TRAILBLAZER TRADITIONS: D-WEEK RETURNS TO SO. UTAH

April 6-11, 2026 — St. George, UT

As the sun sets behind the red cliffs of St. George, the D on the hill glows against the desert sky. For more than a century, that hillside letter has stood as a symbol of southern Utah's pride in its university and the campus and community's shared tradition of working hard for the benefit of others. And each spring, that same spirit comes to life during D-Week.

Hosted by Utah Tech University, D-Week is more than a lineup of events. It's a celebration rooted in history. Dating back to 1915, when the student body constructed the D on the hill, this spirit week bears the name it has long held to honor the longstanding traditions it includes.

Kicking off D-Week 2026, Brooks' City Tour is set to take place Monday, April 6, and will feature pop-up parties offering deals, promotions, and freebies at local businesses and featured



Other signature events throughout the week spotlight student leadership, alumni achievement and community engagement. From the Trailblazer Queen Pageant to live music performances, award ceremonies and family-focused gatherings, D-Week showcases the vibrant campus culture that continues to grow each year. D-Week is Utah Tech University's way of bringing history to life. This endeared week invites neighbors to campus, reconnects alumni with familiar places and gives families an opportunity to be part of something that has defined St. George for more than a century. Join Trailblazer Nation in continuing the tradition of celebrating D-Week.

Then, one of the most anticipated athletic events of the spring season will take place when Trailblazer baseball takes on the University of Utah on Tuesday, April 7, at 4 PM at Utah Tech's Hurst Baseball Complex. The matchup brings a spark of rivalry, especially after last year's thrilling win over the U. Whether you're a longtime supporter or attending your first Utah Tech event, it's an opportunity to rally together in blue and red and cheer on the home team.

Tradition continues off the field as teams of students, alumni and community members enter into the friendly competition that is The Great Race. Dating back


to a 1960s bike race through St. George, The Great Race has morphed into a 10-person relay team that included motor crossing, horseback riding across Foremaster Ridge and tubing down the Virgin River in the early 1970s before it moved to campus in 2000.

In its current form, The Great Race still features relay teams of 10 as they run, pedal, swim, scoot and slide their way through the infamous mud pit to the finish line. This year's iteration of the storied relay is set to start at 5 p.m. on Friday, April 10, in Greater Zion Stadium.

This year's D-Week also marks a milestone for one of the university's most beloved ambassadors: Brooks the Bison turns 10.

Introduced during D-Week in 2016, Brooks quickly became more than a mascot. His 10th birthday will be celebrated at the Brooks' Birthday Carnival, also on Friday, April 10, from 6 to 8 p.m. on Utah Tech's Encampment Mall. This family-friendly event features games, entertainment and activities designed to feel like a classic hometown festival.

The following day, students, alumni and community members will come together to hike up the Black Ridge and apply a new coat of paint to the iconic D. The tradition begins at 8 AM on Saturday, April 11, and breakfast will be served, preserving a ritual that connects today's Trailblazers with those who first shaped it over a century ago.

ST. GEORGE ART FESTIVAL RETURNS APRIL 3-4 WITH 200 ARTISTS, LIVE MUSIC AND MORE

April 3-4, 2026 — St. George, UT

Every year during Easter Weekend, Historic Town Square comes alive with dazzling pieces of artwork, the sounds of live music and the aromas of food from around the world. The St. George Art Festival returns April 3-4 at Town Square, promising to inspire and delight festivalgoers of all ages.

on three stages throughout Town Square, including two free evening concerts. Headlining April 3 at 7 PM on Tabernacle Street is The Aquabats, known for their high-energy superhero punk rock performances. On April 4 at 6 PM, James Hardy & The Fire will bring their groove-driven roots rock sound to the stage.

Additional highlights include artwork from featured artist Prince Duncan-Williams, a creation station offering 15 hands-on crafts for children and families, nearly three dozen food trucks and vendors, and a freestyle dance battle on April 4 at 3 PM.

Runners can participate in the Art Attack 1 Mile and 5K races on April 4 at 9 AM on Tabernacle Street. The Desertscape Film Festival also returns April 1-4 at the Electric Theater, offering independent films and filmmaker showcases.

Festival hours are 10 AM to 7 PM on April 3 and 10 AM to 6 PM on April 4.

The St. George Art Festival began in 1980 and has grown into one of the region's signature events, drawing more than 30,000 visitors annually to Historic Town Square on Main Street, between Tabernacle Street and 100 South.

WASHINGTON COUNTY FAIR CELEBRATES AMERICA 250 WITH HISTORY AND FAMILY FUN

April 10-18, 2026 — Hurricane, UT

In less than a month, the Washington County Fair will welcome the community to one of Southern Utah's most anticipated traditions. This year's fair joins the nationwide celebration of America 250, commemorating 250 years of American independence through immersive, family-friendly experiences that honor the nation's founding spirit.

The celebration begins Friday, April 10, with an official ribbon-cutting at 3:30 PM to open the fair. Immediately following, a short program featuring the La Verkin Elementary School Choir will perform patriotic songs. Guests are then invited to sing "Happy Birthday" and enjoy free ice cream and cake.

As part of the America 250 festivities, the City of St. George will host a patriotic parade themed "America: Past, Present, and Future" on Saturday, April 11, at 9 AM. The parade will feature community groups, creative floats, music and youth

organizations. Cash prizes will be awarded for best theme, best performance, best business entry, best community/group and a commissioner's award.



A centerpiece of the celebration is the Founders Festival, a living-history colonial village featuring tradespeople, interpreters and reenactors with interactive booths designed for families. Visitors will learn about colonial life, craftsmanship and early American values through demonstrations and conversations that bring history to life. The Founders Festival will be open Thursday through Saturday, April 16-18.

The Field of Flags display will serve as a powerful visual tribute throughout the fair. The installation will feature 26 historical flags along with a 250-flag display representing each year of American independence. The display provides a reflective space for visitors to pause, take photos and appreciate the shared values that connect generations.


THE DESERTSCAPE INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL RETURNS TO ST. GEORGE

DIFF 2026 will take place in beautiful St. George, UT from Wednesday, April 1st through Saturday, April 4th with the majority of screenings and events taking place at the historic Electric Theater. March isn't just about looking back, it's also about giving back. So U has partnered with The Dove Center for the first-ever Dare To Care fundraiser. Throughout the



THE DISH: CUBBY'S BALANCES COMFORT AND CLEAN EATING IN ST. GEORGE

St. George, UT

There is a particular tension that happens when one friend wants something clean and protein-forward, and the other wants a sandwich with real heft. Cubby's manages that balance with surprising ease.

Located in St. George, Cubby's feels casual but intentional. The ordering is fast-casual, but the food lands closer to

textures keeps each bite interesting. It's the kind of dish that feels nourishing without feeling like you compromised. Substantial, balanced, and thoughtfully built.

Across the table, my friend went all in on the tri-tip sandwich. Thinly sliced, well-seasoned beef layered onto a soft roll with just enough structure to hold it together. It's the type of sandwich that requires two



chef-driven comfort than quick-service convenience. It's the kind of place where you can sit down and exhale, knowing everyone at the table will find something that fits.

