized with awards across the globe, there is something for every ear to enjoy.

For the visual arts, standard artist registration ends on September 3 for Plein Air and Studio Work. All registered artists must stop by the Stamp-in location to verify their registration, acknowledge that they have read the Rules and Guidelines, and collect their name tags and any other orientation materials.

Plein Air needs to be stamped Friday, September 20, through Monday, September The Paint-Out is the only other category that needs to be stamped when artists have 24 hours to complete a painting anywhere along Scenic Byway 12 between Red Canyon on the west and Torrey on the east end.

Drawing is this year's 20th Anniversary Bonus Category. Drawings can be plein air or studio. Charcoal, pen and ink, marker, and graphite pencil are accepted mediums. All drawings must be black-and-white or grayscale.

Special categories include Nocturne, Miniatures, Drawing, Paint-Out, and Junior (Grades K-12 with four sub-categories). These special competitions broaden the challenge and opportunity for those interested in expanding their options. The information for artists lists more details, including cash award amounts.

Whether you are interested in music, creative writing, or the visual arts as a creator or appreciator, the 20th anniversary of the Escalante Canyons Art Festival has something for all to enjoy in the inspiring setting of Southern Utah's Grand Staircase Escalante National Monument. We hope to see you there.

UTAH TECH UNIVERSITY'S SEARS ART MUSEUM GK REISER: STEPPING STONES

Utah Tech University's Sears Art Museum is showcasing the abstract paintings and sculptures of artist GK Reiser in its latest exhibition, "GK Reiser: Stepping

The exhibition will open Sept. 13 with a reception from 6:30 to 8 PM in the Sears Art Museum, located in the Eccles Fine Arts Center on the Utah Tech campus. "Stepping Stones," which is open to the public and free to attend, will be open Mondays through Fridays from 9 AM to 5 PM through Nov. 8.

"GK Reiser is one of the most interest-





ing artists working in Utah today," James Peck, director and curator of the Sears Art Museum, said. "His paintings show him to be a master of color, design, and abstraction while his sculptures, sourced from dead trees, are wonderful organic visual puzzles."

Reiser, who has lived in Escalante for over a decade, has worked with various media, including stained glass, drawing, sculpture, painting, and furniture making. He paints exclusively with acrylics because of their quick-drying nature, which allows for a dynamic, layered approach. He often begins with detailed sketches that serve as a guide but evolve organically during creation. Reiser's method balances planning and spontaneity, resulting in structured and instinctive paintings.

Reiser's sculptural work evolved from his furniture-making background. He sources his materials from dead trees within Escalante, transforming them into unique sculptures using chainsaws and hand tools. His intuitive and adaptive approach allows the natural imperfections of the wood to shape the final form.

"There might be an idea when I start, but somehow, the tree itself will change the process," Reiser said.

5 BEST SO. UTAH CAR CAMPING SPOTS YOU'VE NEVER HEARD OF By Dreamland Safari

with awe-inspiring landscapes and hidden car camping spots that promise solitude and stunning views. However, these breathtaking locations often require navigating remote, unpaved roads. Carry a shovel, extra water, warm layers, and GPS communication - or consider hiring a licensed outfitter to ensure safety.



Cottonwood Road: Cutting through Grand Staircase-Escalante, Cottonwood Road offers remote desert scenery, colorful cliffs, canyons, and abundant hiking opportunities. Scenic, free camp spots abound and are generally accessible by 2WD vehicles - unless the road is wet. No facilities.

Alstrom Point: For breathtaking views of Lake Powell, Alstrom Point is the place to be. The rugged dirt approach requires a highclearance vehicle, especially in the final miles. The reward is camping on the cliff's edge with panoramic views of Navajo Mountain and Lake Powell. Camping is primitive and free, but with no facilities. Don't have the right vehicle? Local outfitters offer overnight tours.

Paria Townsite: A hidden gem between



Southern Utah is a road tripper's dream, Page, AZ, and Kanab, UT, Paria Townsite offers free camping with stunning views of rainbowcolored badlands. Once a movie set, this quiet spot allows you to appreciate the vivid hues of the landscape, particularly at sunset. It's accessible by 2WD vehicles unless the road is wet, and there's an outhouse at the old movie site.

White Pocket: Located within Vermilion Cliffs National Monument, White Pocket is a paradise for those with a high clearance 4x4 vehicle. The challenging drive through deep sand leads to a surreal landscape of swirling rock formations. Primitive camping is free, and there are no facilities. For a hassle-free experience, consider an overnight camping tour with a local outfitter like Kanab-based Dreamland Safari Tours.



Toroweap Overlook: This remote North Rim spot lets you watch the Colorado River churn through the canyon's inner gorge 3,000ft below your feet. The 60-mile dirt road to reach here is rough and culminates in a rock-crawling stretch that requires high clearance and 4 wheel drive. An advance permit is needed, and the campground has outhouses and picnic tables but no water. Prefer that someone else take care of permits, transport, camping gear and food? Fully outfitted overnight tours are available through guide services like Dreamland.

And, yes, we know that White Pocket and Toroweap are *technically* in Northern Arizona - but they are most commonly accessed from Kanab, Southern Utah's favorite adventure basecamp. Where will you camp next?



MARVELOUS MOONS By Kat Troche, NASA Night Sky Network, Eric Sims, Stellar Vista Observatory

Did you know there are more than 200 moons in our Solar System? Most of them orbit Jupiter and Saturn. This September, Saturn rises around 9 PM, and Jupiter rises around midnight. Come to Stellar Vista Observatory's (SVO) next star party (details below) to see Saturn for yourself!