I ordered the Wild Rice & Kale salad, a bowl that reads virtuous on paper but eats like a full meal. The wild rice adds chew and depth, the kale is tender rather than aggressive, and the combination of

hands and full commitment. He was quiet for most of it, which is usually the best review.

What stands out at Cubby's is the flexibility. You can build a meal around greens and grains, or lean into sandwiches, burgers, and hearty sides. It works for someone counting macros, someone avoiding gluten, or someone who just wants something satisfying and straightforward.

The space itself is clean and relaxed, with enough energy to feel lively but not chaotic. It's a dependable option when you're meeting friends with different preferences, dietary needs, or moods.

In a town where dining options continue to expand, Cubby's holds its place by doing something simple and doing it well: serving food that feels fresh, filling, and approachable.

Sometimes that balance is harder to find than it sounds.

That's not luck. That's choice. Which leads me to the other thing that has been on my mind lately. If we're all being honest right now, our world feels kind of heavy.


Fraud. Contention. Media manipulation. War. Anger. Division at every turn. We can keep blaming. Or we can ask a harder question: What am I choosing by not changing how I might be contributing to all of it? Omission is a powerful thing...

The chaos we see "out there" often reflects what we've tolerated within. If we want a stronger community, a stronger nation, a stronger future, it starts with individuals willing to choose differently and treat others differently. Who's with me?

Life is short. Most of us have lived more years than we have left. That's not morbid, it's motivating.

Early spring marks one of the most important transitions of the year at Zion Vineyards. While many visitors see only the tasting room and finished bottles, March is where much of the real work happens behind the scenes. Bottling of the 2023 vintages is underway, and pruning season has just wrapped — a critical step in maintaining vine health and fruit quality.

Pruning is far more than seasonal trimming. It shapes the vine's structure, encourages balanced new growth, and improves airflow and sun exposure — all essential factors in producing concentrated,

high-quality grapes. The work done in these cooler months directly influences the depth and complexity poured into glasses later in the year.

This season also brings several new reds to the tasting lineup.

The Syrah arrives deep and full-bodied, layered with bold notes of black cherry, blueberry, and plum. Aromatics of vanilla, cherry blossom, cedar, and woody spice unfold into a soft, velvety mouthfeel. Its lingering finish hints at anise, dried tobacco, and lightly turned earth. It pairs naturally with robust flavors — blue cheese, sharp



cheddar, Manchego, tangy barbecue, roast pork, lamb, duck, and hearty steaks like ribeye or New York strip.

The Grenache offers a brighter profile. Dry and fruit-forward with lively acidity, it presents hibiscus and peppery spice on the nose, followed by candied cherry, strawberry, blood orange, and pomegranate. Silky tannins and subtle savory notes make it a versatile partner for grilled meats, smoky dishes, carnitas, duck, venison, and even dark chocolate desserts.

Zioja, a Rioja-style red blend of 60% Tempranillo and 40% Grenache, continues to grow in popularity. Rich and full-bodied, it layers pomegranate, cherry, blueberry, and blackberry with aromas of cedar, butterscotch, and spice. Its smooth, velvety finish pairs beautifully with aged cheeses, tapas, roast meats, grilled vegetables, and indulgent desserts like dark chocolate tortes or pecan pie.

Located at 5 Hidden Valley Road in Leeds, just 12 miles north of St. George, Zion Vineyards welcomes guests seven days a week from noon to 6 PM. Reservations are not required. As Southern Utah shifts into

warmer days and longer evenings, it's an ideal time to experience how careful vineyard work translates into refined local wine.







MOVIE REVIEW: "SCREAM 7" IS THE KIND OF SEQUEL THE ORIGINAL FILM HAD SUCH A FUN TIME MOCKING

MOVIE REVIEW: SCREAM 7
(R) Grade: C-

As the end credits for "Scream 7" began to roll, I was left to ponder if what I just watched was, by design, ingeniously meant to be the exact kind of movie that the original film spent a great deal of its runtime playfully mocking over 3 decades ago, or...If "Scream 7" just wasn't very good movie. Sadly, for this horror fan, it was more of the latter.

After a turbulent whirlwind that saw the makers of "Scream 5" and "Scream 6" departing "Scream 7" so that they could focus their attention on "Abigail," a potential seventh entry would continue hitting multiple snags shortly thereafter including the departure of director Christopher Landon ("Happy Death Day") as well as set-to-return "Scream 5" and "Scream 6" stars Melissa Barrera and Jenna Ortega, both of whom departed for reasons that we don't really need to spend time getting into in this review.



With no director and no stars attached, the decision was ultimately made to jump into "nostalgia" mode and bring in Kevin Williamson (the screenwriter behind "Scream" chapters 1, 2, and 4) to try his hand at directing again for the first time since his only other directing credit, 1999's all but forgotten "Teaching Mrs. Tingle." Original "Scream" final girl Neve Campbell was also brought back (no doubt, she was given the payday she asked for after being denied what she was rightfully worth in the last film.)

In "Scream 7," Sidney Prescott-Evans is living a seemingly peaceful life in a new hometown with her police officer husband (played by Joe McHale) and her sometimes angsty but good-hearted daughter, Tatum (played by Isabel May). For the most part, she's put a terrifying past behind her, but of course, it isn't long before Ghostface is back, wreaking havoc once more, and ultimately, it'll take the likes of Sidney, Tatum, and intrepid (and obnoxious) reporter Gale Weathers (played by Courtney Cox) to put a stop to a new string of grisly killings in what could be best described as a fan-servicey whodunnit. Whodunnit, you ask? Like that'll be spoiled in this review. That being said, it's pretty easy to solve the mystery within the first half of the movie.

Admittedly, it's fun having Campbell back here' and it's certainly cool seeing her play this role more tough-as-nails. This is to say that her turn here is akin to Laurie Strode in "H20" as opposed to the PTSD-stricken Laurie Strode of the

recent "Halloween" trilogy. Likewise, May is pretty good as Tatum, too, although, it's strange that she's constantly grilling her mom for information about her tragic past when all she really needed to do was look mon's story up on the internet...Or watch the "Stab" movies...Or read the book that her mom actually wrote on the subject. Granted, that's really more about the often uninspired screenplay that, ironically, sometimes feels as if it might have had an uncredited rewrite by AI.

Now, full disclosure; I've never been the world's biggest "Scream" fan. I'm certainly not a hater but whereas meta-titled slasher films go, I didn't feel like Wes Craven's 1996 original did anything that Craven's very own "New Nightmare" didn't do more creatively almost 2 years prior. And that particular movie had the extra baggage of being several entries in.