As of August 2024, Saturn has 146 identified moons in its orbit. They range in size, the smallest being a few hundred feet across, to Titan, the second largest moon in our solar system. Titan was briefly explored in 2005 with the Huygens probe as part of the Cassini-Huygens mission. NASA's mission Dragonfly is set to return to Titan in the 2030s.

Saturn's moon, Enceladus, was also

explored by the Cassini mission, revealing plumes of ice that erupt from below the surface, adding to the brilliance of Saturn's rings. Much like our own Moon, Enceladus remains tidally locked with Saturn, presenting the same side towards its host planet at all times.

Jupiter has 95 moons, four of which can be easily seen with a small pair of binoculars or a small telescope. They were first discovered by Galileo Galilei in 1610:

Ganymede: Largest moon in our solar system, and larger than the planet Mercury! It has its own magnetic field and a possible saltwater ocean beneath the surface.

Callisto: This heavily cratered moon is the third largest in our solar system. Although Callisto is the furthest away of the Galilean moons, it only takes 17 days to complete an orbit around Jupiter.

Io: The closest moon to Jupiter and the most volcanically active body in our solar system!

Europa: Jupiter's smallest moon also happens to be the strongest candidate for a liquid ocean beneath the surface. NASA's Europa Clipper is set to launch in October 2024 and will determine if this moon has conditions suitable to support life.

SVO has two public star parties scheduled for September: On Friday, September 13, at 7 PM, we will celebrate International Observe the Moon Night at the Kanab City Library. On Friday, September 20, at 8:30 PM, join us on the observation deck at Coral Pink Sand Dunes State Park to see Saturn, Scorpius, and more.


Admission to the performances is free, and no ticket reservations are required.

It's time for the Harvest here at Zion Vineyards. We started picking our whites in mid-August, now we are picking the red varietals. We have 8 more harvests to go. Each varietal ripens at a different time; therefore, we have a harvest for each type of grape. We determine the ripeness using a refractometer, which tells us the Brix level, (sugar concentration) of the grapes. The winemaker determines when they are ready, then we send out emails to our

Volunteers to help with picking.

If you want to join us picking, come in for a Tasting and sign up to Volunteer. We send out emails and take the first 20 RSVPs. We meet at the Tasting Room at 7 AM, start picking at 7:30, go no later than 11:30, and break for lunch. You may watch as the winemaker crushes the grapes, then receive a gift, and you're done for the day.

Our wines include Cabernet Sauvignon, it showcases the bold flavors of wine produced in Southern Utah. With dark fruit flavors of black currants, black cherry, tobacco and smoke with notes of vanilla and



clove. One of our Red Blends is the Miscela Rossa, processed in an Old World, Bordeaux Style, it is 60% Cabernet Sauvignon, 30% Zinfandel, and 10% Tempranillo. A blend that exhibits the best of all three varietals. It is Fruit forward with delicate notes of earth and smoke and dark fruit flavors of black currants, plum and blueberry with a chocolatey finish. The Tempranillo Reserve is a Spanish varietal, it is aged in a brandnew French Oak barrel, this designates our Reserves. This wine is dry and full bodied with notes of red and Bing cherry, dried fig and spice.

The Owner and Vintner, Michael Jackson considers this his Legacy. He has had a Love of Wine most of his life, and Zion Vineyards is a dream fulfilled. Our Winemaker Robert Cec is self-taught, and he has created some amazing and Award-Winning wines for you to enjoy. Reds with depth of character and bold style, and Whites with medium to high acidity and with well-balanced fruit and citrus notes.







IS THE ECONOMY HEADED IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION? By Lisa Rutherford



The election is looming. There's a lot of talk about the economy. I get that people are concerned about it, and I sympathize. But here's the thing. I lived through the 1970s and 1980s

when inflation was high. I was a young mother with a child trying to make ends meet in Alaska. I remember adding up grocery items in my head before getting to check out to make sure I had enough money to pay. It wasn't easy. I also remember not wasting money. I didn't buy a lot of clothes, and when I did, I usually bought them at thrift stores. We didn't go out to eat much and certainly didn't buy a latte every day! I was able to buy my first home, a condo, in 1986, when rents were going up drastically. Although a mortgage seemed daunting at that time with the high interest rates, it also seemed the only way to stabilize my expenses.

Don't get me wrong. The high rates today are making home buying particularly challenging when home costs have risen so much due to a variety of reasons including a limited supply for new buyers. Those of us who have homes with low-interest mortgages are now reluctant to sell, making the market even more challenging.

People complain about the economy being bad. However, I notice lots of cars

with new car stickers, lots of people eating out and shopping, and lots of people traveling. Have we created a country of people who expect to be given things all the time but are unwilling to save to get the things they want like a home? Some don't have the luxury of saving, but many do. Plus, it's confusing when we're told that consuming is good for the economy.

As we head into the final weeks before the November 5 election, both candidates are having to deal with the economic situation and convince voters that they are the candidate who can save folks' "bacon" – literally and figuratively. Trump is asking voters if they're better off now under the Biden/Harris administration than they were when he was president. But then we have to think, if things were so great then, why wasn't Trump re-elected? Don't give me the excuse that the election was stolen because that's been proven to be false.

When Trump was in office, prior to the covid pandemic, many Americans were experiencing the benefits of an economy that since 2010 had been clawing its way out of the Great Recession (2007) and people over spent: bigger homes with low interest rates, bigger vehicles, and more. Now those things may be adding more burden and costs are being racked up on credit card debt, which is skyrocketing.