With "Scream 7," Williamson struggles to find an interesting new way in. There's a fun opening and there are, of course, the occasional on the nose references to classic horror films of the past (look no further than the iconic 70's film playing at the town's single screen movie theater), but rather than making a meta commentary on modern horror (something that the upcoming "Scary Movie 6" looks far more interested in doing), "Scream 7" instead turns its sights on the likes of AI, Chat GPT, and streaming services but this movie never really explores any of these things beyond a service level. Instead, "Scream 7" is more interested in the aforementioned nostalgia (watch for Sidney's leather jacket), obligatory callbacks (Tatum's boyfriend crawling through her bedroom window), a handful of returning characters (most of which are incredibly forced), and a few familiar needle drops (Nick Cave being one of the big ones.) Of course, once the new story threads that were set into motion in parts 5 and 6 came

to a crashing halt, it was pretty obvious that this was the only direction "Scream 7" could really go.

You can't really fault Williamson for wanting to come back to the property that essentially gave him his career but for the most part, the proceedings here are pretty uninspired (and in some cases, downright nonsensical) and while there are a handful of kills that deliver the gory goods, some of this stuff (including a gag involving a beer tap in a bar) feels like it belongs in an entirely different slasher film. It should also be noted that Ghostface appears to have superhuman strength in this movie as once certain reveals are made, some might question how on Earth this ultra-talented killer could have pulled some of these crazy shenanigans off, especially from a physicality sense (stabbed, shot, falling from balconies, etc.) That said, to be fair, the same could be said for other entries in this franchise and certainly, movies like this require suspension of disbelief.

Look, "Scream 7" certainly isn't the worst horror film I've ever seen. At the very least, it's stronger than the worst entries in the "Friday," "Nightmare," and "Chainsaw Massacre" franchises but then, that's a backhanded compliment at best. At the end of the day, though, nothing I'm saying will keep this thing from making a literal killing at the box-office, meaning that we're sure to get another 10 of these. Let's just hope that whatever comes next (it's been speculated that Campbell already has an idea for a future entry) is a little more inspired.

TEMPORARY NORTH WASH RAMP IMPROVEMENTS AIM TO PRESERVE CATARACT CANYON ACCESS

March 2026 — Southern Utah

State and federal agencies are moving forward with improvements to the North Wash boat ramp to maintain reliable river access for trips through Cataract Canyon.

that North Wash is not suitable for a permanent facility, prompting partners to pursue a temporary, high-durability ramp while planning continues for a long-term replacement.



The Utah Division of Outdoor Recreation and the National Park Service at Glen Canyon National Recreation Area are advancing a temporary ramp solution following prolonged drought and low water levels at Lake Powell, which have rendered the historic Hite boat ramp unusable. River takeouts have since shifted to North Wash.


Maintaining safe and reliable access to Cataract Canyon remains a priority for Utah's river-running community and guiding economy. Site evaluations determined

Geotechnical engineering and environmental compliance work are underway, with a goal of completing improvements before spring runoff. Construction is anticipated to begin around March 2026, pending final approvals.

The temporary ramp will extend farther downstream and utilize an articulated concrete block system designed to improve traction, reduce erosion and better accommodate fluctuating river levels and heavy trailers.

Funding for design, compliance and site improvements is being provided by the Utah Outdoor Adventure Commission, with coordination support from the Public Lands Policy Coordination Office and the Utah Guides and Outfitters Association.

River users should expect construction activity at the North Wash site once reviews are complete. Additional updates, including construction windows and potential impacts to river traffic, will be shared as timelines are finalized.



Safety Tips For Zion

Emergencies

For 24-hour emergency response, call 911 or (435) 772-3322. The Zion Canyon Medical Clinic is located in Springdale near the south entrance to the park. For hours, please call (435) 772-3226. Other medical clinics are located in Hurricane. The nearest hospitals are in St. George, Cedar City, and Kanab.

Hydrate and use refillable water bottles

It is easy to get dehydrated while hiking and walking in the desert, so pack along extra water, and be sure to take rest and water breaks on long hikes. There are a number of places to refill your water bottles in Zion National Park including the visitors' center and Zion Lodge as well as a new hydration station at the Springdale bus stop in front of The Bumbleberry Inn and Zion Canyon Brew Pub.

Be cautious near steep cliffs

Falls from cliffs on trails can result in death. Loose sand or pebbles on stone are very slippery. Be careful of edges when using cameras or binoculars. Never throw or roll rocks because there may be hikers below you. Stay on the trail. Stay back from cliff edges. Observe posted warnings. Please watch children.

Watch for flash floods

All narrow canyons are potentially hazardous. Flash floods, often caused by storms miles away, are a real danger and can be life threatening. You are assuming a risk when entering a narrow canyon. Your safety is your responsibility.



Tips To Minimize Your Impact

Pack it in, pack it out & use recycling bins

Each month, Zion National Park pays many thousands of dollars to haul away waste collected from garbage cans and recycling bins. Your experience and that of everyone who visits Zion Canyon can be improved by never littering and making sure you pick up any trash you see along the way. Recycling bins are placed strategically throughout Zion Park, and it is highly encouraged for everyone to use them.

Please stay on the marked trails

Hiking off trails can lead to loss of vegetation, soil compaction, erosion, and unsightly scars on the landscape. Remember, if you bring it in, please pack it out.

Go before you go

It is always a good idea to use the restroom before you begin a hike since facilities are limited to select locations. If you do need to take care of your business, please pack it back out.

Be respectful to the wildlife

Feeding, harming, or capturing wild animals is illegal and can cause injury or death to the animal. Animals can become aggressive beggars when fed.

Please leave it how you found it

It is illegal to remove anything from Zion National Park, including flowers, rocks, or anything else that you might find. Do not write or carve on natural surfaces.

Get some great hiking in

Spend a day in Springdale

Springdale is unique to our national park system in that it is almost completely surrounded by Zion National Park. So when you're in Springdale, you're right in the middle of Zion Canyon.

Catch an event

Not only does Zion Brew Pub have live music every Saturday, the property also hosts a handful of events throughout the year, as do the Bit and Spur restaurant, Tanner Amphitheater, Bumbleberry Inn, Wildcat Willies, and several other locations.

Try a guided tour

Jeep, helicopter, ATV, canyoneering, horseback riding, or mountain biking, guided tours are all available. Many of these tours take you outside Zion National Park boundaries and give you a unique perspective on Zion's canyons and plateaus from surrounding areas of southern Utah. Visit the east side of Zion and spend a day in Kanab

Tips To Maximize Enjoyment

Go on a less crowded hike

The most visited Zion hikes have a lot of competition. If you'd rather not feel like you're in the line at a theme park, consider seeking out a less traveled path. Check out our feature, Less-Traveled Zion Hikes, in this issue.

To avoid the crowds, go early or late in the day

Consider getting up extra early or trekking out midday after the initial rush has flooded in. Especially during the Summer months, it's highly recommended to go early!

Consider coming back again in the low season

Starting in the late fall, the number of visitors to Zion Canyon starts to dwindle, and by December it's significantly less than in the heat of the summer. It is simply a different experience to see Zion in the winter with the snow-capped monoliths. Most hikes are still accessible and are less crowded. You can also drive to the Temple of Sinawava parking lot. The shuttles stop running from November until March.