Here are some facts to help understand where we've been and may be headed.

GDP (Gross Domestic Product) is an indicator of how the economy has fared. "Real GDP" factors in inflation and other critical factors. Real GDP from 2016-2020, during Trump's administration, ranged from 1.8% to -2.2% (the first year of covid) with a high in 2018 of 3% due to deficit spending. From 2021 (Biden's first year in office) until 2023 real GDP ranged from 5.8% to 2.5%, even with the covid-19 vaccine, inflation increases, and bank failures being factored in. The current estimate of real gpd from the BEA (Bureau of Economic Analysis) for the second quarter of 2024 is 2.8%. Trump's high was 3% while Biden's

eating was 5.8%.


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By 2020 the unemployment rate had dropped back down below 4% after reaching a high of 10% in 2010 as we were working our way out of the Great Recession following the housing meltdown. There was a steady drop from 2010 under Obama to 2016, when Trump was elected, and it continued that downward trend after that. At the same time, the workforce grew slightly and inched above 63% by 2020 after lower participation during the post-recession years. But it was still below pre-recession levels.

By August 2024 the unemployment rate was at 4.3%, just .3% higher than the 2020 rate, and economists are arguing whether this signals the start of a recession. Economics is a tricky and complex field. Economists argue about the finer points of any economic situation. Recently, I heard it said that if an economist were in a room alone, they would argue with themselves! So, when it comes to predictions about our economy, it can get a bit dicey.

Trump's "drill baby drill" promise won't help jobs. The industry has not created new jobs for years in spite of the production increases over the past six years. It might help consumer prices due to shipping costs. But production was high in mid-2022 and so were consumer prices.

Each of us will have to look at our own lives to see how the economy has affected us. I know that many prices continue to be high, particularly in the grocery store. But prices are up just 1.1% over the past twelve months. And, it's important to remember that the four recessions since the end of the Cold War occurred during the presidencies of Republicans: George H.W. Bush, George W. Bush (Obama inherited this) and Donald Trump. Now, there are various reasons for this, but it's still a fact. The economy has performed better under Democrats. Don't bite off your nose to spite your face. Get past the campaign rhetoric and promises and look at the facts!

RED ROCK FILM FESTIVAL RETURNS IN SEPTEMBER

The 18th Annual Red Rock Film Festival has moved its dates back to September – it initially began as a film series in 2004 in Springdale and now is in Cedar City with several full-length features and shorts of all genres such as dramatic fiction, animation and documentaries. As an international film festival the films are presented in multiple languages with English subtitles and used international program directors Hossein Nuri of Tehran of Iran for documentaries and the Market section and Goran Šporcic from Croatia for the fiction films.

Šporcic who recently won an award for a film at the Lytham Film Festival in England and isfilm instructor said,

This is accompanied by several previewers, and the programmer's scores only account for 1/6 of the tallied vote and in some cases this committee can out vote the Program Directors. Directed by journalist Frédérique Buck, her publication "I'm not a Refugee" was a double winner of the Letzebuerger Buchprais in 2017



On similar themes is another favorite of his was Utah Filmmaker Brandt Andersen's "The Strangers' Case". Produced in Jordan the feature film follow five narrative stories of struggle and escape including a doctor and her daughter at an Aleppo hospital forced to make a difficult decision, a soldier witnesses heinous crimes towards men, women and children in service of the Syrian regime, a smuggler in Turkey tries desperately to plan

Hossein Nuri shared "The Strangers' Case" as one of his favorites, including another Utah Filmmaker, Joseph Adam LeBaron's documentary short "Whales of the High Desert". The film explores an Englishman who was reported to have brought whales to Great Salt Lake in the 1870s with a message that we have to keep the real Lake alive that can support the legends. Mojtaba Bahadori's "On Melting Snow" is another favorite about artist Sophie Cauvin who takes on a journey to engage with transformed landscapes and reunite these fragmented memories through her art creations.



Nuri has a long history in the arts. As a 17-year-old boy, he was tortured by SAVAK for writing a play in defense of human rights and lost the ability to move his hands and legs. But he didn't lose hope and continued painting with his mouth. He has held more than a hundred individual exhibitions and received numerous awards in theater. He is also the writer and director of "My Arms Flow"

He was attracted to the Red Rock Film Festival's selection progress, which gave submitters a real chance. He said, "Red Rock's selection system has given logic to the abstract process of judging films, which is very personal and interpretive. The result has been a meaningful move to realize justice for filmmakers who submit their films after the challenging process of production."

SUPER/MAN: THE CHRISTOPHER REEVE STORY (PG-13)

"Super/Man: The Christopher Reeve Story" Is This Year's Most Moving Film

Pound for pound, I don't know that there will be a more emotionally resonant film in 2024 than "Super/Man: The Christopher Reeve Story." I first saw this moving documentary back in January at the Sundance Film Festival and quite frankly, I haven't been able to stop thinking about it.

Of course, I've always been a fan of Christopher Reeve and in fact, I will always maintain that his casting as Superman remains the superhero casting coup to which all others will forever be measured. As the man of steel, Reeve did so much more than make audiences truly believe a man could fly. He also made us believe that Superman and Clark Kent were actually two different people and I always felt like that was the true key to the overall effectiveness of "Superman" as a movie. Perhaps even more than the spectacular special effects, the incredible production design, John Williams's unforgettable score, and the hit film's much talked about reverence to the source material. That said, "Superman" is pure fantasy. This stellar documentary by comparison is real in every sense of the word.

"Super/Man: The Christopher Reeve Story" traces Reeve's career from his humble beginnings as a classically trained actor to his hitting the big time after being handpicked by director Richard Donner to play the world's most famous superhero. Following his legendary turn as the man of steel, Reeve would appear in several other noteworthy films including "Deathtrap," "The Remains of the Day," "Noises Off," "Somewhere in Time," and "Street Smart," just to name a few but ultimately, his life would forever be altered following a tragic equestrian accident that would leave him permanently paralyzed.

As directed by Ian Bonhote and Peter Ettedugi, "Super/Man" is inspirational and moving in all of the ways you'd expect, but it certainly doesn't shy away from the darker aspects of Reeve's highs and lows. Included;

A strained relationship between he and his father as well as thoughts of suicide following a horrific accident that very well could have taken his life. Beyond that, "Super/Man" is punctuated by rare behind-thescenes footage and candid interviews with the likes of Reeve himself as well as his loving wife, his adoring children, and many of his lifelong industry friends (i.e. Susan Sarandon, the aforementioned Donner, and a compassionate Robin Williams.)

As was the case with last year's stellar Michael J. Fox documentary, "Still," "Super/Man" emerges as so much more than a tribute to a world-famous actor. This is a movie filled with real pathos. It's a story of courage and resiliency to be sure. In short, it's a multifaceted look at a real-life superman and how, in many ways, Reeve was able to take a horrific negative and turn it into a monumental positive.

Some might argue that "Super/Man: The Christopher Reeve Story" is an easy



sell given the subject matter but believe me when I tell you, that makes this documentary no less powerful. This is moving stuff and by the time it comes to a close, you really will believe a man can fly. On a final note, you'd be well-advised to take a box of Kleenex with you because you're going to need it.

"Super/Man: The Christopher Reeve Story" will receive a limited theatrical run on September 21st and 25th, courtesy of Warner Brothers and Fathom Events. You can expect a streaming service debut shortly thereafter.







Safety Tips For Zion

Emergencies

For 24-hour emergency response, call 911 or (435) 772-3322. The Zion Canyon Medical Clinic is located in Springdale near the south entrance to the park. For hours, please call (435) 772-3226. Other medical clinics are located in Hurricane. The nearest hospitals are in St. George, Cedar City, and Kanab.

Hydrate and use refillable water bottles

It is easy to get dehydrated while hiking and walking in the desert, so pack along extra water, and be sure to take rest and water breaks on long hikes. There are a number of places to refill your water bottles in Zion National Park

including the visitors' center and Zion Lodge as well as a new hydration station at the Springdale bus stop in front of The Bumbleberry Inn and Zion Canyon Brew Pub.

Be cautious near steep cliffs

Falls from cliffs on trails can result in death. Loose sand or pebbles on stone are very slippery. Be careful of edges when using cameras or binoculars. Never throw or roll rocks because there may be hikers below you. Stay on the trail. Stay back from cliff edges. Observe posted warnings. Please

watch children. Watch for flash floods

All narrow canyons are potentially hazardous. Flash floods, often caused by storms miles away, are a real danger and can be life threatening. You are assuming a risk when entering a narrow canyon. Your safety is your responsibility.

Tips To Minimize Your Impact

Pack it in, pack it out & use recycling bins

Each month, Zion National Park pays many thousands of dollars to haul away waste collected from garbage cans and recycling bins. Your experience and that of everyone who visits Zion Canyon can be improved by never littering and making sure you pick up any trash you see along the way. Recycling bins are placed strategically throughout Zion Park, and it is highly encouraged for everyone to use them.



Please stay on the marked trails

Hiking off trails can lead to loss of vegetation, soil compaction, erosion, and unsightly scars on the landscape. Remember, if you bring it in, please pack it out.

Go before you go

It is always a good idea to use the restroom before you begin a hike since facilities are limited to select locations. If you do need to take care of your business, please pack it back out.

Be respectful to the wildlife

Feeding, harming, or capturing wild animals is illegal and can cause injury or death to the animal. Animals can become aggressive beggars when fed.

Please leave it how you found it

It is illegal to remove anything from Zion National Park, including flowers, rocks, or anything else that you might find. Do not write or carve on natural surfaces.

Get some great hiking in

Spend a day in Springdale

Springdale is unique to our national park system in that it is almost completely surrounded by Zion National Park. So when you're in Springdale, you're right in the middle of Zion Canyon.

Catch an even

Not only does Zion Brew Pub have live music every Saturday, the property also hosts a handful of events throughout the year, as do the Bit and Spur restaurant, Tanner Amphitheater, Bumbleberry Inn, Wildcat Willies, and several other locations.

Consider getting up extra early or trekking out midday after the initial rush has flooded in.


Consider coming back again in the low season

Starting in the late fall, the number of visitors to Zion Canyon starts to dwindle, and by December it's significantly less than in the heat of the summer. It is simply a different experience to see Zion in the winter with the snow-capped monoliths. Most hikes are still accessible and are less crowded. You can also drive to the Temple of Sinawava parking lot. The shuttles stop running from November until March.