Check out Kolob Canyons & Kolob Terrace Road



Beyond Hiking

THE BEST DRIVES & DAY TRIPS AROUND ZION

We're glad you're here—and if you're reading this, chances are you came for the world-famous hikes, towering cliffs, and unforgettable canyons of Zion National Park. But maybe you've already hiked Angels Landing or tackled The Narrows. Or maybe you're looking for a different kind of adventure—something a little less strenuous, a little more scenic, or just a great way to spend a day in the car with some jaw-dropping views.

Well, you're in luck. Zion sits in the middle of a wonderland of scenic drives, hidden gems, and bucket-list day trips. So, whether you're taking it easy, chasing new sights, or looking for ways to escape the crowds, here are some top picks to round out your Southern Utah experience.

Scenic Drives and Viewpoints

Kolob Canyons (Zion National

Park – Northwest Entrance)

If you love Zion but want something quieter, head to the Kolob Canyons section of the park. Located off I-15 near Cedar City, this five-mile scenic drive offers massive red rock cliffs, sweeping vistas, and several short hikes. It's a perfect add-on for road trippers and a beautiful detour on your way north.

Kolob Terrace Road

A local favorite, this backroad winds its way from the town of Virgin up into the cooler high country above Zion. Along the way, you'll pass lava fields, meadows, forested plateaus, and killer canyon views. There's even a reservoir near the top if you want to dip your toes.

Zion-Mount Carmel Tunnel

Even if you've already been through the tunnel, it's worth a second look. The

drive east from Springdale through Zion Canyon and out to the East Entrance is one of the most dramatic in the state. Stop at the many pullouts along the way to take in views of slickrock formations, bighorn sheep, and winding canyons.

Gooseberry Mesa

This spot is a mecca for mountain bikers, but the road out to Gooseberry is scenic. You'll need a high-clearance vehicle for the final stretch, but you'll be rewarded with stunning panoramic views over Zion and the Virgin River Valley.

Smithsonian Butte Backway

This off-the-beaten-path route connects Rockville to Apple Valley with unpaved road and unparalleled views. Think mesas, cliffs, and the perfect backdrop for golden hour photos. It's a local secret—and one of the best-kept ones at that.

Best Day Trips and Nearby Parks Bryce Canyon National Park

About 90 minutes from Zion, Bryce is known for its bizarre and beautiful hoodoos—towering spires of red and orange rock that glow at sunrise and sunset. You can easily drive the scenic loop and stop at multiple viewpoints or stretch your legs with a short hike into the amphitheater.

Coral Pink Sand Dunes State Park

Located just outside Kanab, this state park features rolling hills of—you guessed it—deep coral-colored sand. Rent a sandboard, hop on an ATV, or just enjoy the surreal landscape.

Snow Canyon State Park

Tucked just north of St. George, this park is a mini-desert paradise filled with lava flows, red cliffs, and white sandstone. It's perfect for a short hike or scenic drive and less than an hour from Zion.

Zion National Park Hiking Info

THE LOCALS' GUIDE TO HIKING PREPAREDNESS

National parks are seeing an uptick in helicopters carrying unfortunate hikers out of precarious situations.

In 2024, the National Park Service reported over 200 search-and-rescue operations, which means over 200 extremely unpleasant vacation experiences. Many more than just a decade ago. The majority of those rescues occurred in Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks, and most hikers who end up getting into trouble are either in their 20s or are older than 60.

Despite our highly skilled and dedicated rescue teams' valiant efforts, not everyone made it out of their predicaments safely. An average of four people per year lose their lives in Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks.

It's hard to imagine one wanting a vacation amid the splendor of our national parks to involve search and rescue teams or a close encounter with death.

Zion National Park is often referred to as an outdoor Disneyland. But this is the wilderness, and it's far less forgiving than any theme park. Here are some tips for how to safely enjoy your time in Zion Canyon.

Bring Water

You lose more water through perspiration than you realize, and if you are used to a moister climate — and nearly any climate is less arid than southern Utah — you can become dehydrated quickly without realizing it.

The National Park Service recommends that hikers bring a minimum of one gallon of water per hiker per day. There are fill stations throughout Springdale and the park that provided filtered water at no charge.

Natural water sources in the park such as creeks and streams are NOT reliable sources of clean drinking water. If you find yourself in a situation wherein you need

water but have none, it is strongly advised that any locally-sourced water intended for consumption first be filtered, boiled for at least 10 minutes, or treated with iodine before consuming.

Wear Appropriate Clothing

While most paths and trails are well maintained, this is the great outdoors, and a little loose gravel or slickrock can lead to injury — or worse. Think of appropriate footwear as an insurance policy — and if you are a little nervous, a hiking stick never hurts. Also, dress lightly if it's going to be hot, but be sure to use appropriate sun protection like sunscreen and large-

brimmed hats and UV protective clothing, because suffering from sunstroke or severe sunburn during an already taxing hike can be brutal.

Leave Wildlife Alone

Animals instinctively avoid humans, but the area is home to everything from poisonous snakes to mountain lions. Never approach local wildlife — and never try to feed them. This can result in injury to visitors, and numerous visitors have required stitches after attempting to hand-feed animals. But when humans feed wildlife, it's also not good for the animals, who are already best suited to feed themselves.

Leave No Trace

Zion's beauty is matched by its fragility. The red rock landscapes and delicate desert ecosystems are easily damaged, often taking years or decades to recover. That's why it's so important to leave no trace. Stay on designated trails to protect sensitive plant life, especially the black, crusty-looking soil known as biological soil crust — a vital part of the desert ecosystem. Pack out all trash, including food scraps, tissues, and biodegradable items. Use established restrooms when available, and if not, follow park guidelines for disposing of waste properly. Avoid carving into rocks or trees, and keep noise levels down so everyone can enjoy the peace of the canyon. When we leave no trace, we help ensure Zion remains as breathtaking for the next hiker as it was for us.

Hike Sober

Sometimes relatively stationary outdoor activities like boating or camping involve enjoying an alcoholic drink or two. But when you're hiking the varied terrain of our national parks, you don't want your coordination, balance, or judgment to be impaired to any extent. Zion Canyon, Springdale, and Kanab are home to several fine restaurants and bars — but visit them for a cocktail after your hike, not before.

Hike at Your Skill Level, and Don't Take Risks

Trails in Zion range from short and easy to long and challenging. Don't overestimate your ability and endurance level. And don't engage in horseplay or other activity that might endanger yourself or others. Some of Zion's hikes are steep, and you wouldn't be the first person to tumble down a hill — or worse, fall off a cliff. Zion is beautiful, but it's also dangerous, so respect yourself and others by respecting the terrain.