Check out Kolob Canyons & Kolob Terrace Road





Zion National Park Shuttle Info

ZION 2024 FALL SHUTTLE SCHEDULE INFO

The seasons are changing in Zion National Park! Every year, the National Park Service (NPS) adjusts shuttle schedules and campground availability throughout the year. Here is what you need to know to plan your visit:

Fall Personal Vehicle Access in Zion Canyon

From March through late November, access to the Zion Canyon Scenic Drive is by shuttle bus only. Private vehicles are allowed to access the Scenic Drive only when the Shuttle System is not in operation.

- You do not need a ticket or reservation to ride the park shuttle or enter the park.
 During the shuttle season, visitors cannot drive personal vehicles on Zion Canyon Scenic Drive.
- Shuttles arrive about every 15 minutes on the Springdale Line (outside the park) and about every 5-10 minutes on the Zion Canyon Line (inside the park).

Shuttle Service Has Resumed

Zion Canyon Line

- First bus departs Zion Canyon Visitor Center to Temple of Sinawava at 6 AM through Sept. 15th, then at 7 AM from Sept. 16th to Nov. 2nd.
- Last bus departs Zion Canyon Visitor Center to Temple of Sinawava at 7 PM through Sept. 15th, then at 5 PM from Sept. 16th until Nov. 2nd.
- Last bus departs the Temple of Sinawava to Zion Canyon Visitor Center at 8:15 PM through Sept 15th, then at 7:15 PM until Nov. 2nd.

Springdale Line

• First bus into town from Springdale (Stop #9) is at 7 AM through Sept. 15th,



then at 8 AM from Sept. 16th to Nov. 2nd.
• Last bus into town from Springdale
Stop #1 (Zion Canyon Village)) is at 8 PM
through Sept. 15th, then at 7 PM from
Sept. 16th to Nov. 2nd.

Camping

Watchman Campground is open yearround, and you can make a reservation up to six months before your visit at www. recreation.gov or by calling 1-877-444-6777. Plan ahead and make arrangements for where you will stay before you get to the park.

South Campground is closed for a long-term rehabilitation project.

Lava Point Campground is a 1-hour drive from Zion Canyon. Reservation only.

The NPS posts updates on the park's operating hours and seasons webpage when hours change.

Attend a Zion Canyon Ranger Led Patio Talk

Free ranger talks happen outside of the Zion Canyon Visitor Center every day at:

- 10 AM
- · 11:30 PM

No matter when you visit, be prepared for crowds and remember:

- Parking fills early year-round. You may have to wait to enter Zion Canyon Scenic Drive if parking is full there.
- Watch out for pedestrians and bicyclists if you are driving.
- Stay on trails and avoid walking in the road.
- Put your pass in your pocket. Don't forget your park pass or receipt in a hotel room or at home.
- Ride your bike on the road or the Pa'Rus Trail. Bicycling is not allowed on any other trails in the park. If you are riding in the road, you must stop to let buses pass you.
- The NPS may temporarily close roads if traffic is congested or there is nowhere for drivers to park.
- In general, fewer people visit Zion on weekdays than weekends. Consider arriving early or after 3 PM to avoid the busiest times of day.

Plan ahead and prepare

If you cannot park in Zion or if all of our campsites are full, research nearby communities and public lands to learn about other recreational activities and lodging. Always recreate responsibly and respect private owners' property and facilities.

Follow Leave No Trace practices everywhere in the park and beyond; be sure to pack out all your trash.

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
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
Zion Canyon Shuttle Map







FEATURED HIKE: JENNY'S CANYON TRAIL IN SNOW CANYON STATE PARK By Tom Garrison

Location: Snow Canyon State Park, St. George, Utah

Difficulty: Easy with no major obsta-

Average Hiking Time: Less than one hour at a leisurely pace with many photo stops. (The hike is less than a one-mile round trip.)

Elevations: The trailhead is approximately 3,150 feet in elevation with about a 75-foot elevation change from the lowest to the highest point (top of the overlook trail).

 $\begin{tabular}{ll} \textbf{Family Friendly:} Yes, there are no difficult sections. \end{tabular}$

Getting There: From St. George, go north on State Highway 18 (Bluff Street) and turn left (west) onto Snow Canyon Parkway. Continue approximately 3.6 miles and turn right (north) at Snow Canyon Drive. The Snow Canyon State Park south entrance is .8 miles ahead. Pay the fee and continue north on Snow Canyon Drive .5 miles past the entrance station and park in

the signed Jenny's Canyon Trail trailhead/parking area (there is room for about five cars) on the right (east). There are no toilets or water at the trailhead.

I'm pretty sure the hike to Jenny's Canyon in Snow Canyon State Park is the shortest hike my wife, Deb, and I have done in many years of southwest desert hiking. While short, less than a one-mile round trip, it is well worth the minimum time required.

Deb and I have explored the American Southwest for over 35 years and trekked along nearly 250 different trails. While virtually all of it is wonderful, slot canyons are especially enjoyable. The high swoopy rock walls and not knowing what's around the next bend. Maybe barely squeezing through a particularly narrow section. Yes!

Snow Canyon State Park, just outside of St. George, has one particular slot canyon we overlooked. It is a very short canyon but with all the elements of a wonderful slot—Jenny's Canyon. If you are a novice slot canyon explorer, this hike is a great introduction.

The canyon is named after a young woman, Jennifer Patchett, who fell to her death from cliffs in Snow Canyon State Park in 1994. Since that time, the canyon has borne her name. Some reports I found via Internet research say she fell from cliffs that rim Jenny's Canyon; others do not mention a specific area in the park where she fell.

In 1959, the 7,400-acre Snow Canyon State Park was created, and it has views that rival the much better-known Zion National Park. There is evidence that the Ancestral Puebloans/Anasazi used the canyon for hunting and gathering and were followed about 1200 AD by the Paiutes. In the 1850s, Mormon pioneers discovered the area. The Park is home to a diversity of plant and wildlife species. We only saw a couple of birds.

We arrived at the trailhead at about


9 AM on a late August morning. The sky was Utah blue, and the temperature was in the high 70s. The trailhead elevation is approximately 3,150 feet, with about a 75-foot elevation change from the lowest to the highest point (top of the overlook trail). Since we started fairly early, we only shared this popular trail with seven other hikers.

Just as we parked, another car pulled in behind us. We got to talking with that couple and did the hike with them—Kent and Sarah. Good people visiting from Canada who are now our new best friends.

We assembled our gear and headed east, descending into a sandy wash and walking toward red rock cliffs. After crossing the wash, we made a small uphill climb to Jenny's Canyon. The trail is mostly sandy up to the canyon mouth and a little rocky thereafter.

Northgate Peaks

The Northgate Peaks trail in the Kolob Terrace section of Zion National Park is an amazing trail with spectacular views. The trail itself is nearly flat, making it a perfect hike for families.

To reach the Northgate Peaks trailhead, take State Route 9 to the town of Virgin. Turn left onto Kolob Terrace Road. Drive for 15.7 miles through increasingly spectacular country until the short spur road (on the right) for the Wildcat Trailhead is reached. Drive a few hundred feet to the large parking area.

The trail heads east across grassy plains and stands of Ponderosa Pine with dynamite views of the towering Pine Valley Peak to the west. Soon the trail will be fully in the forest with limited views. After 0.9 miles, the junction with the Hop Valley trail is reached. Continue east, and 0.1 miles further, the junction with the Northgate Peaks Trail is reached. Head south on this trail for another 1.1 miles until the end of the official trail is reached at a rocky basalt bluff with epic views of the Northgate Peaks to the east and west and of North Guardian Angel to the south.

For families with young children, this makes an excellent turnaround spot.

Gifford Canyon

Gifford Canyon offers a nice stroll through a sandy wash and is very charming when water is running. This hike is nearly 3 miles long and will take about 2 hours to finish.



To start this hike, park in the lot located immediately east of the Zion/Mt. Carmel Tunnel. The trail begins at the backside of the restrooms at the back of the parking lot. There will be a steep, sandy path to climb down before you enter Pine Creek slot. Follow the path upstream for almost 75 feet, and look for a 15-foot wall of slickrock. You can scramble up the rock or look for the beaten path on the backside of the rock.

On top of this wall is a narrow dirt path that is crowded by rock and vegetation. It winds around the mountain to a dead end with a beautiful view of the mountain where the Canyon Overlook Trail is located, opposite is Gifford Canyon.

The path will lead past stone bridge and to another minor slickrock climb. At the end of the canyon, there is a circle of cliffs preventing further exploration without climbing up the sandstone.

Chinle Trail

Chinle Trail is an off-the-beaten-path trail located in the lower elevation west desert wilderness area, offering wide vistas, desert landscapes, and a reprieve from the more touristy trails in the park. Though it's a long trail, it's a mellow hike that can be cut off whenever you feel like turning around. It's a great hike with kids because it's not treacherous, slippery, or steep. Avoid it after snow or rain as it will be muddy.

The Chinle Trailhead starts outside of Zion, south of Springdale. If you are coming from St. George, the turn is about a block before you hit the apple orchard and stand as you leave Rockville off of State Route 9. There is a parking area off the right of Anasazi Way near the Anasazi Plateau housing development. If you hit houses, you missed it. And yes, the trail starts below the housing development and takes you right through it. Don't worry though, it doesn't last long.

Shortly after you get through the housing development, you will hit a sign letting you know you are entering the Zion Wilderness. At this point, you can breathe a sigh of relief, because you have gotten away from civilization to enjoy nature, and chances are that you won't see another soul until you return to your car.

The route is moderate with a gentle uphill climb to an alcove, but plan for a strenuous hike if you continue to the East

The route begins right off the highway. Drive to the pullout near the second drainage on the north side of the State Route 9, about 0.8 miles after the smaller tunnel. Walk carefully along the road about 150 yards and drop down into a sandy bowl on the north side of SR-9. There is a trail for a short distance, and then the sand turns

choose to walk on, depending on your sense of balance. A short distance off the road, filled pools carved into the rocks appear. Ponderosa Pines and Juniper trees twisted by the wind are a good backdrop to the reds and whites ribboned through the rocks.

Overlook Trail

The Overlook Trail is a short, beautiful hike located on the east side of Zion National Park, just outside the Mt. Carmel tunnel. The hike is about one mile roundtrip, and it usually takes people about an hour. It is definitely one of the easier hikes in Zion, but it's still considered a moderate-level hike due to a few exposed areas and sandstone pathways, which can be slippery.

The Overlook trailhead lies right outside of the Mt. Carmel tunnel by the ranger booth. Exit the tunnel too quickly and you'll miss it.

It begins with a staircase carved out of the sandstone leading up and away from the road. Soon, you'll be walking along the side of the mountain and looking down into a thin crevice known as Pine Creek Canyon. At about halfway, you'll walk across a bridge that wraps around a corner and leads to an area of recessed rock wet with the moisture that caused it to erode and be filled with ferns growing out of the sandstone.

The East Rim Trail

After positioning a vehicle or making shuttle arrangements at the Weeping Rock parking lot, watch for the small "trailhead" sign along the Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, immediately west of the east entrance booth.