Popular Zion Hikes

Current Trail Closures & Popular Trail Considerations:

Hidden Canyon and Observation Point remain closed due to long-term rockfalls; Angels Landing requires a year-round lottery permit (apply via Recreation.gov); The Narrows closes when Virgin River flows exceed 150 cfs—spring snowmelt can cause sudden increases, so check conditions before starting; Zion Canyon Scenic Drive operates shuttle-only service during busy periods and weekends; park entry requires the standard entrance fee with no reservation needed for shuttle or canyon access; Weeping Rock shuttle stop and trail remain open; the Kolob Canyons area (Kolob Canyons Road, Taylor Creek, Lee Pass, and Timber Creek Overlook) may experience intermittent closures due to lingering wildfire impacts and early spring storms; Kolob Terrace and Lava Point Roads can still close during late-season snow; March daytime highs typically range from the 50s to low 60s with cool mornings—layer clothing, watch for muddy or slick trails, and carry plenty of water (2–3 L per person); overnight backpacking or top-down Narrows trips require a wilderness permit.

Angels Landing via West Rim Trail

Possibly the most popular hike in Zion, Angels Landing takes around four hours to complete, covers just under 5 1/2 miles, and requires a permit to hike. As you work your way up the 1,488-foot change in elevation, you'll want to look out for long drop-offs. This hike is not for young children or people with a fear of heights. Be sure to enjoy, but be careful along the last section of the hike, which is a steep, narrow ridge to the summit. The hike starts at The Grotto.

The Narrows via Riverside Walk

A full-day hike at 8 hours, the Narrows can pose extra dangers depending on the weather. High water levels can prevent access to the Narrows, so be sure to check

with the visitor center before beginning this 9 1/2-mile hike. You'll start this hike at Temple of Sinawava.

Kolob Arch via La Verkin Creek Trail

Getting to Kolob Arch via the La Verkin Creek Trail follows Timber and La Verkin creeks and connects to the trail to Kolob Arch, one of the world's largest freestanding arches. A full-day hike, it will take around 8 hours to finish the 14-fourteen mile trip. This hike starts at Kolob Canyons Road.

If you are looking for something more moderate, try some of these mid-range hikes.

Kayenta Trail

This two-hour hike starts at the Grotto and goes for two miles. You'll gain 150 feet in elevation, and the trail does have long drop-

offs. This unpaved climb connects the Grotto to the Emerald Pools trails.

Canyon Overlook Trail

Starting at Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, this one-hour hike provides a 163-foot gain in elevation over the course of a mile. This rocky and uneven trail ends at a viewpoint for Pine Creek Canyon and lower Zion Canyon. While this trail is mostly fenced, there are long drop-offs.

Taylor Creek Trail

You'll begin this five-mile hike at Kolob Canyons Road. It should take around 4 hours to complete and provides a 450-foot gain in elevation. Larger groups may need to split up, as this hike limits 12 people to a group. It follows the Middle Fork of Taylor Creek past

two homestead cabins to Double Arch Alcove.

Timber Creek Overlook Trail

A quick hike, the Timber Creek Overlook Trail covers just one mile and 100 feet in elevation gain. It can be done in about 30 minutes. The trail follows a ridge to a small peak with views of Timber Creek, Kolob Terrace, and Pine Valley Mountains.

Those looking for something less strenuous should check out these easy hikes.

Pa'rus Trail

Starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this two-hour hike covers 3 1/2 miles and rises 50 feet in elevation. A paved trail that follows the Virgin River from the South Campground to Canyon Junction, Pa'rus Trail is wheelchair accessible and is open to both bicycles and dogs.

Archeology Trail

Also starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this short half-hour hike covers just under half a mile and rises 80 feet in elevation, making it a short but steep trail. This trail offers trailside exhibits and views of several prehistoric buildings.

Grotto Trail

Starting at Zion Lodge or the Grotto, this trail connects the two locations and can be combined with the Middle Emerald Pools and Kayenta trails to create a 2 1/2-mile loop. The non-loop version should take about 30 minutes and rises 35 feet over one mile.

Riverside Walk

Starting at Temple of Sinawava, this 1 1/2-hour hike cover just over two miles and rises 57 feet in elevation. While it is wheelchair accessible, there are minor drop-offs. The trail, which is paved, offers trailside exhibits as it follows the Virgin Rivet along the bottom of a narrow canyon.

Less-Traveled Zion Hikes

Current Trail Closures & Popular Trail Considerations:

Northgate Peaks

The Northgate Peaks trail in the Kolob Terrace section of Zion National Park is an amazing trail with spectacular views. The trail itself is nearly flat, making it a perfect hike for families.

To reach the Northgate Peaks trailhead, take State Route 9 to the town of Virgin. Turn left onto Kolob Terrace Road. Drive for 15.7 miles through increasingly spectacular country until the short spur road (on the right) for the Wildcat Trailhead is reached. Drive a few hundred feet to the large parking area.

The trail heads east across grassy plains and stands of Ponderosa Pine with dynamite views of the towering Pine Valley Peak to the west. Soon the trail will be fully in the forest with limited views. After 0.9 miles, the junction with the Hop Valley trail is reached. Continue east, and 0.1 miles further, the junction with the Northgate Peaks Trail is reached. Head south on this trail for another 1.1 miles until the end of the official trail is reached at a rocky basalt bluff with epic views of the Northgate Peaks to the east and west and of North Guardian Angel to the south.

For families with young children, this makes an excellent turnaround spot.

Gifford Canyon

Gifford Canyon offers a nice stroll through a sandy wash and is very charming when water is running. This hike is nearly 3 miles long and will take about 2 hours to finish.

To start this hike, park in the lot located immediately east of the Zion/Mt. Carmel Tunnel. The trail begins at the



backside of the restrooms at the back of the parking lot. There will be a steep, sandy path to climb down before you enter Pine Creek slot. Follow the path upstream for almost 75 feet, and look for a 15-foot wall of slickrock. You can scramble up the rock or look for the beaten path on the backside of the rock.

On top of this wall is a narrow dirt path that is crowded by rock and vegetation. It winds around the mountain to a dead end with a beautiful view of the mountain where the Canyon Overlook Trail is located, opposite is Gifford Canyon.

The path will lead past stone bridge and to another minor slickrock climb. At the end of the canyon, there is a circle of cliffs preventing further exploration without climbing up the sandstone.

Chinle Trail

Chinle Trail is an off-the-beaten-path trail located in the lower elevation west desert wilderness area, offering wide vistas, desert landscapes, and a reprieve from the more touristy trails in the park. Though it's a long trail, it's a mellow hike that can be cut off whenever you feel like turning around. It's a great hike with kids because it's not treacherous, slippery, or steep. Avoid it after snow or rain as it will be muddy.

The Chinle Trailhead starts outside of Zion, south of Springdale. If you are coming

from St. George, the turn is about a block before you hit the apple orchard and stand as you leave Rockville off of State Route 9. There is a parking area off the right of Anasazi Way near the Anasazi Plateau housing development. If you hit houses, you missed it. And yes, the trail starts below the housing development and takes you right through it. Don't worry though, it doesn't last long.

Shortly after you get through the housing development, you will hit a sign letting you know you are entering the Zion Wilderness. At this point, you can breathe a sigh of relief, because you have gotten away from civilization to enjoy nature, and chances are that you won't see another soul until you return to your car.

Many Pools

The route is moderate with a gentle uphill climb to an alcove, but plan for a strenuous hike if you continue to the East Rim.

The route begins right off the highway. Drive to the pullout near the second drainage on the north side of the State Route 9, about 0.8 miles after the smaller tunnel. Walk carefully along the road about 150 yards and drop down into a sandy bowl on the north side of SR-9. There is a trail for a short distance, and then the sand turns into large flat stones that you can pick and


choose to walk on, depending on your sense of balance. A short distance off the road, filled pools carved into the rocks appear. Ponderosa Pines and Juniper trees twisted by the wind are a good backdrop to the reds and whites ribboned through the rocks.

Overlook Trail

The Overlook Trail is a short, beautiful hike located on the east side of Zion National Park, just outside the Mt. Carmel tunnel. The hike is about one mile roundtrip, and it usually takes people about an hour. It is definitely one of the easier hikes in Zion, but it's still considered a moderate-level hike due to a few exposed areas and sandstone pathways, which can be slippery.

The Overlook trailhead lies right outside of the Mt. Carmel tunnel by the ranger booth. Exit the tunnel too quickly and you'll miss it.

It begins with a staircase carved out of the sandstone leading up and away from the road. Soon, you'll be walking along the side of the mountain and looking down into a thin crevice known as Pine Creek Canyon. At about halfway, you'll walk across a bridge that wraps around a corner and leads to an area of recessed rock wet with the moisture that caused it to erode and be filled with ferns growing out of the sandstone.

Featured Hike

SANDSTONE MOUNTAIN TRAIL

Location: South of Leeds in the Red Cliffs Desert Reserve, Utah.

Difficulty: Strenuous (very strenuous for older folks--my wife Deb and I are in our mid-70s) with some rocky sections, several long deep sand sections, and much up and down hiking, sometimes over fairly steep ridges. The absence of trail signs after the initial one at the trailhead makes this hike a bit more difficult than it need be (wandering around looking for the correct trail).

Average Hiking Time: About 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 hours at a leisurely pace with many stops for resting and photos.

Elevations: Approximately 3,110 feet trailhead elevation with a 550 feet elevation change from the lowest to highest point. We only did a portion of the hike and gained approximately 400 feet.

Family Friendly: Nope, unless everyone on the hike is in pretty good shape.

Finding the Trailhead: Heading north on Interstate 15 take Exit 22 onto Old Highway 91. Continue north approximately 2.2 miles through the town of Leeds. (In Leeds the highway is renamed Main Street.) Next turn right (south) onto unsigned Babylon Road just past the sign for the Red Cliffs National Conservation Area. Babylon Road (the primary access to seven trailheads and 13 designated trails) is also known as 900 North Road. It is mostly a good dirt road, especially the first part near all the new development. However, past the development, there are a few very rocky and deep sand sections.

At 2.7 miles upon encountering a major (for dirt roads) signed intersection, go left (east) to the Sand Cove and



Sandstone Mountain trailheads. Less than .1 mile further is the Sand Cove Trailhead parking area. Continue east past the Sand Cove Trailhead and at .2 mile from the Babylon Road intersection turn right (south) at the first junction.

The road past Sand Cove Trailhead parking area is very rough in a few places and includes a high ledge in the road. Driving over the ledge requires a high clearance 4-wheel drive vehicle. You could park at the Sand Cove Trailhead parking area and walk about .3 mile to the Sandstone Mountain Trailhead.

About .4 mile from the Babylon Road intersection is the signed Sandstone Mountain Trailhead/stepover on the left (north) side of the road. There is a small area for parking, space for three or four vehicles. If the trailhead parking area is full, follow the sign to the Sand Cove Primitive Camping Area about .1 mile ahead which has plenty of parking. If you park at the Sand Cove Primitive Camping Area, walk back about .1 mile to the Sandstone Mountain Trailhead (now on your right) and begin your hike. I strongly recommend a high clearance vehicle due to road conditions in the last .4 mile.

Red sandstone mountains are anything but rare in southwest Utah. But how often do you get to explore them up close? There is one close by, Sandstone Mountain, where the trail circles the base and crosses over the mountain. My wife, Deb, and I decided that's the hike for us. We did not do the entire hike, it was strenuous. But the views were worth the effort.

Sandstone Mountain Trail is located in the Red Cliffs Desert Reserve near Leeds. The Red Cliffs Desert Reserve is a 62,000 acre scenic wildlife reserve set aside in 1996 to protect the desert tortoise and other sensitive plants and animals. The reserve has more than 130 miles of shared use trails for hiking, horseback riding, and mountain biking. Remember, the reserve is a sensitive area, stay on the trails and minimize your impact—walk as if you are kissing the earth with your feet.

Our adventure began on a weekday in late February. We parked at the signed Sandstone Mountain Trailhead/stepover on the left (north) side of the road, ours was the only vehicle there.

The temperature was in the mid-50s at about 9:30 AM as we began our hike under a slightly overcast blue Utah sky. The trailhead elevation is approximately 3,100 feet with about a 550 feet elevation gain from the lowest to highest point.

We headed northeast on a fairly flat wide trail toward the highest peak of Sandstone Mountain. This .4 mile

portion of the trail is packed dirt with some rocky areas, easy to walk on. It then transforms into the fun part for another .6 mile—loose, deep sand almost all uphill. Along this first mile of the trail are splendid views to the north of the Pine Valley Mountains and the smaller red sandstone mountains and cliffs in front of them. And Sandstone Mountain towering above on our right (east).

About one mile from the trailhead we came to a stepover in the fence that runs along the right side of the trail. Since there was no trail sign we did not know if it was the correct route to take. Over the stepover was a definite trail leading to the saddle between the mountains. Deb checked ahead a couple of hundred yards on the loose sand trail and did not find another obvious trail going east.

We crossed the stepover and headed east up and down sandy ridges into a wash, the lowest part of the saddle between Sandstone Mountain and the mountain to the north. We noticed a couple of what seemed to be user trails headed in different directions. Due to the lack of trail signs, we were not sure which way to go and continued east.

Once out of the wash, the trail was rocky and up and down. We did some fairly serious rock scrambling and explored the tops of two deep canyons looking for the trail.

By then we had meandered around for awhile in difficult terrain and were tired when we saw a trail on a very steep slope, it looked near vertical, heading north. Probably the way out of the saddle. However, we could not find a connector trail to the near vertical trail and decided it was time to head back.

The payoff for our wandering was the amazing views of Sandstone Mountain, deep canyons, and jumbled rocks in all directions and many colors. During our hike we encountered some desert denizens—lizards and quail.

The lack of trail signs is usually not a big concern because it is obvious where the trail leads. That is not the case in the maze of the Sandstone Mountain saddle.

This is a strenuous hike, suitable for most adventurers in decent physical shape, with great scenery. As with many of our hikes, we did not encounter other people. The entire hike we did was around four miles and took about three hours.

NO CAMPFIRES

Campfires are prohibited in the Zion Wilderness. Fuel stoves and lanterns may be used for camping purposes, but should only be lit on bare ground away from all vegetation. In the interest of protection of environmental and scenic values, protection of natural resources, and public safety, these restrictions on fires are necessary. Please do all you can to protect the park from human caused wildfires.