This trail is said to be one of the most scenic in all of Zion National Park and is on many lists as one of the best hikes in Utah. This trek begins on the east side of the park and climbs over 1,400 feet to the rim. This hike begins with a backdoor view of Checkerboard Mesa as it skirts Clear Creek for a short time and steadily and gently climbs through a juniper and pine forest. On top of the mesa, scenery gets interesting as a spectacular view of Echo Canyon takes center stage.

Warning: These hikes are very popular and often overcrowded. If you are feeling up to some of the more difficult hikes, try some of these popular hikes.

Angels Landing via West Rim Trail


Possibly the most popular hike in Zion, Angels Landing takes around four hours to complete, covers just under 5 1/2 miles, and requires a permit to hike. As you work your way up the 1,488-foot change in elevation, you'll want to look out for long drop-offs. This hike is not for young children or people with a fear of heights. Be sure to enjoy, but be careful along the last section of the hike, which is a steep, narrow ridge to the summit. The hike starts at The Grotto.

The Narrows via Riverside Walk

A full-day hike at 8 hours, the Narrows can pose extra dangers depending on the weather. High water levels can prevent access to the Narrows, so be sure to check with the visitor center before beginning this 9 1/2-mile hike. You'll start this hike at Temple of Sinawava.

Kolob Arch via La Verkin Creek Trail

Getting to Kolob Arch via the La Verkin Creek Trail follows Timber and La Verkin creeks and connects to the trail to Kolob Arch, one of the world's largest

freestanding arches. A full-day hike, it will take around 8 hours to finish the 14-fourteen mile trip. This hike starts at Kolob Canyons Road.

If you are looking for something more moderate, try some of these mid-range

Kayenta Trail

This two-hour hike starts at the Grotto and goes for two miles. You'll gain 150 feet in elevation, and the trail does have long drop-offs. This unpaved climb connects the Grotto to the Emerald Pools trails.

Canyon Overlook Trail

Starting at Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, this one-hour hike provides a 163-foot gain in elevation over the course of a mile. This rocky and uneven trail ends at a viewpoint for Pine Creek Canyon and lower Zion Canyon. While this trail is mostly fenced,

there are long drop-offs.

Taylor Creek Trail

You'll begin this five-mile hike at Kolob Canyons Road. It should take around 4 hours to complete and provides a 450-foot gain in elevation. Larger groups may need to split up, as this hike limits 12 people to a group. It follows the Middle Fork of Taylor Creek past two homestead cabins to Double Arch Alcove.

Timber Creek Overlook Trail

A quick hike, the Timber Creek Overlook Trail covers just one mile and 100 feet in elevation gain. It can be done in about 30 minutes. The trail follows a ridge to a small peak with views of Timber Creek. Kolob Terrace, and Pine Valley Mountains.

Those looking for something less strenuous should check out these easy

Pa'rus Trail

Starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this two-hour hike covers 3 1/2 miles and rises 50 feet in elevation. A paved trail that follows the Virgin River from the South Campground to Canvon Junction. Pa'rus Trail is wheelchair accessible and is open to both bicycles and dogs.

Archeology Trail

Also starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this short half-hour hike covers just under half a mile and rises 80 feet in elevation, making it a short but steep trail. This trail offers trailside exhibits and views of several prehistoric buildings.

Grotto Trail

Starting at Zion Lodge or the Grotto. this trail connects the two locations and can be combined with the Middle Emerald Pools and Kayenta trails to create a 2 1/2mile loop. The non-loop version should take about 30 minutes and rises 35 feet over one



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Southern Utah State & National Parks

ANASAZI STATE PARK MUSEUM - This ancient Indian village in the heart of Utah's canyon country was one of the largest Anasazi communities west of the Colorado River. The site is believed to have been occupied from A.D. 1050 to 1200. The village remains largely unexcavated, but many artifacts have been uncovered and are on display in the newly remodeled museum. Anasazi State Park is in the picturesque town of Boulder on State Route 12. Group and individual picnic areas are available. There is no camping. (435) 335-7308.

BAKER - Baker Reservoir is a small lake on the Santa Clara River four miles north of Veyo on Utah State Route 18. It is a 63-acre lake with an average depth of about 20 feet. Many people come to the reservoir to camp at one of its 10 campsites and to fish. The reservoir is stocked with rainbow trout and contains brown trout, green sunfish, crayfish, redside shiner, and mountain sucker. It has picnic areas and vault toilets. There is a fee for visiting the reservoir and no boat ramp.

BRYCE CANYON - Bryce Canyon National Park is a scientist's laboratory and a child's playground. Because Bryce transcends 2,000 feet of elevation, the park exists in three distinct climatic zones: spruce/fir forest, ponderosa pine forest and pinion pine/juniper forest. This diversity of habitat provides for high biodiversity. Here at Bryce, you can enjoy over 100 species of birds, dozens of mammals, and more than a thousand plant species. (435) 834-5322.

CEDAR BREAKS - Sitting at over 10,000 feet and looking down into a half-mile deep geologic amphitheater. Come wander among timeless bristlecone pines, stand in lush meadows of wildflowers, ponder crystal-clear night skies and experience the richness of our subalpine forest. Just four miles off Utah Highway 148, you'll find the Cedar Breaks National Monument parking lot.