FOOD STORAGE

All food and trash must be stored inside a secure hard sided container or interlocking wire mesh bag. For the welfare of park wildlife, your safety, and the safekeeping of your equipment, you should make your food items as unobtainable as possible. Your actions can put other people at risk of food pilfering, since animals regularly revisit areas where they easily obtained food. At worst, your behavior may lead directly to the death of a wild animal. These guidelines are meant to protect park wildlife, people, and equipment.



LEAVE NO TRACE

Protect the park from all graffiti and vandalism. All graffiti, including words, drawings, and arrows, no matter how small or superficially drawn, carved, scratched, or painted, is vandalism. Do not build rock cairns. If placed incorrectly, they can mislead visitors, cause unnecessary damage, and lead to potential injuries. Help protect Zion by not leaving your mark. Make memories, take photos, and leave no trace.




HUMAN WASTE

Pack out all solid human waste, toilet paper, diapers, and personal hygiene products. An environmentally friendly human waste disposal bag, complete with use and disposal instructions, is available for sale in the Zion Forever Park Store and at local outfitters. The contents of the disposal bag may then be deposited in the trash. Use of this waste disposal system is required for all Wilderness permit holders.



GROUP SIZE

Wilderness trails have a group size limit of 12. These limits apply to all trips into the park's wilderness, including trips that do not require a permit. Group size limits are strictly enforced. Groups that exceed these limits may not split up and visit the same route, or wilderness trail on the same day, but may split up and visit different areas.



Zion National Park Shuttle Info

The seasons are changing in Zion National Park! Every year, the National Park Service (NPS) adjusts shuttle schedules and campground availability throughout the year.

Here's What You Need To Know To Plan Your Visit

- You do not need a ticket or reservation to ride the park shuttle or enter the park.
- During the shuttle season, visitors cannot drive personal vehicles on Zion Canyon Scenic Drive.

• Shuttles arrive about every 15 minutes on the Springdale Line (outside the park) and about every 5-10 minutes on the Zion Canyon Line (inside the park).

• Shuttles will not run December 2-20. Shuttles take about 45 minutes to drive between the Zion Canyon Visitor Center and the Temple of Sinawava. This means a round trip takes about an hour and a half.

Be mindful of the time you board the shuttle back to the Zion Canyon Visitor Center at the end of the day. You should not wait for the last shuttle of the day. If the last shuttle is full, or if you miss the last shuttle, you may have to walk nine miles back to the Zion Canyon Visitor Center.

Zion Canyon Line

• First bus departs Zion Canyon Visitor Center to Temple of Sinawava at 7 AM through May 17th, then at 6 AM from May 18th to September 14th.

• Last bus departs Zion Canyon Visitor Center to Temple of Sinawava at 5 PM through May 17th, then at 7 PM from May 18th to September 14th.

• Last bus departs the Temple of Sinawava to Zion Canyon Visitor Center at 7:15 PM through May 17th, then at 8:15 PM from May 18th to September 14th.

Springdale Line

• First bus leaves the Hotel De Novo (Stop #9) at 8 AM through May 17th, then at 7 AM from May 18th to September 14th.

• Last bus leaves Zion Canyon Village (Stop #1) at 7 PM through May 17th, then at 8 PM from May 18th to September 14th.

Camping

Watchman Campground is open year-round, and you can make a reservation up to six months before your visit at www.recreation.gov or by calling 1-877-444-6777. Plan ahead and make arrangements for where you will stay before you get to the park.

South Campground is closed for a long-term rehabilitation project.

Lava Point Campground is a 1-hour drive from Zion Canyon. Reservation only.

• The Information Desk opens at 8 AM and closes at 5 PM every day.

Wilderness Permit Desks

• Zion Canyon Wilderness Desk: Open daily from 8 AM to 5 PM.

• Kolob Canyons Wilderness Desk: Closed until late 2024.

Attend a Zion Canyon Ranger-Led Patio Talk

Free ranger talks happen outside of the Zion Canyon Visitor Center every day at:

• 11 AM, 1:30 PM and 3 PM

No matter when you visit, be prepared for crowds and remember:

• Parking fills early year-round. You may have to wait to enter Zion Canyon Scenic Drive if parking is full there.

• Watch out for pedestrians and bicyclists if you are driving.

• Stay on trails and avoid walking in the road.

• Put your pass in your pocket. Don't leave your park pass or receipt in a hotel room or at home.

• Ride your bike on the road or the Pa'Rus Trail. Bicycling is not allowed on any other trails in the park. If you are riding in the road, you must stop to let buses pass you.

• The NPS may temporarily close roads if traffic is congested or there is nowhere for drivers to park.

• In general, fewer people visit Zion on weekdays than weekends. Consider arriving early or after 3 PM to avoid the busiest times of day.

• Plan ahead and prepare

If you cannot park in Zion or if all of our campsites are full, research nearby communities and public lands to learn about other recreational activities and lodging. Always recreate responsibly and respect private owners' property and facilities.

Follow Leave No Trace practices everywhere in the park and beyond; be sure to pack out all your trash.



Southern Utah State & National Parks

ANASAZI STATE PARK MUSEUM - This ancient Indian village in the heart of Utah's canyon country was one of the largest Anasazi communities west of the Colorado River. The site is believed to have been occupied from A.D. 1050 to 1200. The village remains largely unexcavated, but many artifacts have been uncovered and are on display in the newly remodeled museum. Anasazi State Park is in the picturesque town of Boulder on State Route 12. Group and individual picnic areas are available. There is no camping. (435) 335-7308.

BAKER - Baker Reservoir is a small lake on the Santa Clara River four miles north of Veyo on Utah State Route 18. It is a 63-acre lake with an average depth of about 20 feet. Many people come to the reservoir to camp at one of its 10 campsites and to fish. The reservoir is stocked with rainbow trout and contains brown trout, green sunfish, crayfish, redbreast shiner, and mountain sucker. It has picnic areas and vault toilets. There is a fee for visiting the reservoir and no boat ramp.

BRYCE CANYON - Bryce Canyon National Park is a scientist's laboratory and a child's playground. Because Bryce transcends 2,000 feet of elevation, the park exists in three distinct climatic zones: spruce/fir forest, ponderosa pine forest and pinion pine/juniper forest. This diversity of habitat provides for high biodiversity. Here at Bryce, you can enjoy over 100 species of birds, dozens of mammals, and more than a thousand plant species. (435) 834-5322.

CEDAR BREAKS - Sitting at over 10,000 feet and looking down into a half-mile deep geologic amphitheater. Come wander among timeless bristlecone pines, stand in lush meadows of wildflowers, ponder crystal-clear night skies and experience the richness of our subalpine forest. Just four miles off Utah Highway 148, you'll find the Cedar Breaks National Monument parking lot.