CORAL PINK SAND DUNES - At an elevation of 6,000 feet and 12 paved miles off U.S. Highway 89 near Kanab, this park provides a fantastic setting for camping, hiking, OHV riding or just playing in the sand. A 265-acre conservation area prohibits motorized vehicles in order to protect the Coral Pink beetle (found nowhere else in the world) and its habitat. The mule deer, jackrabbit, kit fox, coyote, and many small rodents also make the park their home. (435) 648-2800.

DEAD HORSE POINT - Dead Horse Point State Park is perhaps Utah's most spectacular state park. Dead Horse Point is a promontory of stone surrounded by steep cliffs near Moab. The overlook at Dead Horse Point is 6,000 feet above sea level. Two-thousand feet below, the Colorado River winds its way from the continental divide in Colorado

to the Gulf of California, a distance of 1,400 miles. (435) 259-2614.

DINOSAUR TRACKS - The St. George Dinosaur Discovery Site at Johnson Farm is home to exceptionally well-preserved dinosaur tracks, some displaying skin impressions. These tracks, along with hundreds of fossil fish, plants, rare dinosaur remains, invertebrates' traces, and important sedimentary structures, show evidence that this site was produced along the western edge of a large, Early Jurassic (age between 195-198 million years ago) freshwater lake. (435) 574-3466.

ENTERPRISE - There are two reservoirs in the Bull Valley Mountains 10 miles southwest of the town of Enterprise. The main one is Upper Enterprise Reservoir, about 250 acres with an average depth of about 50 feet, while Lower Enterprise Reservoir is 79 acres. Many come to the reservoir to camp, fish hike, and boat. The Honeycomb Campground



is situated between both lakes and has 21 campsites and flush toilets. There is a boat ramp on Upper Enterprise Reservoir and several fishing areas around both reservoirs. Fishermen will find rainbow trout and smallmouth bass here. Fees are charged.

FOUR CORNERS - The Four Corners is the only place in the U.S. where four states come together at one place: Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Colorado. Here, a person can put each of their hands and feet in four states at the same time. The unique landmark is on Navajo Nation land and is open for visits from the public. West of U.S. Highway 160, 40 miles southwest of Cortez, Colo. (928) 871-6436.

GRAND CANYON - A World Heritage Site encompassing 1,218,375 acres on the Colorado Plateau in northwestern Arizona. The land is semi-arid and consists of raised plateaus and structural basins typical of the southwestern United States. (928) 638-7888.

GRAND STAIRCASE-ESCALANTE NATIONAL MONUMENT - Nearly 1.9 million acres of America's public lands and located between Bryce Canyon and Glen Canyon Recreational Areas. From its namesake Grand Staircase of cliffs and terraces across the rugged Kaiparowits Plateau to the beauty of the Escalante River Canyons, the Monument's size, resources, and isolated location provide amazing opportunities.

GUNLOCK - In scenic red rock country, 15 miles northwest of St. George, lies the 240-acre Gunlock State Park and Reservoir where year-round boating, water sports, and quality fishing for bass and catfish attract visitors. Facilities include boat launching ramp and pit privies. (435) 628-2255.

LAKE MEAD - Lake Mead National Recreation Area offers a wealth of things to do and places to go year-round. Its huge lakes cater to boaters, swimmers, sunbathers and fishermen, while its desert rewards hikers, wildlife photographers, and roadside sightseers. It is also home to thousands of desert plants and animals adapted to survive in an extreme place where rain is scarce and temperatures soar. (702) 293-8990.

LAKE POWELL - In Glen Canyon National Recreation Area is one of the world's great places for houseboating! The 186-mile-long lake offers sandy beaches, cool blue water, and exceptional red-rock scenery. It is excellent for boating, skiing, kayaking, and fishing. Boat or hike to Rainbow Bridge, or explore any of its many canyons or sand dunes. (928) 608-6200.

PINE VALLEY - Pine Valley Reservoir is a beautiful place for fishermen to fish brook trout and rainbow trout. The reservoir is near the Pine Valley Recreation Complex, which has over 150 campsites with picnic and restroom facilities. This area is greener than most other parts of southwestern Utah with pine and pinion trees, and many come to enjoy camping and hiking. It is west of the town of Central. (435) 652-3100.


QUAIL LAKE - Quail Creek State Park provides excellent year-round camping, picnicking, boating, and trout and bass fishing in sunny southwest Utah. The park is three miles east of the Interstate 15 Hurricane exit on Utah State Route 9. Facilities include 23 campsites, modern restrooms, a fish cleaning station, and two covered group-use pavilions. (435) 879-2378.


SAND HOLLOW - Looking to fish? Swim? Ride your ATV in the sand? Do all that and more at Sand Hollow State Park, located between St. George and Hurricane. Bring your boat, a picnic, and some fishing gear for a fun day on the reservoir, or watch the kids swim while you relax on the beach. Load up your RV or tent and settle in for a nice campout, or ride your ATV in the dunes of Sand Mountain. (435) 680-0715.





SNOW CANYON - Named after early Utah leaders Lorenzo and Erastus Snow, Snow Canyon State Park begins just outside of Ivins and stretches northward. Spectacular scenery includes towering red and white sandstone cliffs, black lava formations, and even a waterfall that appears during heavy rain. Snow Canyon offers 16 miles of hiking trails, beautiful sand dunes, technical rock climbing sites, horseback riding, year-round camping, nature studies, and wildlife viewing. This park is a favorite for locals and visitors alike. (435) 628-2255.

ZION - With breathtaking views, numerous hiking attractions of all difficulty levels and some of the most spectacular scenery on earth, Zion National Park and its surrounding areas attract thousands of visitors every year. 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