CORAL PINK SAND DUNES - At an elevation of 6,000 feet and 12 paved miles off U.S. Highway 89 near Kanab, this park provides a fantastic setting for camping, hiking, OHV riding or just playing in the sand. A 265-acre conservation area prohibits motorized vehicles in order to protect the Coral Pink beetle (found nowhere else in the world) and its habitat. The mule deer, jackrabbit, kit fox, coyote, and many small rodents also make the park their home. (435) 648-2800.

DEAD HORSE POINT - Dead Horse Point State Park is perhaps Utah's most spectacular state park. Dead Horse Point is a promontory of stone surrounded by steep cliffs near Moab. The overlook at Dead Horse Point is 6,000 feet above sea level. Two-thousand feet below, the Colorado River winds its way from the continental divide in Colorado to the Gulf of California, a distance of 1,400 miles. (435) 259-2614.

DINOSAUR TRACKS - The St. George Dinosaur Discovery Site at Johnson Farm is home to exceptionally well-preserved dinosaur tracks, some displaying skin impressions. These tracks, along with hundreds of fossil fish, plants, rare dinosaur remains, invertebrates' traces, and important sedimentary structures, show evidence that this site was produced along the western edge of a large, Early Jurassic (age between 195-198 million years ago) freshwater lake. (435) 574-3466.

ENTERPRISE - There are two reservoirs in the Bull Valley Mountains 10 miles southwest of the town of Enterprise. The main one is Upper Enterprise Reservoir, about 250 acres with an average depth of about 50 feet, while Lower Enterprise Reservoir is 79 acres. Many come to the reservoir to camp, fish hike, and boat. The Honeycomb Campground is situated between both lakes and has 21 campsites and flush toilets. There is a boat ramp on Upper Enterprise Reservoir and several fishing areas around both reservoirs. Fishermen will find rainbow trout and smallmouth bass here. Fees are charged.



FOUR CORNERS - The Four Corners is the only place in the U.S. where four states come together at one place: Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Colorado. Here, a person can put each of their hands and feet in four states at the same time. The unique landmark is on Navajo Nation land and is open for visits from the public. West of U.S. Highway 160, 40 miles southwest of Cortez, Colo. (928) 871-6436.

GRAND CANYON - A World Heritage Site encompassing 1,218,375 acres on the Colorado Plateau in northwestern Arizona. The land is semi-arid and consists of raised plateaus and structural basins typical of the southwestern United States. (928) 638-7888.

GRAND STAIRCASE-ESCALANTE NATIONAL MONUMENT - Nearly 1.9 million acres of America's public lands and located between Bryce Canyon and Glen Canyon Recreational Areas. From its namesake Grand Staircase of cliffs and terraces across the rugged Kaiparowits Plateau to the beauty of the Escalante River Canyons, the Monument's size, resources, and isolated location provide amazing opportunities.

GUNLOCK - In scenic red rock country, 15 miles northwest of St. George, lies the 240-acre Gunlock State Park and Reservoir where year-round boating, water sports, and quality fishing for bass and catfish attract visitors. Facilities include boat launching ramp and pit privies. (435) 628-2255.

LAKE MEAD - Lake Mead National Recreation Area offers a wealth of things to do and places to go year-round. Its huge lakes cater to boaters, swimmers, sunbathers and fishermen,

while its desert rewards hikers, wildlife photographers, and roadside sightseers. It is also home to thousands of desert plants and animals adapted to survive in an extreme place where rain is scarce and temperatures soar. (702) 293-8990.

LAKE POWELL - In Glen Canyon National Recreation Area is one of the world's great places for houseboating! The 186-mile-long lake offers sandy beaches, cool blue water, and exceptional red-rock scenery. It is excellent for boating, skiing, kayaking, and fishing. Boat or hike to Rainbow Bridge, or explore any of its many canyons or sand dunes. (928) 608-6200.

PINE VALLEY - Pine Valley Reservoir is a beautiful place for fishermen to fish brook trout and rainbow trout. The reservoir is near the Pine Valley Recreation Complex, which has over 150 campsites with picnic and restroom facilities. This area is greener than most other parts of southwestern Utah with pine and pinion trees, and many come to enjoy camping and hiking. It is west of the town of Central. (435) 652-3100.

QUAIL LAKE - Quail Creek State Park provides excellent year-round camping, picnicking, boating, and trout and bass fishing in sunny southwest Utah. The park is three miles east of the Interstate 15 Hurricane exit on Utah State Route 9. Facilities include 23 campsites, modern restrooms, a fish cleaning station, and two covered group-use pavilions. (435) 879-2378.

SAND HOLLOW - Looking to fish? Swim? Ride your ATV in the sand? Do all that and more at Sand Hollow State Park, located between St. George and Hurricane. Bring your boat, a picnic, and some fishing gear for a fun day on the reservoir, or watch the kids swim while you relax on the beach. Load up your RV or tent and settle in for a nice campout, or ride your ATV in the dunes of Sand Mountain. (435) 680-0715.



SNOW CANYON - Named after early Utah leaders Lorenzo and Erastus Snow, Snow Canyon State Park begins just outside of Ivins and stretches northward. Spectacular scenery includes towering red and white sandstone cliffs, black lava formations, and even a waterfall that appears during heavy rain. Snow Canyon offers 16 miles of hiking trails, beautiful sand dunes, technical rock climbing sites, horseback riding, year-round camping, nature studies, and wildlife viewing. This park is a favorite for locals and visitors alike. (435) 628-2255.

ZION - With breathtaking views, numerous hiking attractions of all difficulty levels and some of the most spectacular scenery on earth, Zion National Park and its surrounding areas attract thousands of visitors every year. This natural wonder is not only a mecca of recreational activity, but Zion and nearby Springdale host numerous cultural activities, as well. There's something for everyone in Zion - whether you're looking for a challenging hike or a fun excursion for the family. (435) 772-3256.



January

Winter 4x4 Jamboree (Hurricane/Sand Hollow) – One of the biggest off-road events in Southern Utah during the winter season, attracting enthusiasts from across the West.

February

St. George Parade of Homes (Washington County) – Showcasing luxury and custom homes with a focus on design, architecture, and interior inspiration. Bryce Canyon Winter Festival (Bryce Canyon National Park) – Presidents' Day weekend celebration featuring snowshoeing, archery, arts and crafts, and more. July

August

November

Butch Cassidy 10K Run (Springdale/Virgin/Grafton area) – A scenic road race through red rock country followed by a celebratory gathering in historic Grafton. K-town Turkey Trot 5K (Kanab) – A Thanksgiving morning fun run/walk for all ages in downtown Kanab. Zion Plein Air Invitational (Springdale) – A week of exhibits, workshops, and painting sales with some of the finest plein air artists in the nation. Christmas Light Parade and Festival (Kanab) – Parade, gourmet s'mores, hot cocoa, caroling, and a lantern launch held the Saturday after Thanksgiving. Zion Canyon Arts & Crafts Fair (Springdale) – A beloved community tradition featuring local and regional artisan booths and handmade goods.

December

Z-Arts Gala (Springdale) – A formal night of celebration with food, dancing, and an art auction hosted by Z-Arts.
